If you are distening to radio or television when CONELRAD is ordered into operation, you will hear a message like this:

We interrupt our normal profess to security in security. We interrupt our normal program to cooperate in security and civil defense measures as requested by the united States Government. This is a CONELRAD Radio Alert, Normal broadcasting will now be discontinued for an indefinite period: Civil defense information will be broadcast in most areas at 440 or 1240 on your regular radio receiver."

What is CONELRAD? It is the short term for an emergency

what is CONELRAD: It is the short term for an emergency system officially designated as "plan for CONITO of Electromagnetic RADiations."

The system was devised joint by by the broadcasting industry, and the government to get offi-

cial information to the American people in event of attack with-out providing electronic naviga-tional aid to enemy bombers or

missiles.

How Does CONELRAD Work?

Under the system, radio stations operate at reduced power at 640 and 1240 kilocycles — and

at 640 and 1240 kilocycles — and in many areas they operate in clusters of two or more, broadcasting the same program. ; In the cluster system, each of the stations is on the air alternately for only a few seconds. The listener in the cluster area hears a continuous program. The only "break" might be a decrease or increase in volume as the broadcast passes from one station to another.

CONELRAD coverage over the

CONELRAD coverage over the nation is expected to be fairly complete. However, because of the necessary reduction in transmitting power, the broadcasts may not reach some runal areas. RACES (Radio Amateur Civil
Emergency Service) is an organization of amateur radio operators who help provide radio communications needed by Federal,
state and local governments in

ization of amateur radio operators who help provide radio communications needed by Federal, state and local governments in time of emergency.

RACES was created primarily to serve in a civil defense emergency and has a membership of about 35,000 out of a total 200,000 licensed amateur radio operators.

RACES emergency communications plans originated by local civil defense offices must be approved by the state civil defense director and by the 'office of Civil Defense Mobilization. The plans are forwarded by OCDM to the FCC for final authorization.

In peacetime RACES members are asked to handle messages for police, fire, public utility and other emergency services as well as civil defense practice exercises. However, the organization may be called upon to provide communications in any emergency concerning public safe-ty, preservation of property, maintenance of law and order, alleviation of human suffering and need, armed attack or sabotage and national defense or security.

In wartime, RACES stations will be the only amateur radio stations allowed to operate — under strict control — in event of enemy attack. Amateurs enrolled in MARS (Military Affiliate Ra-

stations allowed to operate — under strict control — in event of enemy attack. Amateurs enrolled in MARS (Military Affiliate Radio System) will operate within the communications systems of the Army or Air Force.

Upon warning of enemy attack, all normal amateur radio operations must cease for security reasons.

As a result of attack, much of the communications facilities over the nation probably would be destroyed or extensively damaged. RACES stations and operators would then supplement surviving facilities in sending and receiving official information and directons from all levels of government.

Operating frequencies allocated

directing from all levels of government.

Operating frequencies allocated by the Federal Communications Commission for RACES are restricted to a small fraction of regular amateur bands. Each RACES station is a member of one of more emergency networks. These connect town and city control denters with outlying areas and also connect city to country, county to state and state to Federal control centers.

Anyone with an FCC amateur or commercial radio operator license is eligible to enroll in RACES except those who hold only the Temporary Limited Ra-

certificate from the local or state civil defense director concerning loyalty to the United States and general reliability in accordance with prescribed FDC procedures.

Quality gear and equipment for RACES use can be obtained by state and local governments through OCOM on a matching funds basis. In many localities "communications rooms", are fitted out with this equipment for use in RACES network drills.

Additional information on BACES may be obtained from the state office of Civil Defense at ocharge. Two pamphlets recommended are "Federal Communications Commission Rules 10 r Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services (RACES), advisory bulletin 122, and "Standard Operating Procedures and Training Manual for RACES Stations," miscellaneous publication 13.



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
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
