County Has Slightly Lower 1960 Property Valuations

Total actual valuation of all taxable property except railroads in Wayne County is down slightly from last year's figure, according to County Assessor Henry Arrp. The county tax abstract shows tangible property valued at \$77,595,330 this year as compared to \$79,804,68 last year — a drop of \$2,209,350.

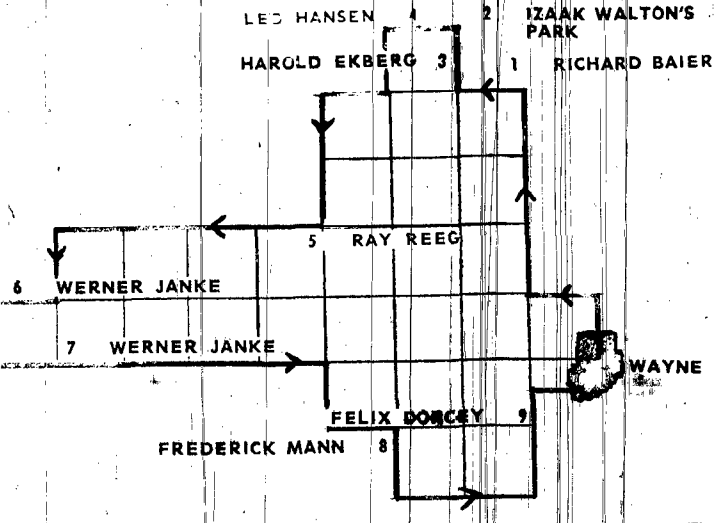

Tentative Board Decision to Allot \$727,000 to College

The State Normal board, meeting in Wayne Wednesday, gave a tentative approval to budgets for the "teachers' colleges" at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney, reaffirming a decision voiding the contract of Henry St. Onge and setting building priorities for the first year of the coming biennium.

Under the tentative budget, Wayne will receive \$727,000, compared to \$677,204 last year; Kearney, \$1,050,655, compared to \$839,338 last year; Peru, \$550,000, compared to \$514,037 last year, and Chadron \$613,113, compared to \$523,685 last year. Final action will be taken after a check to determine the number of credit hours being taught at each of the four institutions.

Give Wool Rates; 1960 Incentives

An incentive payment of \$47.60 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool for the 1960 marketing year has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The purpose is to bring average wool prices up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the National Wool Act.

USDA also announced the payment rate on sales of lambs that have never been shorn, to compensate for the wool on them, will be 80 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold. This is payment is based on the shorn wool payment and is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

Automobile Rolls As Driver Asleep

The accident, which apparently occurred between 2 and 3 a.m., as the driver fell asleep at the wheel one mile west of the Hoskins turnoff, caused about \$300 damage to his 1955 Buick, according to Highway Patrolman C. W. Schel.

The automobile ran off the left side of the road about 180 feet and hit a driveway abutment before going another 100 feet and rolling on its top.

Half of County Population Located in City of Wayne

Nearly half of the population in Wayne county is located in the city of Wayne according to population figures compiled by the U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census. Wayne county has a population of 9,959 with 4,217 of these persons living in the city of Wayne.

This represents an increase of 17.3 percent for the city and a decrease of 1.7 percent for the county from the 1950 census.

Further breakdowns for the city show 1 percent of the population is non-white, 25.9 percent are under 18 years of age; 60.7 percent, 18-64; and 13.4 percent, over 65.

This compares with 1 percent non-white in the county; 33 percent total population under 18 years; 58.1 percent, 18-65; 10.8, 65 or over.

There are 1,199 households in the city; an increase of 23.2 percent since 1950. Average population per household is 8.86. About 19 percent of the city population, or 788 persons, live in group quarters such as institutions, boarding houses and college dormitories.

About 50 percent of the male and female population for the city are married while about 64 percent of the male and female rural population are married.

Soil and Water Conservation Drive-it-Yourself Tour Set

The city council Tuesday authorized the application to be sent to the federal government for aid on a sewer disposal plant for Wayne. No definite figure has been set for the cost of construction since the cost of land and the type of equipment necessary can vary a great deal.

Approval was given a building permit for Arnie Reeg for expansion of his store at a cost of about \$15,000. Also approved was the request of Herm Rose to build on his residence.

So far, estimates have run from over \$200,000 to nearly \$400,000. Aid from the government is adjusted to meet the final total after all factors are considered.

In other action a new paving district was also formed to pave Fairground Ave. from Main Street to Chammins Street.

Ask Federal Aid On Disposal Plant

There will be no organized tour, but signs will be erected and left standing from June 29-July 5. The sites are located so they may be seen from the road.

Following is a brief explanation of the 30-mile tour which begins at Wayne. Conservation practices which will be seen are: field diversions, wildlife conservation, tile drainage, terraces, grass waterways, grass turn rows, contour farming, farmstead windbreaks, erosion control structures and open ditch drainage.

At the first stop there is a diversion terrace on the east side of the Richard Baier farm yard. This diversion intercepts the water which would normally run through the farm yard and divert it to the road ditch.

A dam has been constructed to create a fishing pond at the second stop, the Wayne Park Walton park. The remainder of the park area is protected from blowing and grayling to provide a good habitat for pheasants, quail and other birds from several artificial springs. This is an example of a small area set for wildlife conservation.

The outlet pipe of a tile drain is located at point four, 3/4 mile to the left on the south bank of the Dig Creek bridge. The lowland field to the south and west of this point is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ekberg. Some years the water table in this field is so high it is impossible to get crops planted at the proper time and they do very poorly during the growing season. By drawing the water table down with tile drain it makes it a productive field.

A complete conservation program has been established at the fourth stop, the farm operated by Leo Hansen. The bottom land northeast of the buildings has been drained by a tiling system. West of the buildings all of the draws have been seeded to grassed waterways. All of the sloping

land is terraced and farmed on the contour. A good cropping system is followed. Grassed turn rows are established along field borders. Hansen uses four-row equipment and said it works very well for farming terraces on the contour.

A farmstead windbreak has been established to protect the buildings and feed lots from northwest winds at the Raymond Reeg farm. The windbreak has many rows of trees and also gives protection for wildlife, as well as adding beauty to the farmstead and value to the land. He also has his farm land terraced on the contour.

An erosion control dam has been built at stop number six, the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Werner Janke. A gully was beginning to cut back in Mr. Janke's pasture. By constructing this dam, the gully problem has been eliminated. A metal pipe lets the excess water pass through the dam and on through the neighbor's farm without causing serious washing. Several acres of land below this dam was frequently flooded before the dam was constructed.

About 500 feet northeast from the junction of Highways 35 and 98 an outlet type of erosion control structure has been built. This is a concrete deep structure which eliminates a ditch that had begun to cut back into a field. To the east, there is a newly planted farmstead windbreak. It has had the good care necessary for new trees and in five to six years will begin to be an effective wind barrier.

Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Mann began their conservation program about 12 years ago. At this eighth stop, all of the conservation work for the farm has been completed, including terraces, grassed waterways, grassed turn rows, windbreak and sprinkler irrigation system which controls run-off and soil erosion.

Across the second bridge north and about 100 feet on the left hand side is an open drainage ditch. This drains an eight acre area about one-half mile west of the Felix Dorcey farm. This type of ditch, which is easy to maintain, drains excess water off slowly so as not to cause erosion.

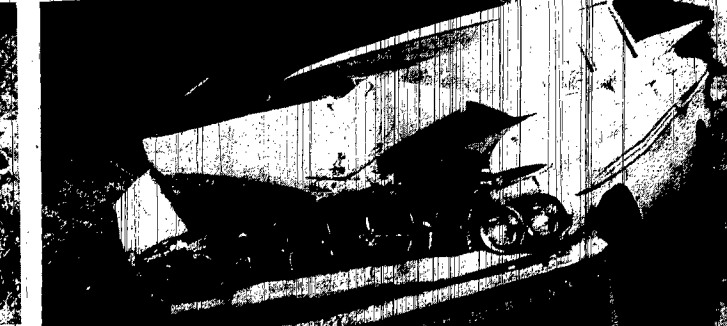
Hold Practice for Swimming Teams

# Redeemer Lutheran Church Selected for Merger Meet

Redeemer Lutheran church, Wayne, has been selected as the site for a district merger meeting, which, in the opinion of Rev. S. K. Freese, should "help eliminate the confusion about the Lutheran church."

Rev. de Freese said the district meeting to be Oct. 22 will give a glimpse of the form the new church organization will take and the individual responsibilities which will be expected from members. He is chairman of the meeting. Members of the planning committee are: Rev. C. Willard Carlsson, Wakefield, and Rev. Drell Bernhardtson, Wausa. It is open to the public for questions and answers.

The "confusion" which Rev. de Freese speaks of is largely a matter of various national customs and different systems of organization according to three Lutheran pastors from this area. There are no doctrinal differences between the divisions of the Lutheran Church says Revs. de Freese, Carlsson and R. F. Shirck, St. Paul's Lutheran church.

Rev. Shirck and Rev. de Freese represent ULCA. None of the four groups will find all of the "old cherished hymns" in the new consolidated hymnal, but a new liturgy has been added and it will be same throughout the country.

Rev. Shirck was not in favor of the merger when it first began. "I felt at that time there could be more inter-cooperation between the Lutheran groups without a formal merger," he said. "But now we are finding the things which bind us together are so much more numerous than those which divide us."

There will be a concentration of all churches and institutions in smaller areas rather than overlapping of those functions in larger areas as it is now," he said. "The youth groups and other organizations will be combined."

Rev. Shirck said "fringe areas" of culture may be lost in the merger but there will also be steps to preserve traditional customs.

By laws of the national constitution provide for Special Interest Conferences for ministers and lay persons having common linguistic, national and cultural heritage.

For each group the merger will mean giving up individual ways of organization in favor of a uniform system of church government.

Rev. Carlsson of the Augustana Synod views the merger with mixed feelings. For his church it will mean one church council rather than a division of functions under a system of deacons and elders.

Ordination of pastors will be done at the synod convention in which the congregation which calls the candidate is located. This means friends and relatives will be able to attend the services. At present Augustana ordination services only one time a year at its national convention.

In turn, ULCA ordinations will be recognized throughout the nation rather than just in the synod where they occurred as is done now. Both

## Sharpen Hammer Claws

When hammer claws slip while pulling small-headed nails, sharpen their grip by filing the notch between them with a triangular file. Deepen the notch between the claws with an edge of the file.

## Tip On Soldering

A wet rag, wrapped around a newly soldered joint on copper pipe, prevents the joint from loosening up when heat is applied to a nearby joint. Heat applied to adjoining members is often sufficient to melt newly soldered joints.

## Prevent Bulb Rust

To prevent out-of-doors light bulbs from rusting light in their sockets, apply a thin layer of grease or petroleum jelly over the metal threads before inserting.

You can improvise a "level" from an ordinary glass measuring cup which has markings on both sides. If the cup is filled with water to any one of the marks, it will show that the surface is level when the water contacts the mark on all sides of the cup.

In summer, the proper amount of mineral wool insulation helps to keep heat outside the house which results in greater comfort inside.

A significant saving is realized by using sufficient insulation when a house is to be air conditioned. Tests prove that adequately thick mineral wool insulation installed where needed cuts down the size of cooling equipment required and its operating costs.

Practically all mineral wool manufacturers have switched from the old method of classifying their products by inches of thickness to a system of "R" designations. "R" means "resistance to heat flow out of a house in winter or into it in summer." Instead of describing what insulating material is, the "R" number tells what its effect will be after it is installed. The greater the "R" number, the more effective the insulation.

For a comfortable, well-insulated house, batts or blankets of mineral wool marked R-19 should be put in ceilings, R-11 in walls, and R-13 in floors.

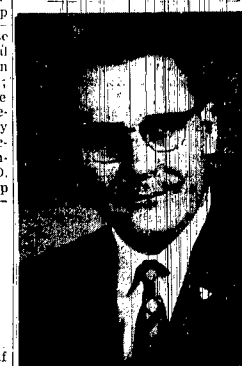

## Tempers Flare When Solons Discuss University Budget

Lincoln — The Nebraska Legislature was comprised of a fairly congenial group of senators who held their tempers most of the session.

Long-time observers felt the bulk of the flap was the result of an extended session and the accompanying strain on the lawmakers who have been regarded as a hard working group.

### Recreation Areas

A bill to provide access roads to state recreation areas was passed by the Legislature 38-3.
