Nebraska's Commission of Education, Dr. Freeman Decker, says interest in school reorganization is picking up. There is more interest evidenced now than ever before in the history of the state." Dr. Decker said.

Another thing which is helping redistricting, he said, is a new attitude toward school bus transportation of children.

Those who used to be alraid of it now think it is one of the finest things that have happened, he said.

Forty miles, 100 miles or even 500 miles is no longer protection, at least not the degree of protection it once indicated. Local planning could mean a great deal to residents of Wayne and the county.

The Herald is preparing a series of articles on measures Wayne c'tizens can take for their own protection.

We feel the civil defense work in Wayne can stand more local effort. The National Guard unit here is integrated in a civil defense plan and undoubtedly can be a great aid, if given a citizens group with which to work.

We hope our readers can find time to read a little about the measures that might save their lives and the lives of their families.




