

Hold Annual 4-H Calf Sale At Sale Barn Next Thursday

The annual Chamber of Commerce sponsored calf sale will be held at the Wayne Sale Barn Thursday, Sept. 14, at 8:30 p.m. About 70 entries are expected compared to 39 last year.

The animals must be stabled by 2 p.m. and they will be judged to determine sale order. A bid will be placed on each animal by a packer buyer. Local businessmen may purchase an animal outright or place a premium over the packer bid.

All 4-H members are eligible to attend although each member may sell only one animal. An advance entry is required.

Karen Willey, showed the grand champion of last year's sale, a 920 pound Angus steer which sold to El Rancho for \$2100 per hundred weight. The top heifer was sold by Terry Janke, Winside to State National bank for \$28. The 39 animals together averaged \$27.26.

James Troutman, Winside, Orville Lake, Pilsner, Ivan Nixon, Wakefield, and Tom Habes will be auctioneers.

City School Enrolls 16 Additional Pupils

Enrollment at Wayne and Carroll city schools increased by 16 pupils this year, for a total of 644 compared to 628 last year.

Approve Work for Elementary School

Wayne board of education Tuesday night accepted the recommendation of Cecil Martin, architect, and Harold Christensen, contractor, regarding a drainage problem around the Wayne elementary school. The board decided to have a grass swale made to carry most of the water away from the school.

Also up for discussion by the board was a request to start a special education program for slow students. Legislation has provided for additional payment for this type of classroom and Wayne county commissioners have set aside \$3000 for the education of these youngsters. The board, in its discussion, wondered if the county funds would be available each year following the initiating of the program. The board is studying the request further.

William Vahlkamp has been hired as a permanent member of the custodial staff at a salary of \$4,000 per year. This is the same salary as the man he replaced.

The board granted the request of Les Ellis for his salary of \$50 for the next year for serving as school district treasurer. When a city treasurer is assigned as school district treasurer, he can receive 20 percent of his city salary for the district work. In Wayne the city treasurer receives \$250 per year.

Shed Destroyed At Anderson Farm

A shed was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon at the Wallace Anderson farm 6 1/2 miles north and two miles west of Wayne. Men were at the place shelling corn.

Trash burning nearby set fire to the corn husks and they in turn set the building on fire.

Firemen had the blaze under control once, but were unable to save the building when the trash set fire to husks under the building.



All Wayne Teams to Open Football Seasons This Week

The Wayne State football team opens its season at home Saturday night against the team that gave them their worst defeat of the 1960 season. The Wildcats take the field at 7:30 p.m. against Morningside.

The Maroons defeated Wayne 33-0 last year and are reportedly fielding a repeat team of last year.

Coach Gwynn Christensen has not picked his starter yet, but almost any combination of likely starters will average above 200 pounds.

The coaches felt the main problem will be generating a powerful offense.

In the conference, 1960 Champion Peru reportedly has a good supply of replacements for its personnel losses, but Kearney and Hastings, which fled with Wayne for second in the conference, also are missing players who carried much of the load.

Wayne Prep's Panthers are expected to face one of their stiffest tests of the 1961 football season Friday night when they entertain Beemer in the home opener at WSTC's Memorial stadium. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Prep gained a 7-0 victory over Beemer last season. The invaders suffered several losses in their backfield through graduation, but are expected to put one of the big, fast lines Prep will face this year on the field Friday night.

Prep Coach Frank Williams will start a veteran unit of eight lettermen which averages 165 pounds. The Panther forward wall averages 175. Williams made one major switch in practice sessions this week, moving Harry Kelton from halfback to tackle.

Williams will start Jim Greib (165) and Veldin Magnuson (190) at ends; Kelton (180) and Jim Kern (185) at tackles; and Duane Ellermeier (155) at center. The backfield starters will be Corly Lutt (131), quarterback; Rich Johnson (150), left half, and John Dorsey (145), right half.







Capitol News Half of Teachers College Graduates Leave the State

What happens to those who are graduated from the state's teachers colleges yearly? The State Department of Education undertakes a study to find out.

Of every 10 graduates from Nebraska teacher training schools, the Department said, only five stay in classrooms in this state. Four teachers in other states and one either gets married or is drafted or goes into industry.

LeRoy Ortengren, state director of teacher education and certification, says there is a severe shortage of qualified science, mathematics and English teachers in high schools of the state. This, he commented, in addition to the perennial lack of qualified paraprofessional elementary teachers.

Salary is a big factor in the shortage, Ortengren noted. He said higher pay in other states and in the private sector has attracted better salaries than can be offered in getting qualified instructors.

The figures were reported by the state tax division of the State Agriculture department.

Thinking OUT LOUD

Few people bother to read the editorial page any more — that's the page this column appears on. In fact, few, beyond my brother Elmer, bother to catch these words. The comics, the lonely hearts column and the sports page are all a great many bother to notice. Others have some special interest in the advertisements or some certain article that pertains to them.

But few want to spend any time with thought-provoking discussion. Few want to take much note of the current issues.

And while at first you might wish to accuse and castigate for this listless attitude toward the big issues of the day, there is some reason for this. After all, it's more comfortable to be ignorant than afraid.

It's not that people would normally dodge around danger — although this is possibly the case. However, most people when they discover a danger they cannot avoid, cease equivocating and confront it head on. Yes, most of us have moral fibre which rises in the midst of threats. Heroes are not made of men who seek out dangers, but of those who confront it with peculiar strength when it comes.

Then why is it that today's threat to civilization is being so carefully avoided by these erstwhile heroes? Why is it that so many dodge the serious parts of the news and liberally devour the innocuous and trivial?

It is not because we are cowards. It is not because we do not care. It is not because we believe ignorance will save us.

We dodge the serious and the sobering because we feel so small and insignificant in dealing with it. We avoid the big issues because they are so big. We have lost our faith that it makes any difference what one little man can do.

Perhaps what is required is that someone be willing to strive for right even though its cause seems lost. Perhaps what is required is that someone strive for right even though he cannot conquer evil. Today may be calling for a new kind of hero — one who can struggle on when he sees there is nothing which can be done.

Phones and Progress

It's getting tougher every year for small telephone companies to survive in Nebraska. The State Railway commission says the movement towards use of dial phones has caused a sharp hike in the number of small exchanges that have merged in the last decade.

Commission Chairman Joseph Brown can make small companies not able to finance the switching from magnetic to dial service and are forced to consolidate.

Now, he said, there are about 100 exchanges in Nebraska with out dial service, but 17 of those are slated to make the change to dial operation in 1962.

Most companies don't attempt conversion to dial operation unless they have a hundred subscribers, Brown said.

Senator Lineup

The first three senators to indicate or announce they will run for a seat in the 1963 Unicameral Legislature are Sen. Tom Hubbard, Lincoln, Eugene Mahoney, Omaha, and Harold Stryker, Hastings.

City, Stryker was the first lawmaker actually to complete his filing for the 1962 primary election. Mrs. Orme and Mahoney have announced they will run for the post they now hold. Mahoney was appointed.

Not coming back will be Sen. Hans Jensen, Aurora, who has accepted an agricultural post with the Federal government.

Jensen was active in the Nebraska campaign of President Kennedy.

Highway Commission

Five Republicans were top prospects for appointment to the Advisory State Highway Commission by Gov. Frank Morrison. By law, a replacement for the late Dr. C. R. Watson, Mitchell, had to be a Republican. There already are four Democrats on the commission, which can have no more than four members from one political party.

Survival Test

Ten penitentiary inmates who existed for 10 days on cereal survival bars, black coffee and water, were no worse off physically than before they started. This is the general conclusion of medical people who kept the inmates under surveillance during the test.

Safety Belts

New bids for safety belts for state vehicles will be opened Sept. 11 by the state purchasing agent. All previous bids were rejected because the low bid arrived late.

Gasoline Taxes

So far this year, the state has collected \$27.2 million in taxes on gasoline, compared with \$26.9 million for the same period in 1960.

County Agent's Column

Hog Cholera Still Serious

Both the Senate and House Agriculture committees are moving swiftly toward enactment of a national hog cholera eradication program. Public hearings were held and the proposed program received the overwhelming support from witnesses representing hog producers, veterinarians, farm organizations and USDA.

Hog cholera is still reported from all the major swine-producing states and remains a most serious swine disease in the U. S. It is estimated to cost swine producers \$40 to \$60 million every year in deaths of hogs on the farm and continuing vaccination. Eleven counties which are major markets for other American products but the import of pork from the U. S. because of hog cholera.

The disease was first recognized in the U. S. 130 years ago but no unified effort has been made to stamp it out. Vesicular exanthema, a disease similar to hog cholera in the way that it is spread, has been successfully eradicated from the U. S.

Canada started stamping out hog cholera 50 years ago every time an outbreak occurred. In 1960, Canada reported that it eradicated periodic outbreaks and to maintain national freedom from the disease over the last 45 years has cost 4c per pig marketed. In the U. S. the estimated cost is 45c per pig marketed just for immunizing against the disease.

Foot-Rot Control

Foot rot is an acute disease of cattle and some other animals which may be controlled best by following good management practices.

Many veterinarians believe a virus may be involved in some cases of foot rot. Another factor that must be considered is the ration fed to dairy animals and to cattle in the feedlot.

Prevention of foot rot is the goal of all good stockmen. This may be accomplished by following these rules:


- 1. Good housekeeping to keep lots free of sticks, stones, wire, nails, cans and other materials that can cause injury to the feet or legs.
- 2. Keeping lots clean by removing manure regularly.
- 3. Providing concrete slabs along feeders and water tanks.
- 4. Providing a well-balanced diet with a well-balanced supply of vitamins and minerals.
- 5. Following good feeding and handling practices.

Crabgrass Control

When crabgrass is the most noticeable and annoying, it is also the poorest time for control measures. Crabgrass and foxtail are annuals which thrive through midsummer and early fall. Several chemicals will give good control if applied in the fall or early spring. These chemicals kill the annual weed seed from which these plants must grow.

The most promising of these chemicals are Dacthal and Zyrton. Several arsenic formulations have also given good results. These materials are sold under various trade names.



Don Cunningham Says

The story is told of an Irishman who was shipwrecked on a desert island. The natives took him in and in time he learned to converse with them, after a fashion. One day, talking to the chief, he asked if there was a government on the island. The chief was a little puzzled as to just what the Irishman meant, so told him he didn't know. The Irishman thought a minute and said, "Well, if there is, I'm agin it."

Seems like you hear a lot today about being "agin" the government. This policy doesn't suit one fellow, another policy doesn't suit another, and so on "ad infinitum." Guess that is no different than it has always been. You know that, they say there is nothing new under the sun.

To prove what I am talking about, I want to quote to you from an authentic old family history. It is from the history of William Jackson, who was one of my wife's ancestors.

"William Jackson, by the will of his father, inherited a large portion of his estate at Rockaway, N. J., and entered into business in 1812 in the manufacture of iron and farming, which he continued until 1833, during which time, through the vacillating policy of the general government, in relation to the tariff question of protection to the manufacturer of iron, etc., he suffered severe losses in, etc. he suffered losses in which he was exposed. Having extended his business largely in building the rolling mill with his brother, Joseph, at Rockaway in 1821 for rolling round iron and various other shapes (they rolled the first round iron in the U. S. in 1820 at Patterson, N. J.), and afterwards in 1823, he commenced a new enterprise by building a forge, saw mill and several houses and other buildings at Clinton, N. J., which he completed July 4, 1824, commencing the making of bar iron that day for the first time, commencing at the stamp, owning 1,200 acres of timberland there in its primitive state when he first commenced. The whole investment cost him about 30 thousand dollars. From the time of its completion to the time he sold it in 1833 it had proved an unprofitable enterprise in consequence of the shifting policy of the Administration of the government from 1823 to 1832, unsettling every plan that could be made to counteract such a policy. When the compromise act of the tariff of 1832 took effect it put an end to all hope of success in that business, thereby including him to sell out all his interest in the business at whatever sacrifice it might cost him, which he did in 1833, at less than half its cost, and he abandoned the business on his own account."

So you see as far back as 1833 people were blaming their misfortunes on government policies regarding tariffs, etc. They were then, as they are now, "agin" the government.

Seems sort of strange that if government policies have been wrong for 138 years that we still have a government — but we do, and it is still going strong. In fact, it will still be going strong 138 years from now when the voices of its present day critics are stilled and a new generation of critics will have taken their place.

Decontamination Includes Avoiding Fallout Contact

DECONTAMINATION (Sixth of a Series)

The first point to remember concerning general precautions for fallout decontamination is that dangerous gamma rays are given off. These can penetrate both air and solid materials for considerable distances.

They can best be avoided by taking shelter wherever the best shielding is available. The spread of this material into shelter areas can be prevented by closing doors, windows and chimney flues and sealing them with tape, newspapers or bags.

It is important to refrain from movement in and out of shelter areas after fallout has been observed, since it is as easy to track in fallout as it is to track in mud or dust.

The second point to remember is that physical contact with fallout material poses an additional hazard. Not only is gamma radiation more intense from material attached to the body, but the short-range beta particles which are also given off can severely burn the skin or internal organs, if swallowed.

This means the clothing and skin must be thoroughly cleaned of all contaminated particles as soon as safe shelter is found, and that contaminated food and water should not be swallowed. Gas masks or air filters are not normally necessary because the filtering action of the nostrils will prevent most radioactive particles from reaching the lungs.

A third point concerns exposure received during the post-attack decontamination. Those who do the outside decontamination should take emergency measures to shelter by as long as possible, clean the most important areas first and use the most rapid and effective decontamination techniques so the radiation dose they receive may be held to safe levels.

Personal Decontamination

It is important to have a change of clothing as there is no special clothing to provide for fallout protection. Washing with soap and water will remove particles from clothing and person, but the particles will then be in the water and special care should be taken to empty it away from places where people gather. Particular attention should be taken to bathe areas of the skin most likely to collect particles: the neck, hair, ears, nose and between and under fingernails.

Food and water inside a building will probably be safe for eating so long as it is in a covered container. Even exposed foods such as raw carrots or potatoes may be eaten if peeled first. The surfaces of all exposed food containers and utensils should be washed before using.

The purity of tap water may be questionable unless it is known to have been in a covered or deep reservoir, pipes, water heater or other secure source before fallout arrives.

City Water Commissioner

Howard Witt said this will not be a problem in Wayne as the local water supply comes from four sealed wells and all storage facilities sealed and covered.

In areas where this is not the case, a common ion-exchange water softener is very effective in removing fallout material from incoming water. However, boiling and other means of purification have no effect on radioactivity.




