

More Tests Probe New Books Featured At Public Library Student Learning

Student Learning
At City Schools

More tests have been added to the battery of tests normally given at the Wayne City schools in an effort to probe deeper into the apptitudes, IQs and other facets of learning of students.

Conducted by Donald Dean, counselor and guidance director at the school, the new tests, along with ones used in the past, are being given freshmen, luniors and seniors.

The freshmen completed the California Test of Mental Maturity which will give scores in mental age, IQ and grade placement. The juniors have completed an aptitude test which covers the following area: verbal reasoning, numerical ability, abstract reasoning, clerical speed and accuracy and language usage which is broken down into spelling and sentence structure.

The seniors will take the School and College Ability Tests sometime in January. This academic aptitude test is used for post high school and college planning.

Also in January, the freshmen will take an achievement test, the lowa Test of Education Development. All test scores are analyzed and gone over with the individual. Parents are encouraged to arrange an appointment with Dean for discussion and explanation of their child's score in any of the lests.

Dean's schedule includes a private scheduled conference with each student in the high school. Individual conferences are scheduled as the need arises.

The Washington Boom

There's at least one place where a super-boom is underway. It's in the Federal government. Unfortunately, it's a boom that the taxpayers—including taxpayers-to-be not yet born—will have

Federal spending for the year will pass \$90 billion, a new peacetime record. And authoritative estimates say that next year's budget deficit will exceed \$5 billion at the very least. Some think it may rin close to twide that figure. It certainly will — if the next Congress approves any substantial number of the spending bills that will go into the hopper — bills which have nothing, whatever to do with our military strength.

We're supposed to be prepared to make sacrifices in the name of national defense—and of national survival. When will Washington provide even a minor example? Not until the people vote "no" to candidates and public officials who promote higher taxes by advocating give-away programs financed by taxpayer dollars.

The metal strips used to band birds in the U. S. are inscribed: "Notify Fish and Wild Service, Wash., D. C." and they used to read "Washington Biological Survey," abbreviated to "Wash Biol. Surv." This was changed after a farmer shot a crow and disgustedly wrote the U. S. Government: "Dear Sirs: I shot one of your pet crows the other day and fol-

Applying fertilizer without knowing exactly what your soils lack is about as sensible as expecting a doctor to recommend treatment without ever seeing or talking with his patient.

A sample of soil taken in a certain way from a field is lanalyzed to see just what available plant foods the soil in the field contains. Recommendations

can then be made so that fertilizer dollars can be invested in the combina-tion that assures the highest return for the money spent

Such tests may not be neces-sary every year if fertilizer users are aware of how much plant food certain field crops use. But without adding plant food regu-larly the storehouse of plant food will soon go empty. The result: your field crops will starve, yields will drop and so will your profits.

Shelled corn losses are figured by determining how many kernels per square foot indicates a loss of one bushel of shelled corn per acre. Several square feet should be checked at each of several places byer the field to determine an average.

mine an average.

Ear corn losses with 40-inch rows can be estimated by counting the number of dropped ears between two rows, in a distance of 185 feet. The ears should then be weighed. The total weight is equal to the ear corn loss in bushels per acre. This procedure should also be duplicated to obtain an average.

Quite often, one year's extreme harvest losses could pay for dry-ing equipment which would al-low early loss-free harvesting.

Beans will still thresh well between 17 and 20 percent majsture and are damp enough to prevent shattering. Lesses from beans shattering from the pods before reaching the combine is almost directly in relation to moisture content.

Soy beans must be 12 to 13 percent moisture for safe storage. Harvest at higher moisture to prevent shattering requires drying to a safe moisture content.

Harvest at higher moisture to prevent shattering requires drying to a safe moisture content for stotage. Drying requirements are similar to lcorn.

Farmers who harvest soybeans should be very fussy about the way the machine is adjusted, Follow the operator's manual to the letter. Correct adjustments can save many, many dollars worth of beans.

For example, the cutter barshould be set as close to the grownd as possible. The rate of speed is a major contributing cause to loss of beans due to cutting too high.

Although there will always be some beans lost through shattering, losses should be kept to a minimum. If you can count more than four beans per square foot on the ground behind the combine you lare losing too many. Four beans per square foot much an four beans per square foot would mean an alverage loss of a bushel of beans per acre.

Reel adjustment for both height and speed is very important and the cylindler adjustment determines the amount of cracking. Soybeans are easily cracked so a slow cylinder speed and a concave adjustment that at allows threshing but holds down cracking is also important.


