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Myrtle Anderson Honored By National Home Agents

Myrtle Anderson, Wayne county home Extension agent, was cited for distinguished service at Boston, Mass., by the National Home Agents association.

She was given the association's distinguished service award for her accomplishments during her 11 years as home agent in Nebraska. Miss Anderson has been in Wayne county since 1952 but prior to this time was home agent in Boone county and a trainee in Buffalo county.

"Myrtle Anderson is a home economist with high professional standards," says Agnes Arthaud, state home Extension leader at the University of Nebraska. "She gives sound leadership to a program, conservative in size, but outstanding in quality. Its success is due in large measure to her ability to develop leadership in others."

Miss Anderson's development of leadership department not only to the women in her county but to young women who are entering the home agent profession. Since in Wayne she has trained eight prospective home agents.

Prior to entering agricultural extension work, the honoree taught high school home economics. Her teaching career began in Brule and took her to Hayes Center, Ragan, Harrison, Minden and Holdrege, all in the Cornhusker state, and to Crane, Ore.

She taught rural school three years before entering Kearney, Nebraska State Teachers college. She was graduated from KSTC in 1936 and had advanced work at the University of Nebraska, Iowa State University, University of Wisconsin and Colorado State University.

Miss Anderson has been termed an "outstanding leader" in her own community. She is presently Rural Retail Chairman for Wayne county, president of her local Business and Professional Women's club and is active in church and civic affairs. She's a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, AAUW, The Nebraska Home Economics Association, the American Home Economics Association and the Nebraska Home Agents Association.

During her term in Wayne county, Miss Anderson has contributed much to the growth of the Extension programs. At present, she offers guidance and counsel to 19 home Extension clubs with more than 380 members and to 240 young girls through 4-H programs.

Also attending the meeting was Marcelle Barelman, Beatrice, a former Wayne resident.

Bible Institute Set At Grace Church Here

A Bible institute, conducted on six successive Sunday evenings, will get underway Sunday at Wayne Grace Lutheran church, beginning at 7:45 p.m.

Registrants will be given the choice of attending two sessions each Sunday evening in a field of four courses offered, as follows: "The Sickle or the Cross," a study of the Communism-Christianity conflict, taught by Rev. Bernard Gorenz, Creighton; "The Bible and True Pictures from the Book of Revelations," presented by Rev. Cary M. Ritchey, Wakefield; "What's the Difference?" a survey of similarities and differences in doctrine and application of doctrine among various church bodies in America, given by Rev. Donald Reed, Norfolk; and "The Walking and Talking Christian," a discussion on communicating one's faith, led by Rev. Oscar A. Marquardt, South Sioux City.

The institute is the fourth annual joint project of Circuits of the Missouri synod Lutheran churches in NE Nebraska. All sessions are open to the public.

Dr. Crossland, Former Wayne Resident, Dies

Rev. Dr. Weldon F. Crossland, 71, former Wayne resident, died Saturday in Brighton, N. Y. He was a member of the General Board of Evangelism and the executive committee of the Methodist church.

Dr. Crossland, a brother of Judge William Crossland, wrote five books on church administration and organization between 1947 and 1951.

New Fire Ordinance On Burning Passes

The city council Tuesday passed a new ordinance governing the burning of waste and combustible materials within the fire zone. The ordinance provides for the type, construction and use of incinerators within the fire zone.

This will allow some controlled burning to be done, but only in incinerators that meet the requirements of the ordinance. The requirements are available from the City Clerk's office.

The council also discussed with a representative of the railroad, the opening of Logan street across the tracks. The council was told the railroad had no interest in opening up the street there because of the hazard of an additional opening on the tracks and the expense.

The railroad representative told the council it would cost \$5,000 for the crossing and \$12,000 for signals and if it was opened through court process, the railroad would expect the city to stand all the expense.

Behind the planning of opening Logan at the railroad track was the effort to remove truck traffic from Main street.

The council also received notices of construction from: Richard Carlson, install basement, \$1,000, on S50' of E150', Lot 3, Brown's Outlots; J. R. Johnson, garage, \$600, Lots 16, 17, 18, Block 20, College Hill Add.; Richard Carman, house, \$14,000, Lot 6, 7 and 8, Block 19, College Hill Add.; Donnie Tange-man, house, \$15,000, 704 E. 10th street.

Another occurred when Dale Iekler, Winside, struck a Jacobson Transfer truck south of Wayne.

A third occurred Thursday when a car driven by Ronald Wacker, Carroll, ran in a ditch on a country road north of Wayne and overturned. Neither Wacker or his passenger was injured.

A car driven by Rudy Carstens, Wayne, was damaged to the extent of \$122 when struck turning into the Igloo Drive-In. Gayler Wascher, West Point, was driving the car that struck the Carstens auto. Wascher left 90 feet of skid marks. Damage to the Wascher car was estimated at \$245.

The first major event of town-wide interest will be the traditional parade of floats, bands, the homecoming queen and attendants, starting at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. The procession will move from First street north on Main street to the campus.

Occupying a prominent place in the parade—and in all the Saturday events—will be the queen, Jean Henry, a junior from Omaha. Students elected her last week from among five candidates chosen by the W club, an athletic lettermen's club.

The four runners-up to the queen are her attendants: Camilla Hanson, senior from Holstein, Ia.; Lois Kaczor, Ewing; Suzanne Ryan, Miami, Fla.; and Bev Compton, Sioux City, all sophomores.

Interpersed between floats, seven high school bands from Northeast Nebraska will march and play. They come from Bancroft, Emerson-Hubbard, Laurel, Newcastle, Stanton, Wayne City High, and Wayne Prep.

All except Newcastle were planning to perform in the Band Day two weeks ago, but rain washed out that event. At halftime of the football game, the bands will present a mass playing and marching show.

Afternoon festivities begin at 1:15 as the bands parade into Memorial stadium. Following this, the winning floats from parade will tour the track. Then the W club will crown Queen Jean and present her attendants.

The game, starting at 2 p.m., matches Wayne against Nebraska Wesleyan. The Wildcats, hot on the trail of the Nebraska College conference championship, need to win all remaining NCC games to stay in contention.

After the game, all six dormitories are planning coffee hours to welcome visitors—alumni, parents and friends of the college.

Climaxing the day is the homecoming dance at 9 p.m. in Rice auditorium. The public is welcome to attend and dance to the music of Ralph Marterie and his Marlboro orchestra. Tickets will be on sale at the door.

Students will enjoy some hijinks Friday, tabbed Hobo Day. Reviving a tradition, the event will end with a bonfire pep rally and hobo dance in the evening.

WCPD Lets Contracts For Transmission Line

Wayne County Public Power District awarded a contract to Mork Hardware and Electric company, Clarkfield, Minn., for \$86,931.58 Monday. This figure compares low with the engineer's estimate of \$100,000.

The contract is for labor and material to build 11.88 miles of 69 KV transmission line from the Wayne substation to a point near Emerson.

This new facility will enable the district to serve its customers with another source of power which will eliminate long outages, as power sources can be shifted.

Master's Degree Program at WSTC Gets Accreditation

Full accreditation was voted the Master's Degree program at Wayne State Teachers College by the executive board of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, according to word received Monday from Robert F. Sullivan, associate secretary of the NCA.

The action is subject to formal approval at the annual NCA meeting in March. Dr. Sullivan indicated that college officials need not appear for further hearing at that time.

A committee of NCA examiners visited the Wayne campus last July to evaluate the graduate program, and the executive board met in Chicago Sept. 26 to consider the committee report. Wayne State President W. A. Brandenburg and Dean of Instruction Karl W. Meyer appeared before the board at this meeting.

At the same meeting, accreditation was denied the masters degree programs at Kearney and Chadron Teachers, but permission was given those institutions to continue the instruction subject to later evaluation. In 1959 Peru STC was denied NCA accreditation and directed to discontinue its master degree program.

Wayne State has had full accreditation by the NCA of its undergraduate programs since 1917. The most recent yearbook of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education lists the college as one of four Nebraska institutions holding full and unconditional accreditation of its bachelor degrees programs by that accreditation agency, the others being the University of Nebraska, the University of Omaha, and Creighton University.

Dean Townsend, 12-year-old grandson of Mr. and Mrs. John Barnes, Wayne, was one of the finalists in the thirteenth national Pillsbury baking competition last week. He is the son of the former Lueen Barnes, a 1937 Wayne High graduate, who, with her husband, Howard, and two other sons, lives on a farm near Albion. Dean entered the competition with a lemon-meringue molasses cake, and for it received \$100 certificate plus a \$200 wardrobe certificate, in addition to transportation and accommodations.

Another Nebraskan to enter the competition was a former Wayne resident, Norma Meyer Klunder, daughter of Emil Meyer. She received her education and taught school around Wayne. She, her husband and two sons, now live in Norfolk. Mrs. Klunder entered with a coffee cake and received the same prizes as Dean Townsend.

Dean and Mrs. Klunder were two of the 100 finalists chosen from the one million who entered the original race.

The tri-county organization promoting schooling for mentally retarded children convenes at Wayne city school Monday.

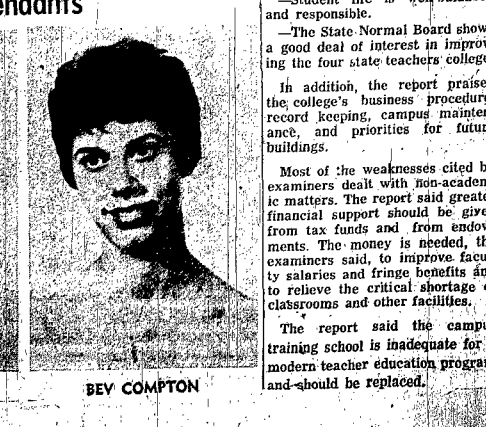

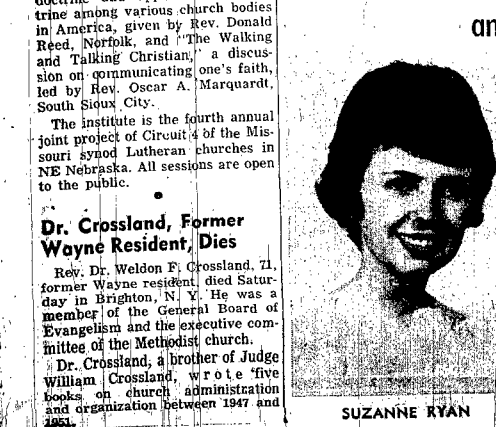

Soybean Producers Urged to Consider Price Protection

Soybean growers should consider using price-support loans and purchase agreements before selling their soybeans, where eligible for price support, at less than support prices this fall, John Mohr, chairman of the county ASCS committee said today.

"One of the main purposes of the price support program is to protect producers against unreasonable price declines," Mohr declared. "Holding the crop in storage until some time after harvest — when market offerings are normally heavy — should promote more orderly marketing and more stabilized prices."

The support rate for 1961-crop grade No. 2 soybeans in Wayne is \$2.21 per bushel. Loans are available for producers who require money at harvest time and who can meet the loan-storage requirements, and purchase agreements provide insurance for other producers.

Under a purchase agreement, the Government agrees to purchase at the county support rate — after the loan maturity date — a quantity of the crop up to a maximum specified in the agreement. The maturity date for loans on 1961-crop soybeans is May 31, 1962.

Officials point out that, while the price level will be at a record level, the demand for soybeans during the marketing year as a whole is also showing up to record proportions. Domestic demand for oil and meal continues extremely high and exports are expected to be larger than they have been in the past few years.

Diverted Acreage Program Defined

Acreage that is diverted under either the 1962 wheat stabilization program or the 1962 feed grain program for barley or the other feed grains must meet certain standards, according to John Mohr, chairman of the county ASCS.

"To be considered as 'diverted acreage,'" he explained, the land must be: 1. Cropland that was intensively cultivated during at least one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961, or 2. Cropland devoted to a conservation use other than a water storage facility or trees under a Conservation Reserve contract which has been terminated or has expired with respect to such and, or 3. Cropland which was designated and approved as diverted acreage under the 1961 feed grain program, except acreage devoted to trees and except other 1961 diverted acreage which is designated as ineligible for 1962.

Mohr added that land which is still under a Conservation Reserve contract in 1962 may not be eligible as diverted acreage. Furthermore, land which is considered as "diverted acreage" for one program will not qualify as "normal conserving acreage" for another program, or as "diverted acreage" for any other program except on farms where double-cropping practices are approved.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Industry for Wayne . . . Forward or Backward

Several years ago, some of Wayne's citizens banded together to form an industrial corporation. The idea of this corporation was to purchase land for an industrial site and work with various agencies, both governmental and private, to try to procure some sort of industry for Wayne and NE Nebraska.

Why does this area need an industry, some may ask. The answer is simple: We need industry to grow. The great educational industry located here has stimulated Wayne's growth and economy to the point that we shudder to think what would happen to our town without it.

According to U. S. Chamber of Commerce figures, 100 new factory workers would mean the following to NE Nebraska: 296 more people

- 112 more households
- 51 more school children
- \$590,000 more personal income per year
- \$270,000 more bank deposits
- 107 more cars registered
- 174 more workers employed
- Four more Retail Establishments
- \$360,000 more retail sales per year

What is our batting average to date? Zero. True, the corporation has succeeded in procuring the land for the industrial site, but what now?

To date Wayne has come to bat several times and has struck out every time. We know that in some instances we stood with the bat on our shoulder as the final opportunity whizzed by, only to be fielded by a more alert team.

This week some 90 Wayne area businessmen and farmers will be asked to spend one day to travel to Iowa and look at an industry which hopes to expand its operation to Nebraska.

We hope these 90 citizens will answer the challenge and stand at the plate with determination. The time for "Let George do it" is past.

Capitol News . . .

Controversy Centering on Veterans Affairs Agency

Again the center of a controversy, the State Department of Veterans Affairs is one of the newer state agencies. It was created in 1947 by the Legislature in lieu of a bonus for Nebraska veterans and given the job of administering an \$8,000,000 trust fund.

The fund income is used to aid Nebraska veterans, their widows and dependent children under 18, in time of financial need.

State Director Louis R. Eby has held the post, which pays \$7,000 per year, since the department was formed.

The controversy involving Gov. Frank Morrison and his appointment of a successor to Eby, who retires in December, is the second of its type.

First was the unsuccessful attempt of the late Democratic Gov. Ralph G. Brooks to remove Eby, a Republican, and replace him with a Democrat.

Morrison, a Democrat, named Larry Meyers, also a Democrat, to replace Eby. The governor asked for one name from veterans organizations but got two, he said.

Meyers and James C. Smith, a Republican now heading the on-the-job training program, was the other.

The position was set up to be a non-political one to devote attention to the need of veterans, regardless of political party.

Meyers currently is personnel director for the Board of Control which goes out of existence in January.

An American Legion spokesman said Morrison had privately admitted that Smith was better qualified for the job than Meyers. Morrison said the letter from the veterans organizations said either man would be acceptable. And, added the spokesman, he is much too busy to engage in political controversies.

The World War I veterans organization said it, the Spanish-American Veterans group and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, endorsed Meyers and the Legion, Smith.

Bumpy Road

The bumps in Nebraska's brand new Interstate highway between Omaha and Lincoln are in the news again. There were two developments, almost simultaneous. Gov. Frank Morrison directed State Engineer John Hossack to report to him any areas of the route that are not satisfactory.

The maintenance crews, meanwhile, reported work progressing on building up the surface of the pavement to eliminate sharp dips in bridge approaches.

Hossack said the basic reason for the dips was settlement of the earth underneath the road bed. Morrison said he asked for the report after receiving several complaints about the roughness of the route. Hossack said he had fielded some, too.

Institutions Director

George L. Morris, currently purchasing agent in the administration of Democratic Gov. Frank Morrison, is the new director of state institutions.

The Republican will assume his post Jan. 1 when the three-member Board of Control for governing state institutions, goes out of existence as a result of a law

passed by the last Legislature. Morris has consistently been mentioned as the top candidate for the new director.

The governor also said he has not seen any great reason not to retain Frank Woods as Director of Public Welfare.

Under the new system of running state institutions, there will be two directors replacing the three-member board.

To some extent, the appointment of Morris was a vindication of his firing in 1955 by the Board of Control on grounds of insubordination after Morris and the Board engaged in public scrapping.

Morris says he plans to spend the time until Jan. 1 learning all he can about the institutions and expects to tour all of them.

Leo Beck, sr., Lincoln, a Democrat, was named by Morrison to succeed Morris as purchasing agent.

Tax Collections

During September the state collected \$4.1 million in taxes on gasoline, \$533,882 on cigarettes and \$107,234 on production of oil and natural gas.

Cigarette and oil taxes produced less revenue than in August.

School Fire Devices

State Fire Marshal Joe Davis says about a dozen school boards may be called to court to give reasons why they have not installed needed fire safety improvements.

Several schools have received extensions of time during which they can continue working toward meeting state fire regulations, Davis said.

The marshal said the dozen schools passed the Sept. 1 deadline without reporting on improvements made or asking for extension of time to comply with the rules.

He noted there were 20 school fires in Nebraska last year, with reported losses of \$29,000.

County Agent's Column

Control Weeds Now

Fall is an ideal time to kill field bindweed, Canada thistle, leafy spurge and other hard-to-kill perennial weeds.

The new benzoic acid formulations are gaining wide acceptance for use on small patches of perennial broadleaf weeds.

Benzoics are available as either sprays or granules for dry applications. Benzoics have an added advantage in that they are not too toxic to grasses. This is ideal from a conservation standpoint. Bindweed and other similar perennials can be killed on grassland, idle acres and waterways without leaving the land bare.

The chemical 2,4-D should not be overlooked for treatment of large patches of field bindweed. Fall applications of 2,4-D even after late frosts can be expected to give excellent results, providing the field bindweed is in good growing condition. The plants should have lots of healthy top growth so they can take a good dose of 2,4-D and carry it to the

root system. The chemical should be used at the rate of one pound of actual 2,4-D per acre. This can be obtained by applying two to three pints per acre of most 40 percent formulations.

Fire Season Is Coming

Some 850 lives were lost as a result of farm fires in 1960, according to the National Safety Council. A study in 1959 showed that about half of the dwelling fires across the country in which six or more lives were lost occurred in rural homes.

Misused, overheated and defective heating or cooking equipment, flues and chimneys cause 48 percent of farm dwelling fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association. November has been the peak month for farm fires and resulting loss of life.

Should fire break out in your home or in one of your farm buildings, what will you do? You may do the wrong thing, according to safety specialists, unless you drill on the following steps: See that everybody is out of the building.

Call the fire department. If you can re-enter the building without exposure to smoke or highly heated air, close as many windows and doors as you can reach without getting near the fire.

Use whatever first aid, fire fighting equipment you have.

When the fire department arrives, let trained men take over; keep out of their way.

Do not attempt to remove livestock, machinery or household goods unless it can be done without exposure to smoke or highly heated air. Breathing smoke or highly heated air is just as dangerous as coming in contact with flames.

Contact your insurance agent immediately.

Lack of water is one of the most serious handicaps when fire strikes in rural areas. You should have an emergency water supply close to the buildings. If you cannot provide a good pond, it is suggested that an emergency system of at least 3,000-gallon capacity be built near your important buildings.

Thinking OUT LOUD

PRICE OF PEACE

E. J. Bernthal, pastor Grace Lutheran Church

Most of us are beginning to sense, perhaps in a more personal way than we have for a long time, the critical nature of the times in which we live. Until recently Laos and the Congo, East Berlin and South Vietnam have sounded only like far away places. Enormous appropriations for defense have often been slipped into astronomical budgets in a way that our own purses haven't felt the immediate impact of it all. But the recent call to active duty of numerous standby military units has brought the matter nearer to many of us.

The resumption of tests for the perfection of weapons designed to obliterate all life from vast areas, and render worse than useless whole cities and their environs further point up the uncertainty of life upon our planet from one day to the next.

Amid all stepped up defense preparations; mobilization of men; emphasis on survival; instruction for orderly evacuation, first aid and radiation monitoring; anti-Communism programs and free-world esteem, one gets the uneasy feeling that there is altogether too much barking up the wrong tree.

Theoretically every one is in favor of peace — in about the same way that everyone is against sin. But the crux of the problem is: are you and I, individually, willing to pay the price?

Winston Churchill, while commenting on the failure of world disarmament negotiations some years ago, illustrated this with a clever story. "Once upon a time," he said, "all the animals decided they would disarm and rule out violence. So they arranged for a conference to decide the matter. The chimpanzee said that the use of teeth in war was horrible and barbarous, and ought to be outlawed. Horns, which were mainly defensive weapons, would of course have to be allowed. The buffalo, stag and porcupine said they would vote with the rhino. But the lion, tiger and bobcat took a different view. They defended teeth, and even claws, as honorable weapons of defense. They the lion spoke up. He proposed that both teeth and horns must be banned. It would be quite enough for survival if animals would be allowed to give each other a good hug when they quarreled. No peace loving animal could object to that. The hug has ever been the symbol of brotherly affection, and it would be a major step toward world peace. When the other animals heard this proposal, they all called the lion a 'war monger' and insisted he broke up the peace negotiations."

The story would be amusing were it not so painfully true to life. We all want peace—but each on terms that will guarantee his own cherished comforts, amenities, extravagances and rights.

It is the ultimate in sardonic irony to suggest that a war of survival be waged according to international law. And all history demonstrates that it is suicidal to hope to preserve and promote peace with increased and accelerated preparations for war.

What reason has America to think that she will be the one great exception of all time?

Shortly after V.J. Day in 1945, columnist Raymond Moley wrote a notable piece of journalism titled, "Man, the Unbroken At-

om." "The late war," he began, "like most wars of the past, has, despite its vast destruction, given humanity more control of material resources than before. But there still stands the enigma of the ages — man himself." And he concluded with, "The only solution I know for the problem of the atomic bomb is to have nations learn to live without using it against each other."

And this strikes straight at the human heart. Unless hearts and wills and attitudes are changed, while lusts and passions and sinful inhibitions are restrained, mankind will go on blundering down a dead end road.

Jesus Christ put it bluntly: "I tell you, Nay; but except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." There have seldom been more unpopular words spoken than these. They are unpopular because they hurt. They point the finger inward. They demand unflinching self-appraisal in the light of God's standard of righteousness. And they will either bring a man to the foot of Calvary's cross for the forgiveness he so desperately needs, or they will cause him to clench his puny fist and make one last futile attempt to defy God.

Only out of the sackcloth and ashes of repentance emerges the beautiful, heartening truth uttered by that same Galilean: "Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth."
