| Employees who suddenly have been jolted by the size of the tax bite usually develop a less complacent viewpoint. They see the connection between high Federal spending and the lump of tax money chopped from their paychecks. The country needs more of that kind of jolting of the taxpayers.

Pay Hikes Given Five State Officers; Decline Engineer

Payhikes have been given by the Legislature to four elected state officials and one appointive officer. The lawmakers earlier had refused to boost the check of State Engineer John Hossack who now gets \$13,500 per year.

Buil they passed 22-14, only one vote over the minimum, a bill increasing by \$1,000 per year salaries for the Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General.

Crackdown

Gov. Frank Morrison says if speed turns out to be the cause of traffic accidents of the Interstate Highway he will reduce the limits under the 75 miles per hour maximum. The Legislature set the limit and the bill was signed by the governor.

Morrison said he was a "little disappointed" in the Logislature's action. He added that if motorists comply with the speed limit that would be all right but studies have shown the average of drivers arrested on the Interstate has been 83 miles per hour. The governor also called on Nebraskans May 30 and 31, during the Memorial Day period to drive with their lights on to call attention to other drivers of the necessity for caution in motoring.

Reception Center

Reception Center
A proposal to create a reception center through which newly sentenced prisoners could pass survived its first floor test by a substantial 36-4 vote.
The measure grew out of a Legislative Council study. The center would be at the men's reformatory in the present cell block. A new cell house is in the planning stage.

Sponsors say the center will enable prison and reformatory officials to find out what an inmate is like before he is thrown in with other prisoners and help to-rehabilitate those who can best be helped.

The new dormitory is expected to cost \$282.500 with funds coming from the Beard of Control's

Phormacy Bill
Much mail and telegrams has
been received by State Senators
over a bill they passed regarding

pnarmacy regulations. The pro-posal provides for the first time, the licensing of pharmacy busi-nesses as such with grounds es-tablished for revocation of ti-

nesses as such, with grounds established for revocation of licenses.

Iltemoved from present law and no longer permissible under the bill is a provision allowing any person to compound drugs if working under the supervision of a registered pharmacist.

Sponsors of the bill said this had been interpreted to mean supervision by mail or telephone, in extreme cases, and that the supervision should be immediate. [Under the new law, only licensed pharmacists or pharmacy interns will be allowed to compound drugs. Excepted are those who have somed and operated a pharmacy for 15 years: They may tentime to its os if working under the direct and immediate supervision of a registered pitarmacist.
