

Social Security Tax

Farmers who have hired help covered by Social Security, should deduct the three percent Social Se-curity tax before paying off the employee, says Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk Social Security office.

Wages for work on a farm are covered by Social Security if an employee is paid \$150 or .more in cash wages in a year. If less than \$150 is paid, the wages are still covered if the employee works on 20 or more different days for the same farmer and if he is paid on a time basis. The employer is responsible at the end of the year for reporting to the Internal Revenue Service the employee's three percent plus the employer's three percent, a total of

To help families plan their long-range finances, researchers of the ARS Institute of Home Economics prepare such estimates from data obtained for them in special Census Bureau surveys. The figures are also used by manuafcturers and distributors of home furnishings.
A'new television set serves the original owner an average of 11 years, while a used set serves the buyer six years. A family keeps a new electric sewing machine an average of 24 years; a used one, 18 years.





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
