### Council Takes Action on Rental Trailer Parking

Wayne city council Tuesday night asked City Attorney Paul Bornhoff to draw up an ordinance prohibiting the parking of trailers in the city of Wayne except for the purpose of residence by the owner or in an authorized trailer park.

The council has received complaints and a petition against individuals parking trailers within the city limits and then using them for rental property.

The new ordinance will go into effect in the near future.

The council also gave a tentative go-ahead on plans for the hard-surfacing of the airport runway. Preliminary estimates work has to be completed by June to qualify for government aid. Estimated cost to the city for the runway is about \$10,000.

A sewer survey is now underway to determine the needs of Wayne for a sewage disposal plant. At present a lagoon system is being studied and part of the survey is complete. July 1 is the deadline for completing survey work and estimating to qualify for Federal aid.

Approval was given to move a house owned by Harold Hoogner from the country to 108 South Blaine. Two building requests for houses were also approved, one for John Ream on lot 45 Westwood and one for Cecil Wriedt at 728 Walnut.

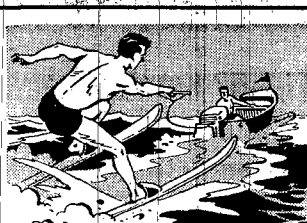

The relay triumph was a surprise, considering the sprint strength of favored Doane and Kearney. On the team were Jim Grove, Dwayne Strassheim, Green and Fred Fetrow.

Other Wayne placings: Dave Kracl, second in shot put with a 48-5 1/4 toss; Keith Towns, fourth in javelin at 180-7; Dennis Smith fifth at 167-3 1/2; Fred Fetrow, third in both the 100 and 200 dashes; Don Shilling, third in the 120 high hurdles, fifth in the mile relay; Dean Hammer, in a three-way tie for fourth in the pole vault.

Wayne nursed third place until the final event, the mile relay, when Hastings finished second and the Wildcats trailed in fifth. This boosted Hastings into third in final standings.

The victors' of Weitzenkamp and Green over tough competitors were pleasing to the team and to Coach Carl Hillmeier. He plans to enter both of them in the national NAIA meet June 2-3 at Sioux Falls, S. D.

For Weitzenkamp the mile triumph capped a sterling career in which he seldom finished less than second or third and frequently won. He lettered four years in track and twice earned the most-valuable award.

## Lighting Can Add To Home Decor

Decor-conscious homemakers are taking increasing notice of carefully planned lighting in their decorating. One significant indication of lighting's importance for pleasure, comfort, beauty and safety is that electric utility companies define it as "Light for Living" and specify that provision for good lighting is as necessary as full horsepower and electric appliances for their Metalion Home awards.

Lighting, as such as fabric and furnishings, can be used to create dramatic visual effects, solve space problems, and complement and give richness to colors. Indeed, money spent for expensive and tastefully decorated rooms is practically wasted if the results cannot be seen because of inadequate lighting.

Experts in home lighting suggest the following decorative effects you can achieve with lighting:

1. **Spaciousness.** Rooms can be made to appear larger when an abundance of lighting eliminates dark corners. Low ceilings are "raised" with a lighted cornice, formed by mounting the lighting channel and faceboard on the ceiling over a window or wall.

2. **Definition of Living Areas.** Just as decorators often use area rugs and different textured wall coverings to define a dining area or home entertainment corner, so coordinated lighting fixtures can set aside activity centers.

3. **Accents.** Wall and ceiling fixtures will not only illuminate but also point up paintings and art objects without creating floor or table clutter.

ered color scheme. And special effects can be created with color-panic lamp bulbs. A downy pink bulb, for example, gives red and enriches without red mahogany while a sunny gold bulb is gay and mellow with all colors, particularly effective with green and with purple, blue and brown.

5. **Controlled Lighting.** Area lighting, that is, light from overhead source of light which illuminates the whole area of a room, should be controlled so that you can have a high level of intensity when there are several persons in a room or for fewer people, less light, which produces a quieter, more relaxed feeling. Table and floor lamps provide task lighting for reading, sewing or similar, doing tasks. Perimeter lighting, illumination at the sides of the room, new light controls make it possible to dial any degree of light from soft to full brilliance.
