Randolph Girl Has Skull Fracture; Reported Improved

Deposits at WSTC Dorms Ahead of Last Year Figure

The assessed values for real estate in Wayne, Carroll, Hoskins, Shells, and Helles, addition to Wakefield were given this week by county assessor Henry Arp.

They include Wayne, \$3,955,883; Carroll, \$183,345; Hoskins, \$136,690; Shells, \$37,094 and Helles, \$88,596.

These figures are 35 percent of the actual values of \$11,302,540.

The club is seeking to restore broken boards on the cupola, paint it and put a fence around it.

The cupola and a marker are located two miles south and four east of Wayne on a 20' x 20' tract of land deeded by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Haglund to the Wayne County Historical Society in 1940.

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

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is our person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Two-Way Competition

One of the best and simplest editorials on transportation matters that has yet appeared comes from the Scottsbluff Star-Herald. Here it is:

"James Hoffa of the Teamsters union calls upon Congress to pass a law to require the Interstate Commerce commission in fixing freight rates to consider the effect that railroad piggyback methods (carrying truck trailers on flat cars) have on competing forms of transportation.

"He argues that the efficiency of trailers on flat cars is taking jobs that 'belong' to trucking employees and he expresses no concern for the consumers who pay the bill.

"Railroads lost business and employees when trucks moved goods more efficiently and economically than railroads. The railroads by their own resources are now able to recapture some of that lost business. The consumers will ultimately benefit in terms of the retail prices they must pay. There should never be legislation to hamstring efficiency of the free-enterprise system."

One can understand the objection of the truckers to loss of business. But what they should be doing is seeking ways to make their own services more attractive to the shipper — not asking Congress for a law that would give them the traffic whether they deserve it or not on the basis of economy and efficiency. A main reason for competition is to make a profit by giving consumers the best in

goods and services at minimum costs. That goes for transportation as well as all other enterprise.

Who Controls Purse Strings?

A major fiscal problem today is the fact that Congress has virtually lost control over the nation's purse strings.

Rep. Pelly (Wash.), speaking in the House, recently described the problem in these words: "... an idea of Congressional lack of control over the Federal purse strings can be gained by examining the status of backdoor spending authorizations of the Federal government, permitting these agencies to borrow from the Treasury and expend the funds without requiring an annual justification or review by the Congressional committees having jurisdiction over appropriations.

Pelly went on to present a tabulation covering these backdoor expenditures over a period of years. The sums involved total tens upon tens of billions.

He added that if additional current proposals of the same nature are adopted, "history may well set the 87th Congress as having yielded its constitutional responsibility to the executive branch in greater degree than any Congress before."

There is room for difference of opinion over the wisdom of the various spending measures. But, whatever the final decision on any of these, one of Congress' most fundamental duties is to maintain its Constitutional controls over the people's money.

about from place to place, a representative form of government — these things were bought for us at a great price. We possess these, together with all the rest of the advantages of this country of ours, because those who have walked before us were willing to sacrifice for them. The Lord has appointed those who are to receive payment from our hands, and He has designated the coin in which payment is to made. It is the coin of love. By this we, as well as all men, know we are the Lord's — that we pay on the debt we owe Christ by showing love to one another.

We of this day must not be human sponges, always taking in, filling ourselves until we become fat and complacent. We are not the end of the stream of humanity, and our debt to the past must be paid to the future. We today are the means of transmitting the riches of our day, out of the past, to the unborn of tomorrow. This is our obligation.

These debts we owe to the past, which are gone, and cannot receive payment. We can, however, in some measure balance the books, as we align ourselves with the past and work at the tasks it has begun. We must plant anew for the future where we have reaped from the past. We pay our debt to the past as we pass on to the future, undiminished, that which has been willed to us — and pass it on with interest. He does not do his duty who is slack in using wisely and well his heritage, who destroys the treasure which has been amassed at great cost and self-denial and paid up as capital for man's use.

Nor should we forget our debt to the past for our heritage as a nation. What we so calmly take for granted today — the right to peaceful assembly, the freedom of the press and other media of communication, the right to move

from place to place, the right to a decent home, the right to a decent job, the right to a decent education, the right to a decent medical care — these are all the fruits of the past, and we must never forget them. They are the foundation upon which our present and future depends. We must never forget them.

This future, and making for a degree of security for it, poses quite a problem for all of us today. No matter what you make or earn, it is a pretty difficult matter to build against the future. When the income tax gets through with you there isn't much left with which to use as a safeguard against the lean years that lie ahead, and after a fellow does amass a bit of competence and finally shuffles off this mortal coil, the inheritance tax takes such a bit of it that his surviving

Capitol News . . .

Local Government Subject Of Much 1961 Legislation

Lincoln — Municipal and county government will discover that they were the subject of a great deal of legislation enacted by the 1961 Legislature. At least 29 bills affecting municipal government and another 33 relating to county government, were passed by the legislature. Not included in those totals were many bills affecting only Lincoln and Omaha.

Most proposals involved fees and salaries.

The senators ordered new pay levels for county commissioners and supervisors and a floor was placed under salaries of most other elected county officers. County boards previously set the salaries for such officers.

Use of fees to sheriffs for use of their own automobiles were increased from 8 to 10 cents a mile in counties adjoining their home county.

A \$500 yearly limit was set on the pay of chairmen of village trustees and a maximum of \$250 annually on members of the boards of trustees of villages.

Cities from 5,000 to 40,000 population were authorized to employ a city administrator.

Villages were authorized to acquire off street parking facilities.

County surveyors' pay was increased from \$20 per day to \$22 per day.

Fees for filing or acquiring copies of records in counties were increased. Here are some of the fees increased for counties:

—From \$2 to \$3, the fee charged by county clerks for a duplicate copy of a motor vehicle certificate of title and from \$1 to \$2 the fee for a certificate of title.

—Fees charged by county clerks or registers of deeds for filing and other services related to deeds, mortgages and other documents.

—From 50 cents to \$1 the fee chargeable by registers of deeds for filing and indexing notices and discharge of federal tax liens.

Cities of 40,000 population or less now may levy a maximum of 3 mills instead of one mill for special purposes such as libraries and municipal buildings. Included as eligible under the levy were swimming pools and medical clinic buildings.

Form 2240 has been mailed to all farm operators of record who claimed the Federal refund last year. Those who have not filed formerly must, however, obtain the forms for themselves. The four cents per

gallon tax is collected for the purpose of highway construction and maintenance on all gasoline sold. This tax is therefore not due on gasoline used off of roads and highways for agricultural purposes but cannot be refunded unless the farm operator files a claim between July 1 and Oct. 2.

Some farmers have not claimed the refund in the past, not realizing the form is extremely convenient and requires only a few minutes time. The refund means a saving of about 15 percent of the fuel cost for farmers using gasoline as a major source of power.

The farm management specialist also emphasized that Nebraska state gas tax refunds are paid only on gasoline purchased in the last seven months before a claim is filed. Those who have not filed their first 1961 claim should do so prior to July 30 to avoid losing the refund on gasoline purchased in January.

Concludes the resolution: "It is in the interest of the State of Nebraska in the maintenance of a sound and conservative government to retain such rural communities as basic to our way of life."

The Legislative Council is composed of all members of the legislature who investigate state problems and report to the next session of the unicameral.

Textbook Eyeing

A resolution was passed by the Legislature urging parents, educators and school officials to be alert to attempts to instill Communist propaganda into textbooks. The resolution followed failure of a proposal by the Legislative Council to investigate textbooks used in Nebraska.




