The Wayne Prep band will be among 55 bands competing in the 20th Annual Harvest of Harmony Festival in Grand Island, Oct. 7.

Nearly 3,000 high school musicians will take part in the event. All bands except the Grand Island band will compete for parade marching honors with a trophy being presented to the top band in each class.

Adult Education Course Scheduled at Wayne High

An adult education course, sponsored by the Wayne city schools and the State Department of Education, will begin Oct. 3 at the high school. The initial course, under the guidance of the U. S. Office of Education in cooperation with the Office of Civil Defense Mobilization, is for certified teachers, and will last for six weeks, meeting every Tuesday for 2 1/2 hours.

Teachers completing the course will then be qualified to teach the course to people in the community. The course is being taught in Hartington, Wayne, West Point and Omaha. All schools in the Wayne area have been contacted and will send interested teachers.

Those taking the course will learn the effects of nuclear, chemical, biological and conventional weapons. They will receive instruction in defense measures which can be taken and the truth about radioactive fallout. It will also include some instruction in the preparation for natural disasters, such as fire, flood, tornadoes and highway safety.

Nine Wayne city school teachers have registered for the course. As soon as the six-week training course has been completed, the city schools plan to hold classes for people of the community.

WS Band Day Set For Game Saturday

There'll be music aplenty in Wayne Saturday with 12 high school bands playing for Wayne State's annual Band Day.

The bands will parade up Main street from First street, starting at 11 a.m.

Individuals, other than farmers, may file the final return (1040) by Oct. 31 in lieu of the amended estimate.

The third quarterly installment of the fiscal year will end Jan. 31, 1962; second quarterly installment will end Apr. 30, 1962, and the first installment will end June 30, 1962. The annual return on Form 1040 and adjustment of estimated tax to actual for the fiscal year ended June 30. The annual declaration of the estimated income tax on Form 1040-EF of the fiscal year will end June 30, 1962.

Irving Anderson Chosen for State Sports Hall of Fame

A NE Nebraska man has received one of the greatest sports honors in the state. Irving Anderson, who resides on a farm, between Wayne and Hoskins, is the thirty-fourth entry to Nebraska's Sports Hall of Fame.

Beginning his career while riding Shetland ponies at the Wayne county fair at the age of eight, Anderson is currently a leading official at Nebraska's thoroughbred tracks.

While riding some of his father's horses at county fair races at the age of 17, Anderson's riding ability caught the eye of George Thompson, who was a friend of Dick McMann, general manager of owner Warren Wright's famous Calumet Farm in Kentucky.

Soon he was being tutored by Frank Kearns, longtime trainer for Calumet, and in 1936 proved a tremendous racing success. Anderson's brightest racing season was 1940. During that campaign he finished eighth among the jockeys in the United States and his mounts won \$216,415. His ability to pace a horse was considered Anderson's greatest riding asset.

Edward Arcaro was a riding partner of Anderson, and the Nebraskaan thinks Arcaro is and always will be the greatest jockey of all time.

Anderson is currently a paddock and patrol judge around the Nebraska circuit. As paddock judge he is responsible for checking riding equipment of the jockeys and dispatching the horses to the post.

The Hoskins man owns and operates a half section of land northwest of Hoskins. Mr. and Mrs. Anderson have three children, Wayne, 14; Warren, 11; and Cathy, 6.

Two last-quarter touchdowns provided Newcastle's Red Raiders with a 20-7 Corntassel conference victory over Osmond Friday night at Osmond.

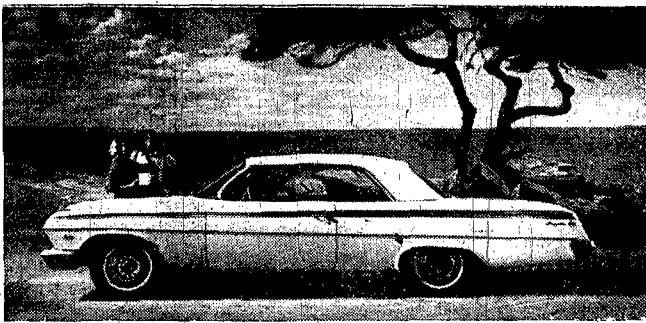

Doane will bring a 3-0 record to Wayne for the 2 p.m. game in Memorial stadium. One of those wins came by forfeit from Dakota Wesleyan after the Dakotans got mixed up on their schedule. Blind Woman Able to Find All Her Household Items

Mrs. W. H. Phillips lost her eyesight completely five years ago and in this day she can remember where everything in her home is and can put her hand on it in a moment. Everything in her home must remain exactly as it was, of course; nothing can be moved.

After contracting glaucoma, it was necessary to have her left eye removed, and it was impossible to save the sight in her right eye after three operations. Mrs. Phillips remarked that the process of going blind was seeing people's faces as if they were blank, featureless. Finally in the last stages she felt there were pieces of black lace hanging before her eyes. Even though she has absolutely no vision, she insists she can see quick flashes of lightning and on dark nights the moon is visible to her.

The irony in her losing her sight from glaucoma remains in the fact that she recalls as a child having read a story about someone else losing her sight from the same dread disease. She remembers having been paralyzed with fear for that person, and now she has lived through the same experience.

For Mrs. Phillips the sacrifice of her vision has helped much more than for most persons, because she was always a woman with many hobbies — sewing, crocheting, knitting, painting and playing the piano.

In every corner of her home is proof of her many hobbies — the curtains and all her clothes are handmade, dollies and tablecloths

are of the finest crocheting, chairs she has reupholstered and needlepoint she has done, her original oil paintings on most of the walls, and finally the baby grand piano that has not been played for years. She is justly proud of the four intricately patterned tablecloths and mentioned that crocheting a tablecloth takes as long as building a house.

Mrs. Phillips has given away almost all of her original oil paintings. Several years ago she gave to Wayne High her painting, "Shag at Sunset," to honor the faithful Christmas carolers. Mrs. Phillips is honored to know that the painting now graces the music room. Her painting is thoroughly realistic with a feminine feathery touch.

The knowledge that one is going blind would be a difficult experience for most of us, but for Mrs. Phillips it was a time to be busy making plans for her life as a blind person. She immediately set about sewing herself many dresses that would take her through the years. Since becoming blind and because of her inactivity, she has gained weight. She solved that problem by setting gussets into the sides of her dresses, and doing it all by feel only.

Her life has changed considerably but she still does every chore

conceivably possible. She does all her own housework except vacuuming the floor and does all her own cooking. Mrs. Phillips has even taught herself to write all her own checks.

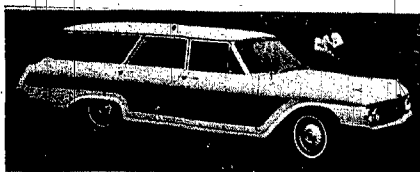
Mrs. Phillips has received several services for the blind, such as records from the Library of Congress which are sent to her regularly. These records include information about almost everything — travelogues of countries, biographies, novels, musical pieces and carefully compiled lectures. Another service for the blind is the white cane with which she gets around very well.

A worker for the blind, another who has lost her sight, visits Mrs. Phillips about three times a year. The lady advised Mrs. Phillips not to bother learning braille because of the many other services offered her.

Mrs. Phillips had a dressmaking shop in Sioux City two years before she and Dr. Phillips were married. She also taught piano several years before a fire after her husband's death. As soon as Dr. Phillips finished his internship in Sioux City, they were married in 1900 and moved to Carroll. Dr. Phillips died March 13, 1924 after serving in World War I, and Mrs. Phillips moved to Wayne. She has lived in Wayne county 60 years.

After losing her husband, Mrs. Phillips sought solace in her many hobbies and took innumerable lessons in piano and organ. She stated that her greatest loss in becoming blind was the necessity of giving up her piano and organ music.

Mrs. Phillips' philosophy in life was stated simply: "I care what people think but I don't go by what people think." She concluded that she has tried to live her life as Christ would have done it.

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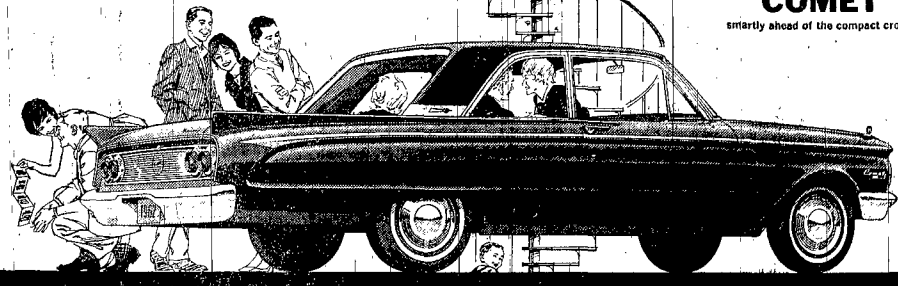

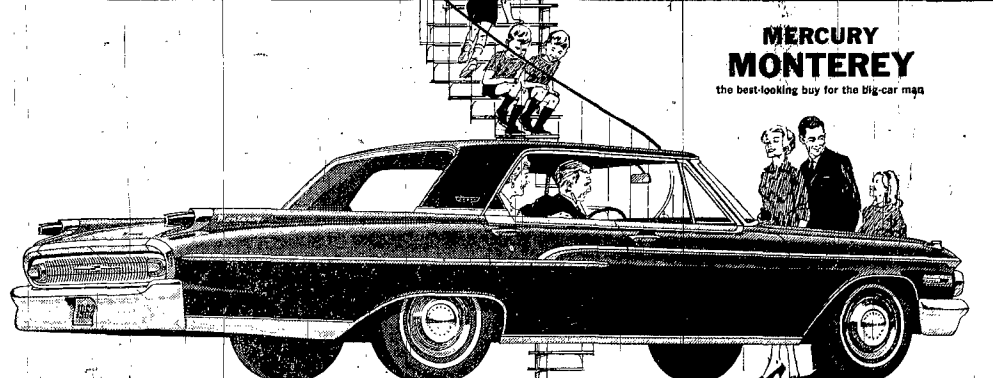

**D. Hall Interviewed
On Danish Folklore**

D. Hall, Wayne, Denmark native, has been interviewed on Danish folklore by former Omaha Frank Paulsen, who is collecting material for a doctoral thesis at Indiana university.

Hall contributed 35 folk tales which he says he can remember from back to the 1880's.

Paulsen said he is anxious to get these folk tales down on paper because most of the story-telling has been carried on by immigrants of the 1920's and before.

"When they are gone, the stories may disappear. Folk stories," he

said, "have a refreshing spontaneity. They are not sophisticated. They are sometimes rude and coarse. But they are filled with life, they are compelling."

Danish folk tales could often be characterized as having a "shaggy dog ending," he said.

Hall cited this example: "There were couple of fellows named Simon and Joseph on the church board. They had a nice church bell. Then the war started and they were afraid the enemy would take the bell and use it for war material. So they decided to take the bell and put it in a boat and drop it in the deepest part of the lake. Then they marked the spot by making a scratch on the boat with a knife.
