Parents of Retarded Child 'Need to Give Cooperation'

Parental cooperation is one of the biggest needs in the Wayne County program to develop a school for retarded children, said Mrs. Robert L. Jones.

Mrs. Jones, whose own son, Bruce, attends Martin Luther home for trainable children, Beatrice, noted that "too many parents refuse to face the fact their child is retarded."

"The parents must forget their own pride," she said, "and do what is best for the child."

Although Bruce will remain in Beatrice, Mrs. Jones views the plans being made in Wayne with enthusiasm. "These children deserve their share of the education tax dollar and until now it has been inaccessible," she said.

Wayne County Commissioners, in a special meeting last week voted \$3,000 from unused county funds towards establishment of a school for trainable children. Under LB 411 passed during the last session of the Legislature, this amount may be matched by state funds.

The special school is expected to help overcome other problems in the development of the trainable child.

"It will avoid the temper tantrums which occur when the retarded child is forced to compete with children beyond his level, and as he learns at his own speed, he will develop coordination through music, sports and crafts.

"This will take a teacher with a lot of patience, dedication and special training," Mrs. Jones said, "but I think we are just beginning to find what can be done with these children and it may be surprising."

The community can also help, she explained, by teaching their children, not to tease the retarded child, and parents can help by not being "overprotective."

Wayne Baby Dies Of Gasoline Burns

Sandra Maly, 11-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Maly, who was burned Thursday night, died Friday afternoon in a Sioux City hospital. The body was returned to Wayne to the Wittke funeral home. Graveside services were held Monday with Rev. William Kleffman officiating.

The child suffered severe burns when a gasoline container on a porch at the home burst into flames. She was taken to the hospital by Fireman John Thiel.

Sandra suffered second degree burns on the head and first degree burns over the chest, abdomen and extremities.

Maly arrived home Thursday evening with gasoline for his power lawnmower. He left the can of gasoline on the back porch of the home near a water heater. When the heater started up, a spark apparently ignited the gasoline. The girl was standing near the container.

There was little damage to the house.

Sandra Lee Ann Maly, daughter of Cissy and James E. Maly, Wayne, was born Sept. 9, 1960 in O'Neill.

The course includes such subjects as rifle marksmanship, first aid, military justice and conservation of military supplies.

Council Approves Contract For Standpipe Construction

A contract of \$68,850 was awarded to the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Co. for the construction of a new water standpipe near the cemetery.

The tower has a capacity of 750,000 gallons which will give the city a greater supply of water in case of emergency and also increase water pressure.

The unit will be 38 feet in diameter and 90 feet high. The top most part of the standpipe will be nearly 100 feet tall.

Also bidding on the unit were the Graver Tank and Manufacturing Co. with a bid of \$70,941 and the Chicago Bridge and Iron Co. with a bid of \$74,880.

Construction will start this fall. Neely and Askwith, Tilden, was low bidder on the materials for connecting the new standpipe to the present distribution system. Their bid was \$13,987.80.

Other bidders were Riser Hardware, Wisner, \$14,688 and L. E. Ball, Norfolk, \$16,695.

A major item in the second bid was an altitude valve which will be installed in the old water tank. This will shut off the flow of water into the old tank when it is full and allow the new tank to fill then.

The council is also studying needed improvements to the swimming pool such as repair to the deck. Several minor repairs have resulted from swimmers stumbling on the rough edges of pool.

Also under consideration are plans for the fire station. At Tuesday's meeting the fire officers recommended the station stay where it is and improvements be made to facilitate easier removal of trucks and for future growth. The council had discussed moving the station to city property south of the railroad tracks.

The council also received the following building statements: Walter Ulrich, enclosure 10 x 20 front porch on residence, \$35; Erving Doring, addition to basement, \$1,000; Whitney Elevator, construct grain storage unit, \$9,000; Albert Bichel, construct residence, east half of lot 12, Block 3, east add., \$12,000.

Approval was given to a survey of the storm sewer situation in the northwest corner of Wayne.

Wayne Chosen as Civil Defense Training Center

Towns selected for the program were chosen on their accessibility to a large number of towns. Teachers in any of the towns in the training site are eligible to take the course.

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Boy Scout Troop Began in Presbyterian Sunday School

By Janene Reed

Thirty-nine years ago the first Boy Scout troop of Wayne was registered nationally. After a year's work, a dozen boys officially became scouts Jan. 1, 1922 under the direction of the first Wayne scoutmaster, A. F. Gulliver. Before that W. R. Ellis had instructed a group of boys in the principles of scouting but they had not been registered.

The first boys to become interested were in Mr. Gulliver's Sunday school class at Presbyterian church, boys of 12 and 13 years of age. The troop was organized under the Presbyterian church and for a number of years met at Wayne college gym. The group grew from Wayne Prep boys to those from both schools and from the entire area. The troop number was changed from No. 1 to troop number 174.

In 1925 K. N. Parke started troop 175 under the auspices of the Methodist church. The group, including several religions and both schools, equaled 42 boys. Two years later Mr. Parke gave up the scoutmaster's position and since then has worked both in the district and locally. At the present he and Mr. Gulliver are merit badge counselors.

Since the beginning of the two troops the scouting program in Wayne has flourished so that now officers include: in post number 174, Dick Manley, scoutmaster; Dick Kern, troop committee chairman; and Douglas Spencer, packmaster. In post number 175 Bob Carhart is scoutmaster. Cal Comstock, troop committee chairman, and Lyle Seymour is packmaster. There is also an explorer post, number 174.

Both troop number 174 and 175 have parents' auxiliary and officers include in the former: Mrs. Arnold Zaeh, president; Mrs. John Barrie, vice president; and Mrs. Warren B. Olson, secretary-treasurer. In number 175: Lyle Seymour, president; Dallas Wendt, treasurer; Darold Kraemaer, secretary.

Merit badge counselors include: crafts and collections, Dr. Lyla Way; outdoor sports, Fred Dale; personal development, Walter Peterson; plant cultivation, A. E. Gulliver; public service, K. N. Parke; transportation, O. K. Brandstetter; animal husbandry, Dr. Loyd Jensen; aquatics, Carl Elmereyer; arts, Fred Vorce; building, Anton Netherda; camp craft, William Eynon; citizenship, Rev. O. Over Prætt; communications, William Eynon; and conservation, Arnold Marr.

Nationally the Boy Scouts were incorporated Feb. 8, 1910 and the story of the beginning is an interesting one. William D. Boyce, a Chicago publisher and traveler, was helped across a London, England street by an English boy. When Mr. Boyce offered the boy money for his trouble, the boy replied, "No sir, I am a scout. Scouts do not accept tips for courtesies."

Mr. Boyce immediately became interested in the scout movement and a year later was responsible for the beginning in the United States. Scouting is divided into regions, then into councils, into districts, and finally into individual towns. Wayne is in the Covered Wagon council number 326 which includes all but one north of the Platte River. There is one other full council and a third council also includes part of Wyoming. The Diamond Dick district includes eight counties, with 31 cub packs, 34 scout troops and three posts. There is a full-time executive in each

council, in Wayne's case Donald Suedmeier, Norfolk, is the district executive.

There are seven classes of scouts. Starting at the beginning is the tenderfoot, then second class, first class, star, life, eagle and eagle palm. Before a boy gets a badge he must do a certain amount of work to earn him right to his new promotion. The boys receive training in the following areas: character, recreational, physical, educational, and citizenship. Boys soon learn to help others; to do good, turns, to live better. Those who become eagle scouts often find occupations for later life; Mr. Gulliver cited one case of one boy who became a mining engineer after training begun in scouting.

Both K. N. Parke and A. F. Gulliver modestly admitted to receiving the Silver Bear award which is given only to the most competent men who have worked in scouting for a long time. Mr. Gulliver also has a 25-year pin for his achievements.

Donations given through Wayne community chest have been responsible for organization, supervision and training in this area, and has certainly been appreciated by the Boy Scout organization.

Mr. Parke said that "if more fathers gave more time to boys' organizations such as scouts, more of the delinquency problems could be saved easier." The scouting problem is one of fine worth as anyone who has participated will devotedly state.

It began with six sections in township 26. In 1889 the two north sections were detached to District 59.

Members of the first school board were Charles Kosteron, J. H. Mitchell and Fred Utecht. Present school board members are Herbert Barelman, Marvin Brudigan and Arnold Hamner.

All of the first pupils are now deceased. Enrollment for 1890 was 30 pupils. About half of these now live in the Wayne-Wakefield area. Five family names are still on the roll.

The first school opened for two sessions — months — July and August. Nettie Seehler was the first teacher. Hatie Russell taught the four winter months beginning in November.

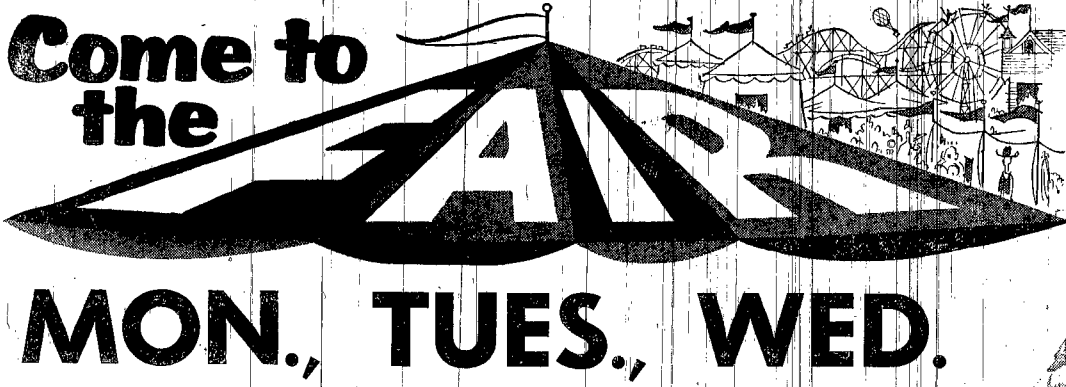

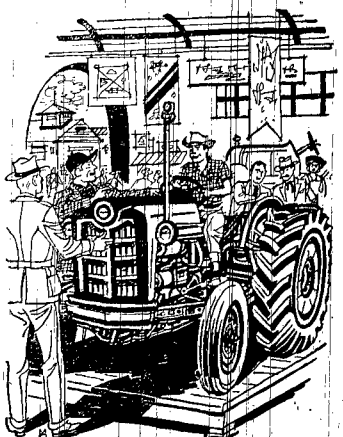

Civil Defense Preparation Necessary Responsibility

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles on Civil Defense as it affects Wayne and surrounding area.)

What is Civil Defense? More than anything else, it is a responsibility. The responsibility of every citizen and of all governments, Federal, state and local, to prepare for a day which all hope will never come.

Today it is assumed ordinary weapons will be predominantly nuclear. The use of biological and chemical agents is also possible. Today weapons can be delivered by manned airplanes with a warning time of from zero to three hours. Within the next few years, the delivery is expected to be predominantly missile, cutting the warning time to half an hour or less.

People and property too close to a nuclear burst would be destroyed immediately by blast, heat or irradiation.

If the nuclear burst is at or near the surface of the earth, the secondary and widespread threat will be radio-active fallout. As this accumulates, the radiation may become so intense as to cause serious or fatal illness to people and to livestock that are not shielded. It can contaminate industrial structures as well as crops.

Studies of possible attack patterns and their probable effects indicate a large majority of the total population can survive, however, if the necessary precautions are taken beforehand by individual and government.

The preparations, which will be discussed more fully in other articles in this series, are basically:

Warning of Attack: The objective is to develop a system in cooperation with the North American Air Defense Command whereby all people will receive warning simultaneously.

Community Survival Plans: These are federally financed and supervised plans designed to enable the population to survive the initial blast and maintain existence during the emergency.

Evacuation and Shelter: This development developed by local authorities. Areas near target cities will be expected to evacuate plans for dispersal to prepared reception areas. If time and conditions do not permit evacuation, full advantage will be taken of existing shelter.

Communications: During the emergency regular broadcasting will be suspended and the special "Continuity" broadcast at 640 and 1240 on the AM dial will give information and direction.

Continuity of Government: This will include establishment of automatic lines of succession for key personnel, provision for safekeeping of essential records and establishment of protected emergency operating centers.

Biological Defense: In any attack the immediate plotting of the wind and location of nuclear bursts will give a general indication of where to look for dangerous fallout.

Emergency and Services: Governments must maintain law and order, conduct rescue operations, provide medical care, fire protection, clear debris, decontaminate areas and establishments, repair essential public facilities and utilities and take immediate emergency control of resources such as food, water, transportation and fuel.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Protection Time

We are wondering just how many of our readers have their entire family protected by polio shots. We shudder to think about any family that is completely unprotected.

But perhaps a few parents do not realize how unfair they are being to their children not to have them vaccinated. When we hear of an adult being stricken with polio, we know that is their own fault. But when a child becomes afflicted it is a different matter. They cannot take themselves to a doctor for the need of protection.

This is plain parent neglect. At the present time there is some controversy over the relative merits of polio vaccines. Whether one is better than the other is for the scientists to decide. We hope the present talk will not discourage parents from seeing that their families are given a full series of Salk shots immediately.

There is only one safe procedure to follow: Don't let technical controversy confuse you. VACCINATE NOW!

It's much more fun to sulk and feel miserable when somebody is with you — usually that poor wretch, your wife.

Prior to the Transportation Act of 1958, railroads were often prohibited from reducing rates on the grounds this might deprive other carriers of business and constitute "unfair and destructive

competitive practices." The Act made certain changes in this arbitrary policy and a result has been to give the users of commercial freight transportation better and economical service in many instances. But now a bill up in Congress could turn back the clock and repeal the constructive advances made by the 1958 Act.

Railroad spokesmen have justly characterized the bill as a "maneuver in price-rigging." They add: "This bill, which is being pushed by powerful self-interest groups, including the leadership of the Teamsters union, would make it all but impossible to reduce freight rates on rail shipments in order to compete with other forms of transportation and would deny the American people the economies of railroad progress."

As a specific example — and this explains the Teamsters' attitude — the bill would make it possible to prohibit "piggybacking" by rail of truck trailers, including those carrying new automobiles. As of now the railroads are getting this business for just one reason — they can move the automobiles at less cost than they can be moved over the highways. In other words, in a competitive situation, the railroads are able to offer a better and more economical service and so got the trade.

The Teamsters were all for competition when the odds were on their side. But, it seems, they are all against it when the pendulum moves in the other direction. This is an example of the wish to have the cake and eat it too — and, if that philosophy prevails, all the consumers and transportation users of this country will be the losers.

Capitol News . . . Civil Defense Preparation Necessary Responsibility

In 10 years Nebraska's highway department has grown into a gigantic business enterprise. In 1950, the department employed 1,863 persons, not including members of the safety patrol, and spent \$20.4 million. Today it has 2,330 employees and will spend an estimated \$71.5 million.

Thus, in one decade, the department boosted its number of employees by 25 percent and increased expenditures more than three times.

It must be noted that this change occurred during a nationwide boom in road building and larger outlays of Federal funds for highways. These figures were used for background by the Advisory State Highway commission before it adopted recommendations designed to improve efficiency of the highway department.

Most of the recommendations put more responsibility in the hands of division engineers and place more emphasis on advance planning for construction.

State Engineer John Hossack called the recommendations "forward looking." They grew from a study of the department by a Colorado highway official, upon the direction of Gov. Frank Morrison.

Morrison also believes the department should have an "expediter" who can find roadblocks in department operations and break them.

Board of Control

Gov. Frank Morrison has moved swiftly to establish an advisory board to aid him in operation of state institutions, beginning Jan. 1. That's the date the current three-member Board of Control goes out of operation and is replaced by a director of institutions and a director of public welfare.

The men will be directly responsible to the governor, who will get advice from his advisory board.

Named to the board by the governor were James Murphy, Omaha, and Arthur Carmody, Trenton, currently new members of the Board of Control, Kara Lee Eikleberry and Donald Duncan, Lincoln, and John Humpal, Omaha.

Mrs. Eikleberry is a housewife. Duncan is assistant administrator of St. Elizabeth hospital, Lincoln, and Humpal is chairman of the trustees of the Omaha Central Labor Union.

Carmody is a former state senator and chairman of the Legislature's budget committee. Murphy is an Omaha attorney and realtor.

Under the bill passed by the recent Legislature, the director of institutions will be paid \$11,000 per year and the director of welfare, \$10,000.

Advisory committee members will get \$20 per day and expenses but this total must not exceed \$2,500 per year.

Mrs. Eikleberry will serve for three years, Murphy two years, Humpal one year, Duncan five years and Carmody four. Carmody and Duncan are Republicans, the others Democrats.

Biscuit

It's not exactly comparable to a T-bone steak — but it will sustain life. That's a brief description of a survival biscuit developed through Nebraska's agricultural research program. It contains 80 percent wheat, 1 percent dry, edible beans, nonfat dry milk, sugar and shortening.

A package of 20 of the small cubes contains 1,300 calories and is enough for one day's food supply in case of national disaster.

The biscuits can be stored for periods up to two years. One package costs about 40¢. It would provide the needed nourishment to survive after a nuclear attack.

Under experimentation are a meat bar and a dessert bar. Pearl E. Finigan, state agriculture director, says the new biscuit is compact, can be easily stored and transported, is a stable ration with a long shelf life, edible for all age groups and made from grain now in adequate supply — wheat. A new modern baking company can manufacture the bite-size product, the director says.

Gov. Frank Morrison named Finigan to head a delegation of Nebraska officials to approach Washington officials to sell the idea.

The cereal biscuit was developed through funds made available by the state's special property tax levy to foster agricultural research.

Parolees Parolees from Nebraska penal institutions did well financially during the first seven months of this year. That's the report from the State Pardon Board. It said total earnings for the 109 parolees were \$91,373.

Of those who have served their time in the penal institutions and are now working in Nebraska, 64 are from the men's reformatory, 40 from the penitentiary and five from the women's reformatory. The state also supervises about 300 parolees from Nebraska who now live in other states. They were not included in the financial survey.

Thinking OUT LOUD

This past week I replied to a letter of recommendation for a college graduate who had applied for a teaching post. The questionnaire asked the usual questions to give some indication about the ability of this person.

But one of the questions was this: "What is the applicant's ability of getting along with others?"

This question bothered me because the applicant rated poorly, but it bothered me because I suddenly was made to wonder what kind of society is it where we want everyone to "get along?"

Are we right in thinking that the highest good we can say about another person is that they get along with others?

Some have already answered this in the affirmative by the entire manner in which they live, and the way they make their choices. They believe that the worst thing which can happen is to be unable to "get along."

But aren't there times when what is needed is a person who doesn't "get along?"

History is painted bright and glowing with the lives of people who have not been able to get along. Harriet Beecher Stowe could not "get along," and from her pen flowed the enlightening story of the cruelty of slavery. Her portrait of "Uncle Tom" brought many to see that slavery must be ended.

Walter Rauschenbush could not "get along" and from his passion for the 14th or 15th man in the Church rose to fight for better working conditions and a fair share for the laborers.

Jane Addams grew dissatisfied with what she found in the slums of Chicago, and from her inability to adjust it came forth Hull House and a movement across the country to give the city's poor a chance to rise.

But these are history. Have we passed the time when it pays-off to rebel against the status quo? Have we reached a period in history where the call for man is to adjust?

Some may believe this to be the case. Some may be afraid to choose another course than the majority one, for it may mean their livelihood. What would have happened to the application I was asked to fill out if I had answered,

"This applicant does not like to 'get along'?"

Perhaps this is time for us to stop and ponder. Is it a virtue to say "He gets along with others?"

County Agent's Column

State Fair Carcass Contest A beef carcass evaluation contest will be added to the 41st program at the 1961 Nebraska state fair. The contest will be designed as an educational activity in which awards will be made according to carcass value per pound (dressed weight) according to J. A. Williams, University of Nebraska Extension animal husbandman. A total of \$1,000 will be awarded to exhibitors of purple ribbon steers in the contest, not to exceed \$250 per exhibitor. It is hoped additional award money can be obtained to give exhibitors of blue ribbon steers.

Each county in the state may enter two 411 market beef steers. Steers may be selected at county fairs, or however desired. The animals must weigh between 900 and 1,050 lbs. live weight at the State fair grounds. The 411 club members who own the steers must be 12 years old.

All entries will be evaluated on foot, the morning of Sept. 8 for educational purposes only. There will be judging contests for adults and 4-11 club members. Vince Arhaud, assistant professor of animal husbandry at the University, will discuss the carcass class entries.

All steers will be slaughtered that afternoon and the carcasses will be judged Sept. 4. Judging will be based on actual measurements of the retail cuts and the official grade will be made by a U. S. Department of Agriculture grader.

Purple ribbon carcasses will be displayed Sept. 5 at the State fair meat display, along with carcass information and a picture of the live animal.

Lime Lacks Cuts Profits Lack of lime is a major factor in cutting crop profits and yields on thousands of farms in Nebraska, according to Dr. M. D. Weldon, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

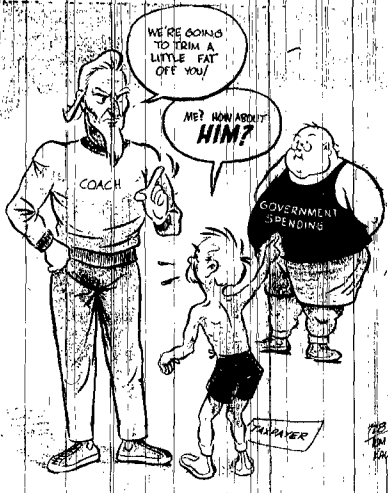
"Bigger crop yields mean a steadily increasing need for lime. Nebraska farmers probably should apply 10 times as much lime as they are now using. Besides neutralizing soil acidity, lime provides calcium and magnesium for crops," Weldon reports. "Lime makes phosphate more available in the soil. It speeds up decay of crop residues and production of nitrate from them."

Liming encourages greater production of vegetation and organic matter. And this, in turn, improves soil structure. Roots grow better in such soil. Lime also promotes the growth and activity of soil bacteria which are essential for nitrogen fixation and legume crop production.

Weldon points out that one of lime's major benefits is in helping increase crop yields. In many tests by the University, application of lime increased alfalfa yields a 100 or 200 per acre per year for a period of three or four years. Crops grown after the alfalfa was plowed up were more productive and profitable.

Sweet clover is another crop that is especially responsive to liming. On many Nebraska farms sweet clover usually fails to make a good stand unless lime is applied. Clovers after limed sweet clover yielded 30 bushels more per acre than after sweet clover without lime.

Before applying lime it is important to get soil samples tested to find out whether lime is needed and how much. About one-fourth of the soil samples tested from Wayne county show a shortage of lime. Most of our partially eroded sloping lands are very

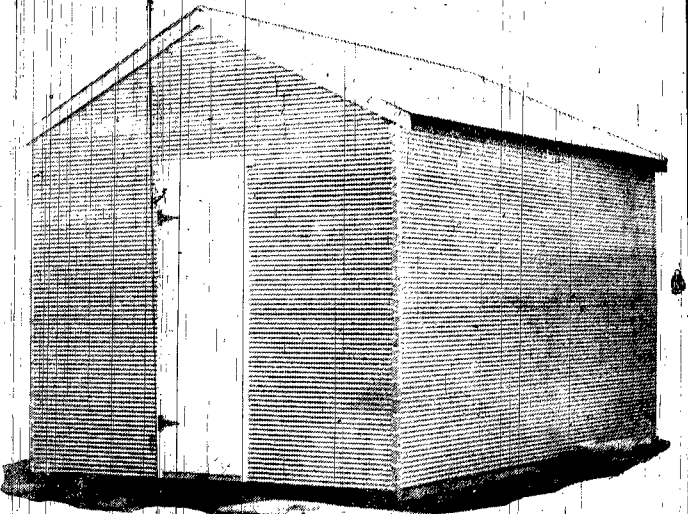

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

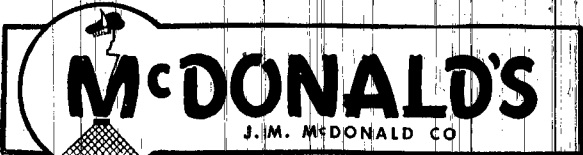
