







### Donors Sought to Give Blind Sight Through Eye Bank

Wayne area residents will now have the opportunity to offer their eyes after death in order that blind persons may see, under a program set up by the newly-formed Lions club here.

The program provides for removing the cornea, or "windshield" of the eye lens, within three to four hours after death, and preserving them for transplantation to the eyes of a blind person.

The cornea is the round, slightly protruding forepart of the eye which disease sometimes clouds, or upon which scar tissue has formed after an accident. It is this affected portion of the eye which is removed and a "new" cornea inserted. The whole eye cannot be transplanted, but portions of it are sometimes used. About one out of five blind persons are enabled to see through this program.

Members of the Lions club said anyone can be a donor, including those who wear glasses. The Lions club will furnish each donor with an identification card which is to be kept on the donor's person.

Within a few hours after death of a donor, a physician removes the eyes with special instruments contained in a Lions eye bank kit. The eyes are placed in a refrigerated container and transported to the University hospital, Omaha, by the highway patrol or civil air patrol. There they are examined to discover any defects or diseases.

Clifford Dahl, Lions club president, terms the program "one of the greatest things that ever happened in Nebraska." It has been praised and sanctioned by leaders of major religious faiths and termed "an ennobling act of which one may be proud that in this manner he has benefited a fellowman even after death."

The Lions club also provides other services to the blind, including medical and surgical care, white canes, Braille materials, helps the blind find jobs, transportation and schools, obtains adoption of city traffic ordinances on the white canes for the blind and conducts sight conservation campaigns.

A temporary Lions club recruiting headquarters and eye bank information center is being established in the old Craven hardware store. Members of the local club will be on hand to explain this program and accept applications from donors as well as membership in the club.
