## Who's The Boss?

A short time ago the city council of a Michigan town of 31,000 population turned down a request of an oil company to construct two service stations. The reason given was that the city already has sufficient service stations to meet the need.

Here is a unique precedent which, if applied down the line, could produce some remarkable results. Entirely aside from the dubious legality of the council's decision, if municipal officials are to decide how many service stations a community should have, they must also be entitled to decide on the number of retail stores, insurance agencies, newspapers, doctors, and so on ad infinitum.

The point is simply this: Should bureaucrats determine the extent of the goods and services available — or should business people and their customers? Putting it another way, who's the boss — public servants or the public?

There's no satisfaction in doing less than one's best.

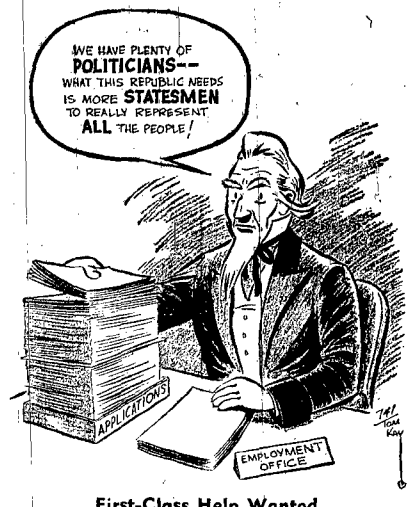
## Opposing The Inevitable

The steel companies have not raised prices since 1958. In the meantime, big wage increases have been granted, the last occurring Oct. 1.

To retard inflation the President wrote the leading steel companies asking that they not raise prices, in spite of this last wage increase. It is difficult to understand how continued wage boosts can be absorbed without an increase in the price of a product in a free market.

It doesn't take the Department of Labor or any world renowned economist to figure out how continued wage hikes caused increased prices and steel is no exception to this rule. The owner of the smallest restaurant or cleaning establishment can give the answer — when costs go up, prices go up.

"The national capitol was a poorly planned and rather unsubstantially constructed in the first place," says an architect. Sounds as if it might have been a government project. — Vista, Calif. Press.

Just the other day I had this experience. You read about it. At the south edge of Fremont a man drove on to the highway from a side road, without stopping, directly into the path of a semi-trailer. The truck driver tried to swerve to avoid hitting the car, and in swerving the truck overturned on top of the car. Needless, a man, his wife and five little children were killed.

The State Safety Patrol recently reported traffic violations on the Interstate highway between Omaha and Lincoln. As I remember, most speeding cases were listed for persons driving in excess of 80 miles per hour. On the other hand, some had been given tickets for driving under the minimum of 40 miles per hour.

I believe one of the nagging problems of our time is the problem of highway accidents and deaths. The cause of this problem is not the machinery involved, but the people. It used to be that we could blame most accidents on some malfunction of the vehicle, but this is no longer true. Most accidents today don't happen — they are caused by people. Here is but another example of technology surpassing man's ability to use wisely the products it has produced.

Such a problem as this is directly related to our religious faith. In church and Sunday school we hear and learn, for example, "So whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them." (Matt. 7:12.) This we call the Golden Rule, and we nominally assent to it, except when we get behind the wheel of our car. Then LOOK OUT! It's every man for himself. Can you understand how a person who o thinks he is a good Christian, who goes with regularity to church and even gives to its support, can forget, or at least not make application of such scriptural truths as in 1 Corinthians, "Love is pa-

## Capitol News . . . Consider Helicopter Landing Site on Lincoln NU Campus

The air age is rapidly catching up with the University of Nebraska. State Aeronautics Director James Sandstedt says the school is considering airports for helicopters at the downtown Lincoln campus, at the agricultural college, the medical college in Omaha and at Mead.

At Mead the school is planning an agricultural experiment station. Sandstedt said his department would like to ferry University personnel to meetings but hasn't enough planes to do the job. . . Involved in the University's case is the time professors and officials must spend away from their jobs in getting to meetings. The University has been using a lot of chartered flights, the director states. . . It may be two years before the helicopter use becomes a reality, Sandstedt said. . . Many state officials fly to gatherings to cut the amount of time they are away from their desks.

Radiation  
The State Health Board wants to push for legislation in 1963 aimed at controlling radiation hazards. It reactivated a committee to do this. 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## County Agent's Column

Shelter Facts Offered  
Necessary factors on stockpiling food and water in homes and fallout shelters for survival after a nuclear attack are discussed in a new USDA publication.

It tells how much and what kinds of canned and other tightly sealed foods to store, and gives details on sources of safe water in the home and how to purify and store water. Sample menu plans show how to provide a reasonably balanced diet from recommended foods. The publication tells how often to replace these foods and lists the equipment needed for emergency cooking.

A nuclear attack would probably force many survivors to rely on their own food and water reserves for up to two weeks. People are urged to: (1) Build up regular food supplies so there is always a two-week reserve on hand, or (2) Store a special emergency supply of food and water in the home or fallout shelter.

Single copies of Family Food Stockpile for Survival (HG-77) are free from the Office of Information, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.

Appliance Life Estimated  
A new refrigerator or an electric or gas range can be expected to serve its original owner an average of 16 years, according to estimates of USDA household economists.

However, a family that buys a used electric refrigerator or range keeps it an average of eight years and a used gas range about nine years.

To help families plan a their long-range finances, researchers of the ARS Institute of Home Economics prepare such estimates from data obtained for them in special Census Bureau surveys. The figures are also used by manufacturers and distributors of home furnishings.

A new television set serves the original owner an average of 11 years, while a used set serves the buyer six years. A family keeps a new electric sewing machine an average of 24 years; a used one, 16 years.

A new automatic toaster serves the original owner 15 years; a used one, eight years, the estimates show.

In the case of new washing machines, no matter what type a family purchases — automatic, semi-automatic, wringer type or spin-dry type — it's kept an average of nine years.

Apply Rabbit Control Now  
Tree plantings are already beginning to show damage inflicted by rabbits. And the worst is yet to come.

Rabbits standing on drifted snow gnaw and peel off bark, seriously damaging or killing orchard, windbreak or woodlot tree plantings.

While the most damage occurs during winters in which snowfall is heavy, some damage to plantings often is observed from fall until spring. Such damage can be especially serious to new plantings which are not yet well established.

Several chemical repellents are marketed which seem to be effective.

These repellents can be applied to trees by brush or sprayer and should be applied to a height that rabbits may reach after a heavy snowfall. One application should last for the season.

Repellents which contain thiram, such as arasan 45S, SFM

The problem of the purchasing department in the statehouse continues to crop up periodically. Gov. Frank Morrison says he is seriously considering having the state buy all of its goods at wholesale instead of retail.

A committee of state senators, meanwhile, is looking into state purchasing practices with an eye toward legislation that might help eliminate some of the controversies.

The committee of the Legislature will make recommendations to the next session of the Legislature.

Sen. Marvin Lautenschlager, Grand Island, committee chairman, says he is determined to steer clear of political fights that have cropped up regarding the department and confine the committee's study to remedial legislation.

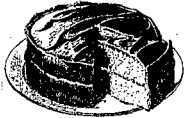
