Nebraska will soon have a new Captiol for emergency use, but it will be a far cry from the current towering edifice. Bids were laker on an undergrhund stathouse, located 15 minutes drive north of the present Appitol. # First Aid Knowledge Fills Trained Medical Gap in War covered, cover the burned area with a clean dry dressing or several layers of cloth folded into a pad. Apply a bandage over the pad, tightly enough to keep out the air. Do not remove the pad. Do not use grease, oil of any oinfiment except on a doctor's order. For chemical burns such as from acid or lye, wash the burn thoroughly, with water before covering with a dry dressing. Shock is often recognizable by paleness, cold and moist skin, rapid pluse, sweating or unconsciousness. Do not move the patient except to elevate the feet. Keep him warm, comfortable and calm. Suffocation can result from pressure on the neck or chest, contact with a live electric wire, drowning or bredthing in foreign substances such as smoke or gas. The usual signs, of suffocation are [coughing, sputtering, or other difficulty in breathing. The face may turn purple and lips and fingernails become blue. The patient will become unconscious unless he is treated at once. The patient should be removed from the cause of suffocation, but if he is in contact with a live wires do not touch him. Shut off the current if possible. If not, stand on a piece of dry wood and remove the wire from the person with a long dry stick or other nonmetallic object. If the patient is in a room filled with gas, smoke or water, get him out quickly.

In a war emergency, trained medical personnel will be in great demand. Therefore, citizens should be prepared for self-sufficiency in emergency health treatment.

If an injured person is in danger of losing his life through bleeding, suffocation, severe burn or shock, and if a doctor or trained first-aider is unavailable, it is important to:

Keed the patient lying down.

give an unconscious or semiconscious person anything for
drink.

Do not move an injured person except to protect him from
furthed danger to his life such
as fire, flood, etc. If he must be
moved, keep him lying down,
and use a wide board such as ah
ironing board or door with the
patient tied to it so he will not
fill no such board is available,
kneel with two other people on
the same side of the casually,
side your hands under him gently and lift carefully, keeping the
patient's body level. Walk in step
to prevent jarring and carry the
patient only as far as necessary.

For Bleeding
Simple steps can be taken to
treat less severe wounds until a

apply additional pressure to the
artery which leads to the wound.

Breathe into his mouth with a smooth steady action until you-see the chest rise. As you start this action, move your free hand to the patient's abdomen, between the navel and the ribs and apply continuous moderate pressure the prevent the stomach from filling with air.

When his lungs are, imfaled, remove, your mouth from the patient's mouth and allow his lungs to empty. Repeat this cycle, keeping one hand beneath his jaw and the other pressure on his stomach.

For a child or infant, continue at the rate of about 20 cycles per minute. After every 20 cycles, rest long chough to take one deep breath.
