WSTC Enrollment Shows Increase

WSTC enrollment has mounted to 1,423 resident students, an all-time record. A few more registrations are expected this week.

The previous record, set last fall, was 1,346.

The total includes all college students enrolled for classes on campus. Some are taking only one or two courses, but the big majority are in full-time attendance with 12 or more credit hours.

A breakdown of registration by classes, to be compiled soon, may indicate the effect of Wayne's new trimester calendar in attracting new students and retaining those here before.

Indicate Salaries For Teacher Colleges

The salaries of presidents of Nebraska's four state teachers colleges have been increased from \$14,500 to \$15,000 a year, according to individual college pay roll breakdowns supplied to the State Normal Board.

The breakdown showed 10 staff members at Wayne receiving more than \$10,000 a year with the highest non-president salary at Wayne being \$13,000. This is the highest salary in the State Normal Board employe except for the presidents.

Kearney staff has three receiving more than \$10,000. Peru has two and Chadron's report showed only the president receiving more than \$10,000.

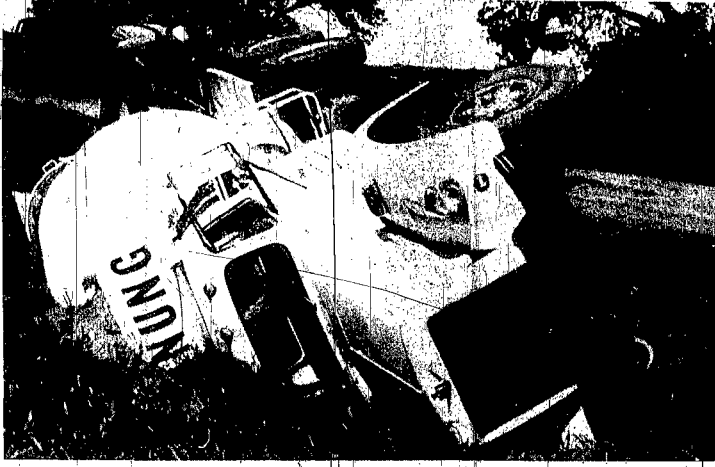
Troop 174 Court Set National Average

Board Allocates \$130,000 For Construction at WSTC

Remodeling of one building and construction of a new one at Wayne State received approval of the State Normal board Monday in Chadron.

The Student Union, which houses the cafeteria, will be remodeled into classrooms and offices when the new Student Center is finished. The board authorized \$100,000 for the remodeling.

It also approved construction of a new maintenance and repair shop at a cost of \$30,000. Replacing the present building just north of the power plant, it will be located northeast of the football field.

The board approved appointment of four faculty members: Dr. Howard Putnam, director of instructional research; Johanna Kool, supervising teacher of the Hahn school second grade; Beulah Neppard and Thorburn Taggart, jr., assistant librarians.

Local Doctor Attends Gynecology Course

Dr. Robert E. Benthack is one of 51 physicians enrolled in an intensive postgraduate course in gynecology being offered at the Vincent Memorial hospital through Harvard Medical school.

For two weeks, ending Friday, Dr. Benthack and colleagues have engaged in a thorough review of the present theories, principles and management of common gynecological conditions.

He has achieved an 8.630 grade point average for 111 hours of University level work in the College of Arts and Sciences. A 9.000 would be perfect. Rickers is majoring in mathematics with minors in physics and German.

Sunday Mum Day Plans Completed

Flower fanciers will be able to view 250 different varieties of mums at the Northeast Nebraska experiment station's first annual Mum day Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m., one-and-a-half miles southeast of Chadron.

Dr. A. Dale Flowerday, station superintendent, explained that the 1,250 plants in the experimental plots are being tested to determine per 100 a m.c.e. and adaptability under dryland conditions of northeast Nebraska. These plantings are only a part of the over-all University of Nebraska mum breeding project under the direction of Glenn Viehmeier, noted mum breeder and horticulturist at the North Platte experiment station.

Flowerday reports that the Nebraska project is one of the largest hardy mum breeding projects in the world. The plantings at Chadron include examples of the two basic types of mums: short, compact, heavy-flowering "cushion" mums and "space age" mums, new varieties of quills and spoons.

The mum show at the station is sponsored by the University of Nebraska and the Federated Garden Clubs of Nebraska. Viehmeier, Dr. J. O. Young, chairman of the University's department of horticulture and forestry, and Hans Burchardt, who is in charge of mum plots at the College of Agriculture, will be present to answer questions about mum varieties and explain hybrid breeding techniques.

Wayne PPD Gets Loan For Transmission Line

A loan of \$144,000 has been approved for the Wayne county Public Power District by the REA for transmission line construction.

The new line will consist of 14 miles of 89 kilovolt transmission line from the Wayne substation to the Frances substation of the Nebraska Public Power System.
