**Work as Adjournment Nears** 

Lincoln — Signs of wanting to go home have finally cropped up in the current session of the Legislature. The lawmakers have begun a series of events that set the stage for adjournment. These include introduction of the budget bill of the floor and proving of spending bills to top priority for debate. Educated guesses are the sentators probably will wind up their business some time late this month. lowever, action on other legislation on the floor is expected to boost the total spending from tax dollars higher. The committee recommendation for the general fund was an increase of only \$879.934 from the \$76.6 million appropriated for 1959.01. University of Nebraska spending was set by the committee at \$21.7 million for the next two years, an increase of \$2.6 million, far less than requested by the University, far below that recommended by the Governor. The normal schools at Wayne, Chadroi, Peru and Kearney were recommended for a boost of \$886.900, for a total general fund allocation of \$5.0 million.

### County Sheriffs

County Sheriffs

A bill boosting mileage payments to county sheriffs was passed by the Legislature 40-1. Under the proposal, sheriffs would get 10 cents a mile for travel in counties adjacent to a sheriffs home county. The previous figure was eight cents. Also established was a minimum travel fee of 50 cents for trips without wo miles of the courthouse. Current law now provides for for cents per mile in a sheriff's home county, eight cents elsewhere. Meanwhile, the Legislature's judiciary committee killed a bill that would have allowed county boards to set salaries for all county employees.

Under the bill, county boards also would have set hours of operation for all county offices. New pay of employees is set by the elected officials for whom the employees work.

Arguments at a public hearing by proponents were that county boards fix the budget and should

committee itself as "tight and realistie."

The paring was more than many of the most conservative members of the Legislature expected. Half the state agencies that use property tax money got reductions from what was allocated to them for the current bismium which ends June 30.


