County Has Slightly Lower 1960 Property Valuations**Des Moines Man To Head Hospital**

Total actual valuation of all taxable property except railroads in Wayne county is down slightly from last year's figure, according to County Assessor Henry Arp.

The county tax abstract shows tangible property valued at \$79,595,390 this year as compared to \$79,804,68 last year — a drop of \$209,300.

Individual totals for Wayne county show boats, \$22,770 this year as compared to \$23,115 last year; poultry, \$4,360 last year; farm machinery, \$1,081, \$15 compared to \$1,839,235; grade cattle, \$6,811,683 compared to \$7,814,595.

Purchased cattle, \$53,490 compared to \$61,020; horses and mules, \$19,910 compared to \$34,110; hogs, \$27,330 compared to \$6,864,225; sheep, \$36,110 compared to \$42,325; feed, \$209,110 compared to \$229,185.

Total personal valuations for the county are slightly lower this year \$1,219,363 compared to \$1,239,125. Total business schedules are also lower \$2,117,464 compared to \$4,0,675.

Special schedules for telephones, express, pipelines and motor vehicles have increased slightly from \$4,020,735 last year to \$4,088,102 this year. Real estate remained about the same, increasing slightly from \$66,526,610 last year to \$66,566,200 this year.

Real estate, personal and business schedules have also been compiled for several towns in the area and further figures will be available in August, Arp said.

Wayne total actual valuation for real estate for this year is \$11,302,440, personal property schedules, \$10,566 compared to \$12,125 last year, and business, \$1,737,360 compared to \$1,749,575. No comparison was available for real estate at the time the article was written.

Winside real estate actual valuation this year, \$298,730; personal property, \$85,284 compared to \$26,723 last year, and business schedules, \$156,616 compared to \$150,910 last year.

Carroll real estate, \$523,830 this year; personal property, \$18,120 this year compared to \$18,655, and business \$88,622 this year, \$65,505 last year.

Hoskins real estate, \$384,85; personal property \$32,310 this year, compared to \$31,355; business \$100,990, compared to \$110,095.

Sholes real estate \$105,965; personal property \$11,115, compared to \$10,370 last year; business, \$2,965 compared to \$2,940.

Wakefield (Heikes addition) real estate \$254,120; personal property \$12,605 this year, \$11,030 last year; business schedules, none.

The assessed valuation is 35 percent of the total valuation figures given.

Des Moines Man To Head Hospital

Don Easley, Des Moines, 1a, has been named administrator of the Wayne City hospital, replacing Gail Coleman, who recently resigned.

Easley, 26, has been a medical technologist at Iowa Lutheran hospital, Des Moines, the past five years. He is married and has two children. He will assume his duties in Wayne about Aug. 1. His family will join him when housing is available, his brother, Richard Easley, is administrator of Wakefield Community hospital.

Easley attended the University of Iowa and the Northwest Institute, Minneapolis.

Experiment Farm Tour Slated Friday

Adam Jeffrey will speak to members of the Nebraska Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers Friday after they tour the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station near Concord.

Dr. J. M. Brown will show slides and discuss disease-free swine. After his talk, members will tour a farm where facilities are being set up to use disease-free hogs commercially.

A final topic on the program will be a discussion on the division of government payment between landlords and tenants on idle acres of land.

Under the tentative budget, Wayne will receive \$727,000, compared to \$677,204 last year; Kearney, \$1,050,655, compared to \$839,338 last year; Peru \$550,000, compared to \$514,007 last year, and Chadron \$613,113, compared to \$532,685 last year. Final action will be taken after a check to determine the number of credit hours being taught at each of the four institutions.

Plans call for a base appropriation of \$275,000 to each college during the first year; additional amounts of \$35,000 to Wayne to implement the trimester plan, \$7,000 to return annual payments to college employees which were declared illegal; \$17,500 to employ an executive officer for the Normal board, \$300,000 to pay a deficit at Chadron; \$23,000 reserve, and the remainder to be divided among the four colleges according to the number of credit hours taught, excluding correspondence and off-campus courses.

The budget would be in effect from the calendar year from June 1961-June 1962. An interim committee would study financial plans in other states, especially Minnesota, before a decision would be made for a second year.

In other action, the board reaffirmed by unanimous consent their May 6 action voiding the contract of Henry St. Ong after he allowed William Mandel, a controversial figure, to use his back yard for space.

John Breckster, vice-president of the board, agreed with the other members that he had seen "nothing to make him change his mind." Several of those present reported receiving considerable correspondence on the matter.

In setting building priorities, top consideration was given to construction of a \$650,000 fine arts building at Wayne. It was discussed that planning begin now for construction in 1963.

Two other major construction items at the colleges are a \$700,000 library at Kearney and a \$600,000 physical education building at Chadron.

At Wayne the priorities set for minor construction projects include \$4,000 for leveling about five acres of the present store.

The present structure will be completely remodeled, including a new front and siding. The store will remain open while remodeling is in progress, Reed added. Completion is expected about Sept. 1.

The construction contract was awarded to Karl Ott Construction Co. Plumbing and electrical work will be done by Tiedtke's.

The State Normal board, meeting in Wayne Wednesday, gave tentative approval to budgets for the teachers colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney, reaffirmed a decision voiding the contract of Henry St. Ong and setting building priorities for the first year of the coming biennium.

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

The city council Tuesday authorized the application to be sent to the federal government for aid on a sewer disposal plant for Wayne. No definite figure has been set for the cost of construction since the cost of land and the type of equipment necessary can vary a great deal.

Approval was given a building permit for Arnie Reeg for expansion of his store at a cost of about \$15,000. Also approved was the request of Horm Frese to build on to his residence.

So far, estimates have run from over \$200,000 to nearly \$400,000. Aid from the government is adjusted to meet the final total after all factors are considered.

In other action, a new paving district was also formed to pave Fairground Ave. from Main Street to Commins Street.

Hear Reorganization Arguments Thursday

Arguments as to the constitutionality of the Wakefield school reorganization plan will be heard June 29 by District Judge George Dittick.

Give Wool Rates; 1960 Incentives

An incentive payment of \$47.60 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool for the 1960 marketing year has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The purpose is to bring average wool prices up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the National Wool Act.

USDA also announced the payment rate on sales of lambs that have never been shorn, to compensate for the wool on them, will be 80 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold. This payment is based on the shorn wool payment and is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

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land is terraced and farmed on the contour. A good cropping system is being sponsored by the Wayne County Extension office. A map of the tour, pictured at left, can be clipped and taken along for convenience.

There will be no organized tour, but signs will be erected and left standing from June 29, July 5. The sites are located so they may be seen from the road.

is a brief explanation of the 30-mile tour which begins at Wayne. Conservation practices which will be seen are field diversions, wildlife conservation, tile drainage terraces, grass waterways, grass turn rows, contour

An erosion control dam has been built at stop number six, the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Werner Janke. A gully was beginning to eat back in Mr. Janke's pasture. By constructing this dam, the gully problem has been eliminated. A metal pipe directs the excess water pass through the dam and diverts it to the farm yard and ditches it to the road ditch.

At the first stop there is a diversion terrace on the east side of the Richard Baier farm yard. This diversion intercepts the water which would normally run through the farm yard and divert it to the road ditch.

A dam has been constructed to create a fishing pond at the second stop, the Wayne Erkak Watson park. The remainder of the park is protected from mowing and grazing to provide a good habitat for pheasants, quail and other wild life. The water in the lake comes from several artesian springs. This is an example of a small area used for wildlife conservation.

The outlet pipe of the dam is located at point three, 30 feet to the left on the south bank of the Dog Creek bridge. The lowland field to the south and west of this point is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ekberg. Some years ago the water (in his field) is so high it is impossible to get crops planted at the proper time and they do very poorly during the growing season. By drawing the water table down with a tile drain it makes it easier to grow crops.

Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Mann began their conservation program about 12 years ago. At this eighth stop, all of the conservation work for the farm has been completed including terraces, grassed waterways, grassed turn rows, windbreaks and sprinkler irrigation system which controls run-off and soil erosion.

Across the second bridge north and about 100 feet on the left hand side is an open drainage ditch. This drains an acre or two area about one-half mile west of the Felix Dorsey farm. This type of ditch, which is easy to maintain, drains water off slowly so as not to cause erosion.


Magdanz Thrown; Mower Hit Behind


The accident occurred about 11:30 a.m. 3½ miles south of Wayne on Highway 15. A car driven by Gary Sievers, 16, hit a tractor driven by Thomas Chase, 45, Bloomfield, from behind. The Chase car, in turn, hit the mower from behind and pushed it into the ditch.

The Chase car and the tractor with Magdanz on it went into the ditch. The tractor went through a fence and struck a tree in the pasture adjoining the road. Magdanz was stayed on the tractor until it was well into the ditch.

Trooper Carl Schild, who investigated the accident, estimated damage to the mowing machine at approximately \$50, and about \$1,000 to each of the two cars.

Redeemer Lutheran Church Selected for Merger Meet

Redeemer Lutheran church, Wayne, has been selected as the site for a district merger meeting which, in the opinion of Rev. S. K. de Freese, should "help eliminate the confusion about the Lutheran church."

The district meeting is one step in a national merger of four Lutheran synods — Augustana, United Lutheran, Soum and American Evangelical Lutheran churches. Together, they will form one body — The Lutheran church in America — after final details are worked out at a national convention in 1962.

Rev. de Freese said the district meeting to be Oct. 22 will give a glimpse of the form the new church organization will take and the individual responsibilities which will be expected from members. He is chairman of the meeting. Members of the planning committee are Rev. C. Willard Carlson, Wakefield, and Rev. Drell Bernhardson, Wausa. It is open to the public for questions and answers.

The "confusion" which Rev. de Freese speaks of is largely a matter of various national customs and different systems organization according to three Lutheran pastors from this area. There are no doctrinal differences between the divisions of the Lutheran Church says Revs. de Freese, Carlson and R. E. Shirek, St. Paul's Lutheran church.

Rev. de Freese said there was a linguistic problem when Lutherans first came to America. Thus, each nationality formed its own church — the Swedish, Augustana; Danish, AELC; Finnish, Soum and German, ULCA.

Rev. Shirek said "fringe areas" of culture may be lost in the merger but there will also be steps to preserve traditional customs. By-laws of the national constitution provide for Special Interest Conferences for ministers and lay persons having common linguistic, national and cultural heritage. In addition, Soum and AELC may enter the consolidation as groups based on national rather than geographic characteristics if they wish. Two other bodies which will do this are the Icelandic Synod and Silesian Zion Synod of ULCA.

For each group the merger will mean giving up individual ways of organization in favor of a uniform system of church government.

Rev. Carlson of the Augustana Synod views the merger with mixed feelings. For his church it will mean one church council rather than a division of functions under a system of deacons and elders.

Ordination of pastors will be done at the synod convention in which the congregation which calls the candidate is located. Thus more friends and relatives will be able to attend the services. At present Augustana conducts its ordination services only one time a year at its national convention.

In turn, ULCA ordinates will be recognized throughout the nation rather than just in the synod where they occurred as is done now. Both

Rev. Shirek and Rev. de Freese represent ULCA.

None of the four groups will find all of the "old cherished hymns" in the new consolidated hymnal but a new liturgy has been added and it will be same throughout the country.

Rev. Shirek was not in favor of the merger when it first began.

"I felt at that time there could be more inter-cooperation between the Lutheran groups without a formal merger," he said. "But now we are finding the things which bind us together are so much more numerous than those which divide us."

Rev. Shirek said education will be one of the areas to benefit from the merger.

The Board of Education of the parent church will ask colleges and seminaries to meet still higher educational goals. If the individual synod is unable to supply enough money for these goals, funds may be channeled from the national level."

The new organization, which will contain about 6,000 congregations, will operate with a considerable financial saving through a simplified administration and centralization of institutions according to Rev. de Freese.

"There will be a concentration of all churches and institutions in smaller areas rather than overlapping as is now," he said. "And the youth groups and other organizations will be combined."

"This merger is important because the aim of the Christian church is to be one in Christ. Why should we be divided?"

Heavy Drilling Tip

Heavy drilling in metal calls for constant application of oil or kerosene to lubricate the bit. Time can be eliminated by building a dam of putty around the drilling arch and forming a pool of lubricant.

Practically all mineral wool manufacturers have switched from the old method of classifying their products by inches of thickness to a system of "R" designations. "R" means "resistance to heat flow out of a house in winter or into it in summer." Instead of describing what the insulating material is, the "R" factor tells what its effect will be after it is installed. The greater the "R" number, the more effective the insulation.

For a comfortable, well insulated house, bats or blankets of mineral wool marked R-19 should be put in ceilings, R-11 in walls, and R-13 in floors.

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

Profit from Wise Words

A century or more ago the phrase "welfare state" was not known. But the philosophy it describes was . . . and has been all through recorded history. And some of the greatest Americans warned tellingly against its dangers.

For instance, Abraham Lincoln said: "The legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all or cannot so well do for themselves in their separate and individual capacities. It all that people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere."

Then, long before that, Thomas Jefferson expressed the same philosophy in other words: "I place economy among the first and most important virtues and public debt as the greatest of dangers to be feared. To preserve our independence, we must make our choice between economy and liberty; or profusion and servitude. If we run into such debts, we must be taxed in our meat and drink, in our necessities and our comforts, in our labors and in our amusements. If we can prevent the government from wasting the labor of the people, under the pretense of caring for them, they will be happy."

We can profit, if we only will, from these wise words from the past.

Tempers Flare When Solons Discuss University Budget

Lincoln — The Nebraska Legislature was comprised of a fairly congenial group of senators who held their tempers most of the session. But they parted ways when it came to the University of Nebraska budget. This set off the most bitter debate for four days on the floor.

There have been controversial issues in the Legislature but most did not last long.

This probably would have been true of the lost tempers over the University budget had arguments been followed by a considerably longer time in session. Spine of the scrapping, as an aftermath of the budget battle, got highly personal.

Long-time observers felt the bulk of the flareup was the result of an extended session and the accompanying strain on the lawmakers who have been regarded as a hard working group.

Because of the long session the senators had to hustle to get the budget bill moved along to beat the July 1 deadline for the beginning of a new biennium. The budget bill never was debated so long in the 24-year history of the unicameral. It is one of the last items normally taken up by the solons. But this time there were only bills acted upon after the budget.

County Agent's Column

Tomato Blight

Tomatoes growing in many parts of Nebraska are infected with a blight called septorial leaf spot, the most common foliage disease of garden tomatoes which causes leaves to turn yellow and die. This disease develops most rapidly during periods of warm, wet weather and it may become very severe if such weather continues.

It can be controlled by spraying with fungicides containing copper. Several new fungicides, such as Zineb, Manet, Naben and zinc sulfate have given excellent results in the control of this disease.

The blight may occur on plants of any age, but in the garden, the injury becomes most evident after plants begin to set their fruit. They turn yellow and die. Close examination of these leaves will show a spotted condition. Actually, the spots develop before the leaf dies.

Spraying or dusting should start soon after the first tomatoes have set and continued at weekly intervals if the weather is relatively wet. Applications at two-week intervals may be satisfactory during dry seasons.

Through coverage of the plant surface is necessary for satisfactory control. It will be necessary to add a teaspoonful of a common household detergent to each gallon of spray solution as a wetting agent so that the material will wet the foliage thoroughly.
