## Wayne Lions Ask Donors to Join Eye Bank Program Here

L. W. Alexander, Hooper, Nebraska Lions Sight Conservation chairman will be the principal speaker at the regular meeting of Wayne Lions club Wednesday, 6:30 p.m., at Hotel Morrison.

Alexander, past district governor, is noted throughout Nebraska for his outstanding work for the blind and in the development of the Lions Eye Bank program. He will also show a film on sight conservation.

Special guests will be a representative from the State Highway Patrol, Don Weible, Wayne county sheriff, physicians and others dealing directly with the entire project. Arrangements will be made at the meeting to set up a local committee, which can act quickly in the removal and transportation of eyes to University Hospital of Omaha, where corneal transplants will be made for near sightless or completely sightless people.

Clifford Dabb, Lions club president, has announced that eye donors are now being accepted. Upon the death of a donor, the committee will act immediately in arranging for a transplant.

Gene Fletcher is chairman of the local Lions club sight conservation and work for the blind committee, and Don Easley is co-chairman.

Nov. 28 has tentatively been set for the White Elephant sale, from which the proceeds will be used for the purchase of an eye bank kit to be presented to the Wayne hospital. Any surplus will be used for further blind work and in the purchase of glasses for those in need. Herb Bodenstedt is chairman of the sale event.

The public and interested donors in the Wayne county area may attend the program, which will begin immediately following the dinner meeting — approximately 7 p.m. — and hear particulars regarding the eye bank program. Donors will be accepted at that time by the signing of application cards.

## College Inspectors in Training Program Here

Three visiting college professors are "going to school" at Wayne State this week.

They are the first of several teams that will study WSTC to familiarize themselves with the techniques of accreditation in specifications.

Wayne has been chosen as a visitation institution for trainees in the North Central Association leadership training project. They are working with Dr. Karl Meyer, dean of instruction, who participated in a previous NCA leadership class.

The trainees will devote one year to preparation before they become inspectors for the NCA.

## Beeks Gets Trash Hauling Franchise

The city council Tuesday night passed an ordinance granting Ivan Beeks an exclusive franchise to collect, haul and dispose of garbage and trash within the city.

In the five-year franchise Beeks must have his services available to everyone in the city and must have another truck, approved by the council, in operation within six months.

He must also maintain his present schedule and rate of charges, neither to be changed without the council approval.

The council also approved the purchase of a two-ton truck from the Coryell Auto Co., on the basis of their low bid of \$2,799. The other bid received was from Seyler Motors, Inc., for \$2,861.

Approval was given for a building permit to Larson-Kuhn Co. for remodeling of the former First National Bank building to amount to \$5,000.

Wayne's Community Chest drive is apparently going to fall \$216 short of the \$8,494 goal. The Wednesday morning total showed \$8,282.29 turned in with only a possible \$20 still to come in envelopes not yet returned.

Donations and pledges are still being accepted and may be mailed or brought to the Wayne Chamber of Commerce office.

Chest officials again reminded Wayne residents that donations do not have to be made all at one time. Pledges can be paid in four installments.

For example, if a person decided to give \$20, he could pay \$5 now. At the end of every three months he will receive an envelope from the Community Chest in which to mail another \$5. This way the individual can give about 40 cents each week.

Five people, four of them teachers, were injured to a five car pile-up south of Hoskins on Highway 35 Friday morning. The teachers were on their way to Norfolk when the accident occurred.

They were taken to a Norfolk hospital, treated and released. The injuries were mostly cuts and bruises.

Driving the cars were Mitchell, Mrs. Harms, Robert Ogan, Wayne, Mrs. Jack Langemeier, Winside, and June Hasmussen, Laurel.

The accident started when the Mitchell and Harms autos collided. The Harms auto struck the Ogan car and it in turn hit the Langemeier car which struck the Rasmussen automobile.

Another teacher, from Palisade, received cuts and bruises in a different accident which occurred Thursday about 6 p.m. five miles south of Wayne on Highway 15.

Robert Van Griethuysen, 28, Palisade, apparently went to sleep coming toward Wayne from the teachers convention in Norfolk and his car rolled over into a ditch. The auto was listed as a total loss.

## Pheasant Season Opens Saturday

Wayne area hunters can take to the field at 7:10 a.m. Saturday for the first day of pheasant season. The daily shooting this year opens at sunrise, not a half hour before as in previous years.

Sunset Saturday, the end of shooting time, is 5:47 p.m.

An abundance of pheasants have been reported in NE Nebraska, although the same problem as last year will be facing the nimble-heavy cover.

Farmer friends of some Wayne hunters have told them the use of dogs will nearly be a necessity, particularly in large areas of sod bank land. The birds are there, the farmers report, but will be tough to get up.

There has been a large run on No Hunting signs at the Herald office, some with permission and some absolutely barred hunters.

Hunters should remember that the hunter-farmer relationship can be greatly improved by obeying these signs.

One farmer told the Herald, while picking up No Hunting Without Permission signs, that he hated to post his land since it appeared it would be ideal for the sport this year, but he was running several different herds of cattle and would like to tell hunters where they were and where gates were located. Thus the permission clause.

Another landowner said that there were not going to be any hunters on his land, no matter what.

A little consideration on the part of the minority of hunters who are trouble makers could ease the situation considerably.

## Drivers Must Stop For School Buses

Several cases of stopped school buses being passed have been called to the attention of Wayne city school superintendent Stanley Westergard.

Motorists are reminded that this is not only an unlawful practice, but is also very dangerous. The children are warned by school officials not to run in front of the bus while parked, but this could happen and a passing motorist would have no opportunity to stop.

State law 79-488.02 requires motor vehicle meeting or overtaking, from the front or rear, any school bus on which warning signal lights are flashing to reduce speed to not more than 25 miles per hour and to stop completely when the school bus stop signal arm is extended and to remain stopped until the arm is retracted and the bus resumes motion or until signaled by the bus driver to proceed.

The law states any person violating this provision shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The state highway department has ordered no passing signs and these will be placed along the roads at stopping points when they arrive.

## Medical Society Offers Free Diabetes Tests Here

Free tests for diabetes will be available for Wayne area residents the week of Nov. 13-18 at the Wayne hospital.

The local test drive is conducted by the Five County Medical Society, which includes Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Thurston and Wayne counties, in cooperation with the nationwide effort of the American Diabetes association. This education and detection program is in no way concerned with fund raising.

Diabetes often exists in hidden form and the test is needed to detect its presence. The test is simple, quick, painless and free.

By taking the test, people can avoid neglecting this condition, which can lead to serious complications.

Common symptoms of diabetes are excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight despite excessive hunger, intense itching, slow healing of cuts and bruises, easy tiring and pain in the extremities.

It is estimated that one American in 70 is a diabetic.

# Wildcats Slip at Peru State, Face Kearney for Second

Amibitions change rapidly in football. Last week Wayne State's Wildcats battled for first place in the Nebraska College conference and lost to Peru State 27-7. Saturday they will play Kearney State for second place, the game starting at 2 p.m. in Wayne's Memorial stadium. Both teams have 32 conference records and are tied for second behind Peru, 5-0-1, which won the NCC crown in beating the Wildcats.

Two weeks or so ago the Wildcats had reason to think they were as good as any other prospect for the championship. Now injuries have damaged hopes for even salvaging second place. The "Cats" await Kearney, badly hurt in starting strength.

Dave Kracl, the team's leading pass receiver and only experienced kicker, suffered a serious knee injury as Peru defenders blocked his field goal attempt and swarmed all over him. Earlier in the game he also sprained an ankle. He will not play Saturday.

Halfback Gene Schneider also sprained an ankle at Peru, but led the team's rushing with 60 yards. He will see only limited action, if any, Saturday.

Quarterbacks Dave Munro and Tom Miller both left the Peru game early with injuries. How much they can play Saturday is not known. Quarterback Alex Incignoni already had been lost for the season. This leaves only Don Calvert for signal calling. He played nearly three quarters at Peru, completed four of 12 passes, including a scoring head to Stan Schaullis 40 seconds before the end.

Guard Tom Billeter's status was doubtful at midweek after a rib injury at Peru.

A more cheerful note is the prospect that fullback John Bernthal

may be back near full power as his leg injury seems to be healing. Wayne will need all the cheer available in view of a Kearney report that its team will be at full strength — and eager to avenge the 19-7 defeat Wayne inflicted last year.

The Wildcats had little to cheer in the Peru debacle. The Bobcats had command almost continuously after a Wayne thrust collapsed midway in the first quarter.

For a moment Wayne appeared on the way when Schneider zipped for 54 yards to the Peru 15. Three plays resulted in a loss and brought about the field goal attempt. Kracl's low kick was blocked, and Peru end Tom Neal grabbed the loose ball for a 75-yard sprint, leaving all the Wayne team behind except tackle Jack O'Brien who pursued all the way but could not gain an inch.

Early in the second quarter Peru chased a Wayne fumble back to the Wildcat 9-yard line. Ron Kelley cut through to score on the next play. Dick Place's kick was good, putting Peru out in front 13-0 without one first down to its credit.

The Bobcats earned their next two touchdowns on straight football, although two short Wayne punts gave them breaks. Kelley plunged one yard for the third TD. Leonard Kinsler ran nine for the fourth counter. Place converted both times.

In the fourth period Peru had a first and 10 on the Wayne five but couldn't punch across. This was Wayne's lone defensive gem.

As time ran out, Calvert engineered an 85-yard drive, including passes of 31 yards to Jim Grove, nine to Dick Chochon and four to Schaullis for the score. O'Brien booted the point.

Kearney won, as expected, with 40 points. Nebraska Wesleyan tallied 72, Wayne 74, Doane 76, and Chadron 79, making the scoring unusually balanced.

Dean White of Doane won the individual crown with a 15:58 clocking on the three-mile course. Kearney's Gary Shubert and Clarence Weidel finished second and third, and Wayne's Ken Katzer was fourth at 16:42.

Charles Borg gave Wayne a seventh place. Carl Owezarsak, 12th; John Kruse, 24th, and Rod Billings, 27th were the other Wayne point makers.

Wesleyan's best performer was tenth place Melvin Carlson, but the Plainsmen placed three others in the first 15 to edge Wayne.

### Many Methods for Heating More Space

If you have decided to expand the living space of your home, don't forget to make plans for heating. To choose the right type of heating equipment, ask yourself these questions about costs, comfort and value:

1. How much will the heating equipment cost? How much to install? How much to operate? Will there be any hidden, extra costs?
2. How much comfort will the heating equipment provide?
3. Will the heating equipment increase the value of the house? Should the heating become a permanent-type addition to the house like the new room itself?

Four Methods

There are four possible methods you can use to heat the new room, each varying in cost, comfort and value.

First, there is the appliance-like space heater which is simply set

on the floor of the new room. It uses either gas, oil, kerosene or electricity.

The space heater is frequently the least expensive to purchase and install, but it is not always the most economical to operate. Moreover, heat is usually concentrated in one spot around the heater.

Electric resistance baseboard units are relatively inexpensive and easy to install, and they provide more uniform heating. Operating costs, however, may run three to four times higher with this type of unit except in a few areas where electric rates are extremely low. To maintain heating efficiency with electric units, extra heavy insulation is recommended for ceiling, walls and floors.

**System Expansion**

Another way to heat the new room is to expand your existing central heating system. This should be done with the advice of a reliable heating contractor, who can tell you whether your heating plant is large enough to take on an ex-

tra heating load.

This method may be more expensive than the first, but should provide the finest heating if the heating equipment is properly installed.

You will probably have fewer problems expanding your heating system if it is a modern hot water heating system. According to the Better Heating-Cooling Council, a properly installed hot water heating system can be expanded quite easily without extensive alterations to the system or to the house itself.

Finally, you may find it practical to install a separate, permanent-type heating system just for the new room. According to the Council, there are now available small hot water heating boilers which are sized for one-room heating jobs. The small boiler can be located anywhere in the house. Finger-size, flexible tubing is run from the boiler to hot water baseboard heating units.

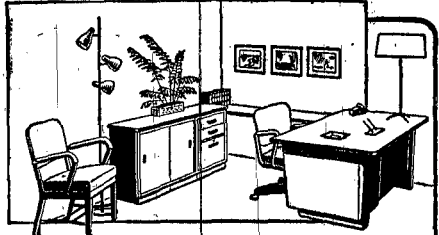

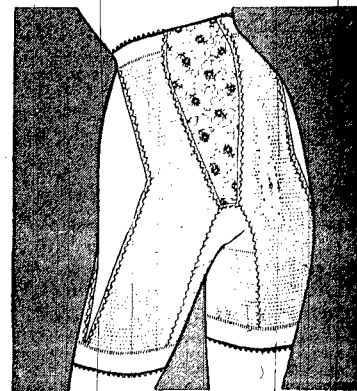

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# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Shocking and Surprising

U. S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Abraham Ribicoff, by nothing short of a miracle, escaped the recent annual meeting of the American Council on Education with his bones intact.

Ribicoff, one of the featured speakers, departed from his prepared text to administer a verbal lacing to the some 1,000 college and university presidents and deans present. His blunt and unvarnished, "I don't think you really care about education, or are going to do anything about it," gives rise to our having serious doubts about the man's qualifications to hold so important and strategic a public office.

It cannot be that an official of Ribicoff's caliber is ignorant of the long-standing and concentrated efforts of educators to better the profession and to improve upon the quality of instruction. We would prefer to think that the secretary momentarily lost his perspective and his scathing tirade — human nature being what it is — followed.

Regrettably, that doesn't appear to have been the case. Ribicoff very candidly and without mincing words leveled barbs at the schoolmen because, in his opinion, they failed to lend sufficient endorsement to President Kennedy's Federal aid to education program. Why, and by what distorted sense of reasoning, the secretary feels anyone who didn't support the Kennedy Administration's Federal aid to schools bill is categorically and unqualifiedly opposed to educational betterment is somewhat mystifying.

Those among educators who favored the measure were legion. Nevertheless there were some of the best school administrators in the nation who took a suspect view of the proposal. Still others, while in agreement with the objective, disliked certain provisions in the legislation.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

We have good reason to believe, too, that the rank and file of not only educators but citizens as well are convinced of the financial need. Most are of one mind that more money is needed for school buildings, improved teacher pay and higher education. But it doesn't necessarily follow that he or she who does not elect to favor the Kennedy Administration's program isn't at all concerned about the problem.

Secretary Ribicoff's extemporaneous address, while we haven't had access to the remarks in their entirety, appears to have been ill-chosen and in extremely bad taste. His method, his choice of verbiage and his manner of delivery seems to have given rise to the conclusion that he was engaged in a rather obvious and clumsy attempt to wax politically partisan. His motives, we grant, were probably the loftiest — and no one can find fault with his efforts in behalf of better education.

However, his seemingly conveying the notion that unless and until you are "for" the legislation he and the Kennedy Administration recommend, you are "agin" education, we do not give a pinch of snuff for it.

This kind of logic will set schools back to McGuffey's Reader.

Ribicoff said the Federal aid to education failed because everyone was looking out for his own interests. The bill failed because Congress recognized that its passage would lead to Federal control of the schools.

Ribicoff finished his address by saying, "And I don't think you are going to solve the problems of education by going to meetings."

Especially Ribicoff's meeting.

When you consider how hard it is to change yourself, you understand how little chance you have in trying to change others.

## Capitol News . . . Governor Asks Department Irregularities Information

The state purchasing department is back in the news again. Gov. Frank Morrison says he wants any Nebraskaian who has any evidence that can be documented of alleged irregularities in that department or any other, to report to him.

Morrison said if such information were found to be true the problem would be corrected and those responsible discharged.

The governor said it is the responsibility of any citizen having information to give the governor a chance to investigate and correct the problem. If the governor fails to do so, then there is room for justified criticism, he said.

Morrison criticized those who have hit at his purchasing department. He stated that not one person had visited the department in an attempt to find out what's going on.

The governor said his administration has attempted two major goals in the purchasing department — enlarging the competitive bidding area and broadening bidding specifications so as not to limit the number of bidders.

Statements, and controversies involving the department have flared periodically since August. Morrison, in another area involving government efficiency, has asked all departments to analyze their programs and see if they can't more fully utilize the central accounting operation.

Central accounting is an agency of government which has automatic business machines which cut down time and manpower needed to process information.

"We are looking towards a stabilization of accounting practices and full utilization of modern data processing equipment to the end that we have the most efficient possible housekeeping in all agencies of state government," Morrison said.

An accounting preliminary survey was made several months ago by two firms which recommended a detailed look at the problem estimated to cost between \$30,000 and \$50,000.

**Liquor Commission**  
The state liquor commission has a new attorney. He is Robert Camp, Lincoln, who replaces Edward F. Carter, Jr.

Atty. Gen. Clarence Meyer announced the change. Carter had handled legal matters for the commission for 4 1/2 years. The commission attorney holds the title of assistant attorney general.

**Mexit Plan**  
Nebraska lawyers are being urged to push a proposal on the

ballot in 1962 calling for a new system of selecting judges of the supreme and district courts. If the proposed Constitutional amendment is approved, the governor would appoint judges from a list submitted by a judicial nominating committee.

The judges would serve specific terms; then run for election on the basis of their record, with the question being whether the judges should be returned to office.

If the vote were negative, the governor would appoint a replacement. Technically, the proposal is called the merit plan.

Now, filings for a judgeship are made like for any political office, except judicial candidates run on non-political tickets.

**Federal Money**  
Federal money is available to counties in matching funds for construction of emergency operations headquarters in case of atomic attack.

Nebraska is the first state in the midwest to get an operational shelter underway for state and civil defense officials.

Major Gen. Lyle Welch, state adjutant general and civil defense director, said it is important that each county have a place for its officials to work in case of an emergency.

Because of the enthusiasm for the state shelter, Nebraska's county governments are getting an early opportunity to follow suit, officials said.

**Minor Highways**  
In even a few years, relatively minor Nebraska highways could become overcrowded, according to State Engineer John Hassock.

At present, the engineer commented, only major roads in Nebraska, such as Highway 30 across the state and Highway 2 between Grand Island and Omaha, are subject to heavy pressure from motorists.

Increased population and vehicle traffic will provide the volume of travel on even minor roads, Hassock said. He noted that most of Nebraska's roads were built to accommodate vehicle traffic loads of 20 years ago.

**Unicameral**  
Hugo Srb, clerk of Nebraska's Unicameral Legislature, feels the day is coming soon when at least one or more other states will adopt a one-house law-making body.

Srb says the move probably will have to come from a state in which the people have the right of initiative provision.

In states where such action would depend upon action of a two-house Legislature, lawmakers

are reluctant to vote to abolish themselves, he noted. More states have voted seriously with the idea of a Unicameral than ever before, Srb said. These include Michigan, North Dakota and Missouri.

## County Agent's Column

**Don't Skimp On Feed**  
Milk production usually takes a dive when green pastures are good and a cow is turned into corn stalk fields.

The urge to conserve supplies of winter stored feed may be costly. By using the pencil approach dairymen will soon realize that good feed and feeding practices pay. A ration must provide a proper balance of roughage, concentrates and protein.

Cows need all the roughage they can eat. A 1,000-pound cow should have at least 25 pounds of dry roughage per day. If silage is fed, substitute three pounds of silage for each pound of hay.

Concentrates are the most expensive part of the ration. Here is where you should do some figuring. Compare feed prices with milk prices. Keep feeding more grain as long as the extra milk pays back more than the feed cost.

**Farmers Buy Bonds**  
Did you know that nine percent of the population of the United States owns 11 percent of all the Savings Bonds outstanding? That nine percent, as you may have guessed, is the present farm population according to latest census figures. So, rural people have done their share — and more — in helping to keep our nation strong.

That's why the Treasury Department has named November as "Salute to Agriculture" month and will pay public tribute to farmers. A full page advertisement is being carried by newspapers all over the country as a "Why So Many Farmers and Ranchers Plant Money in U. S. Savings Bonds." It also includes photographs and statements by the national president of the three farm organizations.

Farm magazines are also noting the occasion with special editorials and features.

**Five Things To Do**  
Five seasonal practices which should be carried out now by poultry producers have been listed by John L. Skinner, Nebraska Extension poultryman:

1. Clean and stain all outdoor growing and rearing equipment.  
2. Adjust, service and repair all ventilating equipment.  
3. Add more material to built-up litter systems and mix thoroughly.

4. Take steps to control rodents in and around all poultry facilities. Rodents will be moving in with the approach of cold

weather and should be controlled now.

5. Thoroughly clean all light fixtures, inspect and make repairs on all electrical service.
