Impressions of Wayne Given By Development Officials

School Board Hires New Custodian and Sports Assistant

Explain Need of Overall Plan for City Development

Several 'impressions' of Wayne were given by three representatives of the Northern Natural Gas company Monday night. Speaking at the second quarterly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, the men outlined the growth situation, its problems and benefits, in Wayne. Dave Carson of Northern, led off the program listing the four points to be covered in economic development as: 1. Research, This included surveys and population studies such as have already been made here. 2. Community Development, This covered the efforts needed to make Wayne the way the citizens want it. 3. Existing industry and business. This covered Wayne's major industry, Wayne State College and touched on the type of other industry desired. 4. Industrial promotion. The development of an industrial plan and the expedience of it were covered here. Buck O'Hanlon of Northern spoke on the second phase, Community Development, listing the three things necessary for this development. First said O'Hanlon, organization is needed. This means generally a planning commission and in many cases a representative from every service organization in town to sit on a board to work out growing pains. A planning commission could keep their finger on the growth of Wayne and have it turn into a well-planned, smooth running, business-like operation. Secondly, he said, the planning of the growth of the city is important. Where towns usually grow just one direction; he said, Wayne is growing both to the northwest and the northeast. Planning, such as street layouts, water and sewer are important during the growing phase. Zoning, he said, cannot be overlooked. It is extremely important today that industrial, commercial and residential sections of a city be protected from each other. This can only come through zoning, he said. And control of the zoning laws is very important also. The zoning must be thoroughly enforced if it is going to do any good. O'Hanlon said the schools need a sound, business-like operation. This is important since if Wayne should continue to show growth it might be well for the school to take options on land rather than the present school site for future expansion. Community development is also reflected in management of the city's business, he continued. Taxation by crisis is common in cities. This means that every time something new is proposed, a new tax must be added since bonds are needed. This shows violent up and down motion as funds are hit where it is possible to lower taxes a little. He suggested that to look good in the eyes of prospective industry, a taxation plan be used that increased the taxes on a set figure to show a steady rise instead of the violent fluctuation in taxes. This planned taxation can be a great benefit to the city, he concluded.

Midget Baseball Starts Monday at City Field

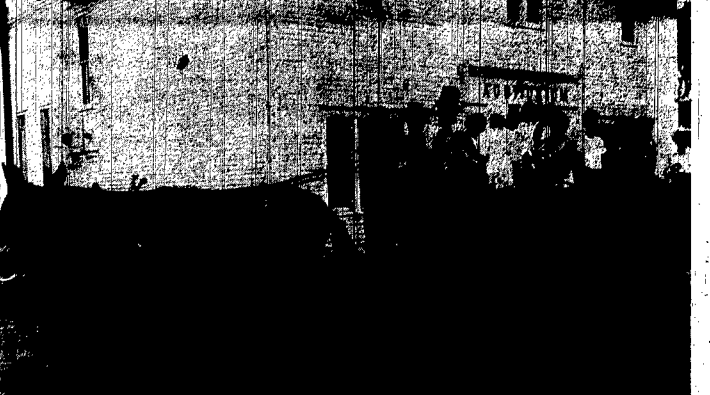
