Wayne Prep Schedule Will Stagger Dismissal Times

Wayne Prep will have a daily schedule of classes this year to accommodate its expanded curriculum and stagger dismissal time.

The school day will be longer in all grades, including kindergarten. Classes will begin at 9 a.m. as before for elementary grades, kindergarten through sixth. Kindergarteners will be dismissed at 11:30, half an hour later than formerly. The afternoon kindergarten session will be from 1:30 to 4 p.m.

First graders will have a special schedule, meeting in the morning only from 9 to 11:45 during the first week. The second week they will add a partial afternoon period from 12:45 to 2 p.m. In the third week it will be from 12:45 to 3 p.m., and the fourth week until 3:30 p.m.

Second graders will go from 9:15 to 12:45, 3:30 to 5 p.m. Third through sixth grade students will attend from 9 a.m. until 12 noon and 12:45 to 3:45 p.m.

Junior and senior high students will begin classes at 8:15 a.m. The opening session is a 20-minute home room period for guidance activities, class business or study. The first of eight 50-minute periods begins at 8:35 a.m.

Lunch hour has been shortened to 35 minutes, from 12:10 to 12:45.

Academic subjects will fill the first six periods. The seventh will be reserved for band and orchestra on alternate days, newspaper and yearbook staff work and study hall. The eighth period will have chorus alternating with physical education.

Students not involved in music, journalism and physical education activities will be permitted to leave at 2:30 p.m. The majority of students will not be finished until 4:20.

Former Concord Residents' Girl Shot and Killed

The nine-year-old daughter of former Concord residents, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Peterson, was killed Tuesday night by a shotgun blast as she sat on her front porch at 5106 Pinkney St., Omaha.

Beverly Peterson died almost instantly, police said. She was hit in the face and fell backward to the porch. Two sisters, Connie, 14, and Charlotte, 16, were not hurt by the blast according to Joan Morton, 5103 Evans St., Omaha, who arrived on the scene shortly after the shooting.

The shot was apparently fired from an automobile which later overturned and caught fire and burned. Police said the driver of the car was injured.

Survivors include her parents and two sisters, her grandmother, Mrs. Ernest Peterson, Humboldt, Ia., and numerous other relatives in Concord, Wakefield and Pilger. Both her father, who is WOW Public Director, and her mother, the former Fern Erwin, grew up near Concord. Her grandfather, Ernest Peterson, farmed for many years in the Concord vicinity.

Broad Program For 1962 Wheat

Growers in commercial wheat-producing areas will have a broad program available for their next wheat crop as a result of farmer approval of marketing quotas, according to Lloyd Morris, ASCS chairman.

Preliminary returns from the Aug. 24 referendum showed 33 percent of Wayne county wheat growers voted approval of marketing quotas for the 1962 wheat crop. This compares with 79.7 percent approval on the statewide level and 79.4 percent approval on the national level.

Since this is more than the necessary two-thirds approval, the 1962 wheat program provided by recently enacted legislation will be in effect. It will include:

Price support at a minimum national average of \$2 a bushel available to those producers in the commercial wheat area who comply with their 1962 farm wheat allotment and who participated in the special wheat stabilization program.

Payments to wheat growers who cooperate in the special 1962 wheat stabilization program for diverting a specified portion of their wheat acreage to conservation uses.

Farm wheat allotments for 1962 which are 10 percent lower than they would have been under previous legislation.

Marketing quota penalties at 65 percent of the May 1, 1962 parity price, on "excess" wheat produced on farms where the farm wheat allotment is not complied with.

These farmers will compete with other county winners for an area award. They will be honored at a special program and banquet at the Sioux City auditorium in November.

Judging was based on completeness of the conservation plan, quality of work and the general appearance and livestock program.

Marvin Harms was selected as progress winner. This winner is judged on the amount of conservation applied to a farm in one year. Harms has terraced his farm, shipped a "seeded" waterway, seeded severely eroded soil to grass and established an evergreen farm-side windbreak.

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Council Picks Sewage Plan, Approves Fire House Work

City council approval was given Tuesday night for a lagoontype sewage disposal system for Wayne. Members of the council had investigated other types of disposal systems, and decided the lagoon would be the most practical.

The city engineer also recommended the lagoon system whose capacity could be easily expanded in future years, if needed. He and some members of the council made a trip to Kansas City last week to investigate operation systems. The engineer said it would be possible to add one of these systems to the lagoon at a later date, if necessary, but felt they were not perfected as much as they could be at this time.

About 87 acres of land will be needed for the lagoon and plans now call for the system to be located southeast of Wayne, near the south bank of Logan creek.

Parking, long a complaint of residents around the Wayne State campus, reared its head again Tuesday. At a previous meeting, the council had agreed on a more uniform parking code for streets near the college, hoping to make the streets easier to manage, provide less congestion for residents and make the streets safer.

The council proposed that parking be restricted on Nebraska, Logan, Winston and Walnut from ninth to tenth from the hours of midnight to 6 a.m. However, they received a complaint from a resident, stating he thought it better to make Nebraska one-hour parking during the day and allow overnight parking since some of the residents wished to park on the streets.

The council agreed to look into the matter and was given a contract with Wachob Bender corporation to act as fiscal agents for the city in the issuance and purchasing of bonds. The firm has been under contract to the city in this capacity for some time.

Remodeling of the fire hall to provide space for an additional fire truck also received approval. Plans call for construction on the east side of the station, moving the police station closer to Second street to allow a truck to be parked inside in the space presently occupied by the cell block.

The council received notices of construction from the following: Edward Carmen, two residences, at 317 and 622 East Tenth, each valued at \$12,000.

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Reporter Learns 'Sticky' Business is Also Painful

Reporter learns 'sticky' business is also painful. Randolph earns City National Title.

Bees are not only prolific honey producers but are also resentful of intrusion. This reporter was stung five minutes after arriving at the honey processing farm located west of Randolph. At that point a very important fact was stated by Harold Lenhoff, farmer and operator of the plant: when stung by a bee, never pull the stinger out but scrape it off. In pulling out the stinger, one squeezes the small pocket of poison into the skin which immediately develops a hard, swollen core. If the stinger is scraped off the skin, not even soreness will result.

Mr. Lenhoff, who operates out of Randolph and Crofton, is one of the four honey plant operators in that area; the others include Don Caldwell, O'Neill and Stiles; Dwight Dominis, Belden, and Jerry Meyer, Fordyce, Woodrow Miller, Colton, Calif. owns all plants. More honey per person is produced in this area than anywhere in the United States and perhaps that is the reason why signs boast "Randolph, Honey Capital of the Nation."

Honey Business at Randolph Earns City National Title

Mr. Lenhoff handles 2,500 colonies per year which each produce 100 pounds of honey. A colony consists of the queen bee and her helpers, located within one super, or box, containing nine combs. When the supers are brought in from farms that house the apiaries, the honey is sealed within the one frames. An extractor machine slips off the outside seal, leaving the honey open. An extractor machine (takes the honey out of the combs, leaving the empty combs. Any capping (wax) that's left in the honey is put into a spin dryer and the remaining honey is squeezed out.

Finished honey goes into a 500-gallon tank and from there into large storage tanks, two of which hold 200 five-gallon cans and one which holds 100 five-gallon cans. Also used for storage are many 55-gallon drums in the storage area. From the large tanks the honey is drained into five-gallon cans for distribution all over the United States. Distributors sell to packers and the latter put the honey in the small jars seen on grocery shelves.

Careful use is made of all residue that is left in the combs. The wax is dumped into a large tank and melted down by steam heat. The melted wax is poured into beehives.

College Students Orientation Set

Students will begin flocking back to Wayne State's campus as freshmen and new students Monday for the first of many orientation sessions.

Upperclassmen will begin arriving Tuesday. Registration will be completed Thursday and classes start Friday.

Students will find a number of new things — 18 newcomers to the faculty and many minor changes in the campus. Some students will pioneer a new venture at WSTC — a co-educational dormitory. Berry Hall will have women students in the east wing, men in the west wing. Several colleges in the country have reported excellent results from the mixed dormitory plan — with better scholarship, behavior and dress.

Physically, the campus will look the best in years after a summer of vigorous tree trimming and sidewalk laying.

The present dining facilities have been expanded pending completion of the new Student Center, which will house a cafeteria. Some students will eat in what has been used as the banquet hall and grill. Later in the year the cafeteria, grill and other student union facilities will move to the new structure southeast of Pile Hall.





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

(Continued from Page 1) years from which the tops have been removed. After setting overnight, solid beeswax is formed. This is sent to New York and Chicago where manufacturers use it in candlemaking, cosmetics, and starting new foundations (cones) for frames. Any wax that does not melt down is put into a hydraulic pressure jack to be pressed down. The remains from this process are sent to a special plant in California where even more wax is squeezed out. The large building in which most of the processing takes place is 36 x 80 feet and has hot water piped in from a heating plant nearby. The hot water pipes keep the honey warm and easy to pour. Bees only work in the summer, of course, and are dormant in the winter. Each colony is given one super on which to keep alive through the winter. Mr. Lenhoff's processing operation runs from the first of March to the last of October. During the winter Mr. Lenhoff keeps busy with supply work, repainting and repairing. Last winter he made 9,000 new frames alone. Some of the older frames have been used as many as 20 years. Those who assist Mr. Lenhoff in operations in the summer include Gary Kruger, Swan Landberg and Duane Rudebusch, and this year his son, Bradley, 12, has helped. During winters many of the professional plant helpers work in California to round out a full year of employment.

Wayne Hospital Visitors Greeted by Mrs. Johnson

A visitor entering Wayne City hospital would be greeted by Mrs. J. R. Johnson, office manager, or Don Easley, hospital administrator. These folks are only two of the 20 employees at the 23-bed hospital.

The imposing brick building at 306 Pearl street was not always property of the town but originally was built by Dr. Walter Bentback in 1892 for personal use for his patients.

The original option on the hospital was taken by the city of Wayne on Mar. 29, 1938 and the first meeting of the hospital board of directors was Apr. 10, 1938. By June the city had exercised its option for Dr. Walter Bentback. Dr. Bentback's new clinic building was ready for occupancy Apr. 19, 1950 and from that time the hospital has been operated by the city of Wayne.

Bond issue for the building, land, equipment and stock on hand totaled \$550,000. Authorities contemplated that if the city were to build a comparable hospital, it would pay approximately five times this figure.

Average annual expenditures of the hospital amount to \$95,000 and this includes the payroll which is two thirds of that amount, consistent with the national average. Annual income from patients is \$85,000 and mill levies take care of the deficit. Fifty percent of the accounts receivable are covered by a third party payment. Average occupancy is 30 percent plus.

Present hospital directors include Mrs. William Schude, president; Henry Ley, vice president; Mrs. Robert Casper, secretary, and John Carhart and Carl Nuss.

These persons are responsible to the city council and mayor for the operation of the hospital. Administrator Easley is directly responsible to the board of directors.

Medical staff members of the hospital are Walter Bentback, M.D., Robert Bentback, M.D.,

George John, M.D., R. M. Matson, M.D., R. P. Carroll, M.D., and W. E. Reynolds, M.D., the last two of Laurel. Dr. Walter Bentback is president and chief of staff. Dr. John is vice president and Dr. Matson, secretary-treasurer.

Any other doctor wishing to use the facilities of Wayne City hospital must contact one of the staff doctors. Pathology service for the hospital is rendered by Physicians Laboratories, Omaha.

Easley came to head the hospital from Iowa Lutheran Hospital, Des Moines, Ia., where he was employed for a period of five years.

His duties, besides administrative, include being in charge of the laboratory and x-ray departments of the hospital. He is also in charge of purchasing the hospital supplies and heading the staff of personal.

Mrs. J. R. Johnson manages the office and is head bookkeeper. Mrs. Harry E. Fisher, R.N., is supervisor of nurses. Other full-time nursing employees are Mrs. Wayne Hasek, R.N., Mrs. Harold Wade, R.N., Winside, Mrs. Robert Johnson, R.N., Mrs. Ivan Freidilton, R.N., Mrs. Harry Manning, R.N., and Mrs. Kendall Martin, R.N.; Laurel, Mrs. James Thompson, Carroll, is a licensed practical nurse. Nurses' aides employed include Mrs. Roy Daniels, Mrs. Lillian Edwards, Mrs. Everett Hank, Mrs. Fremont Lubberstedt, Mrs. C. C. Powers, Mrs. Karen Chedderquist, Mrs. Irene Hamilton, Mrs. Harold Shell and Mrs. Martin Koch, Dixon, Mrs. Powers has worked at the hospital since it opened in 1932.

Dr. Bentback added the top floor in 1947 so that now there are three floors and the basement. There are 13 rooms on both the third and fourth floors, consisting of a total of 19 private rooms and two semi-private wards. The second or main floor contains an operating room, emergency room, a new delivery room, two scrub rooms, a waiting room, laboratory, x-ray rooms, the bookkeeping office and the administrator's office. The basement and first floor provides space for the kitchen, dining room, laundry, drug room and space for storage of oxygen, solutions, dressings and various other hospital supplies.

The hospital serves Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Dakota, Thurston, Pierce, Madison, Stanton and Cuming counties.

Wayne hospital auxiliary is responsible for the new delivery room. Mrs. Robert Casper is president of the auxiliary which was organized slightly over a year ago. At this time the group has donated \$1,500 for the specific purpose of delivery room, ambulance entrance, now under construction, and nursery.

Wayne City hospital is a member in good standing of Nebraska State Hospital association and in State District No. 2 of the hospital association.

Easley states that the hospital is "dedicated toward filling the patients' needs to the best of its ability, attempting always to make the patients as comfortable

as possible." He feels the medical staff of doctors is excellent, finds the hospital personnel well qualified to perform their duties, and foresees a happy relationship with the community for the Wayne hospital.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Enforcement Most Needed

Wayne's city council is currently engaged in the preparation of a new municipal code, a much needed revision of all the city's statutes and ordinances. The new code has been in preparation about a year and is undergoing thorough study by city officials.

We would be the first to admit there are many sections of the old code which badly needed revision, having been outmoded by modern-day activities. But there are many sections of the old code which have not suffered from age. They were instituted by the 1942 council or earlier for perfectly good reasons. These reasons still hold true, but the code sections are ignored completely through lack of enforcement.

One such section is that which forbids peddling within the fire district, which covers all of the downtown business area. This section was probably devised by the earlier councils as a means of eliminating traffic and fire hazards. It also served as an effective means of controlling itinerant peddlers who are in direct competition with local merchants.

Through lack of enforcement, this section is now violated flagrantly. One need travel only a few steps from the city offices to find a violator almost daily. Local businessmen are paying taxes for the continued progress of our fine city. It is a pity they must also pay taxes to have parking lots on the city streets for their direct competitors.

Shop in Wayne

A small item which appeared in one of Sunday's newspapers should have come as a great shock to many Wayne housewives, who apparently are much more shrewd in their grocery buying than Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

The item told of the purchase of 1,050,000 pounds of young chickens for use in the national school lunch program.

The total cost was slightly over \$300,000.

The shocking particular in the item was the prices paid for the chickens. While Wayne housewives can go to virtually any local grocery or supermarket and secure a single chicken for 25 cents a pound or less, the Department of Agriculture paid prices ranging from 27.88 to 31.96 cents a pound.

We suggest Sec. Freeman add a couple of local housewives to his buying staff, when he does the government's grocery buying.

What we all want is loud praise for a good job and silent sympathy for a poor job.

Biggest Job for Agriculture

At more or less regular intervals we hear talk — apparently of a tried balloon nature — to the effect that wage and price controls may be in the offing. And existing and proposed agricultural programs impose or would impose on American farmers stricter and more unpredictable controls than any they have ever experienced.

So something said in a recent speech by H. R. Davison, American Meat Institute president, is of real importance now. In his words: "The livestock and meat industry has, during the last 20 years, done the biggest job for American agriculture. All the talk about government, all the talk about quotas, all the talk about production controls, etc., are meaningless in contrast to the fact that the biggest increase farmers have had during this period has been the market for meat food products. It has accounted for an increased feed grain outlet of 75 percent in 20 years of harvested forage — 60 percent of pasture and range forage — 30 percent of production of beef, for example, has almost doubled in this period."

And during those years, never forget, meat has moved in the free market — the market which is ruled, not by fallible human judgment, but by the natural law of supply and demand. The consumers have benefited right along with the farmers.

use in time of natural disaster or enemy attack positioned in various locations in the state.

Deputy Civil Defense Director Austin Bacon said the beds are part of mobile hospitals, now located at Blair, Fremont, Wahoo, Beatrice, Superior, York, Grand Island, Norfolk, Hastings, West Point, Scottsbluff and Schuyler.

Four new hospital units will be established at North Platte, Broken Bow, St. Paul and Kearney. Each unit includes 200 beds, three surgical units, an operating table, three X-ray machines and other equipment found in field hospitals.

The Council recognized the need for agricultural research and urged its standing committee on midwestern agriculture to study the advisability of the midwestern states joining in an agricultural research program.

Kearney School

The state's Boys' Training school, Kearney, had 42 percent fewer escapes in the past year under Supt. William Ettinger, the institution's annual report showed.

There has been criticism in the past of escapes from the institution, a minimum custody one. From June 30, 1959 to June 30, 1961 the report said, the number of boys on parole increased from 166 to 195 but the number of those returning after having been released from the institution climbed six percent.

Expansion of the school's parole officer staff to three persons has been authorized by the Board of Control. Ettinger lists main needs of the school as a swimming pool and a new administration building.

Many opinions have been asked of the attorney general in past years about whether mail routes money and materials could be used on regular county roads.


But the latest is whether materials purchased with county road funds could be used on mail routes.

County Agent's Column

Green chop corn ranks high as feed for dairy cows and can be harvested from the time the crop is in the milk stage until frost causes the plants to lose leaves.

Corn cut at the milk stage will produce about one-third less dry matter than corn cut at maturity. However, the immature corn will be more nutritious than mature corn so the actual loss in feeding value may be less than one-third. Green chop corn is the quite high in moisture and it would seem like some common sense to make some type of dry roughage available when this type of feed is being fed.

It is true that immature corn will be somewhat higher in nutrients than the more mature crop; however, this has not been a problem where the crop is growing normally and fields are relatively weed-free. It is not a good practice to turn cattle loose in fields of immature corn. They tend to over-eat under these conditions and digestive disorders are quite common.

Sheep Scabies Eradication

Substantial progress is being made toward Nebraska becoming a scabies-free state, which should boost the state's sheep industry.

The state federal program designed to eradicate the contagious skin disease got under way in Nebraska early this year. One of the first steps in the program — inspection of all sheep flocks in the state will be completed soon. Any infected flocks will be quarantined and must be treated at the expense of the owner.

Twenty-six counties in eastern Nebraska remain to be covered by Federal and state veterinary inspection teams. It is anticipated that by the end of the year, all




