The law states any person vio-lating this provision shall be guilty of a miadeameenor. The state highway department has ordered no passing signs and these will be placed along the roads at stopping points when they arrive.

By using proach dairymen will soon real-ize that good feed and feeding practices pay. A ration must pro-vide a proper balance of rough-age, concentrates and protein. Cows need all the roughage they can eat. A 1.000-pound cow should have at least 25 pounds of dry. roughage per day. If silage is fed, substitute three pounds of silage for each pound of hay. Concentrates are the most ex-ponsive part of the ration. Here is where you should do some fig-uring. Compare feed prices with milk prices.
