Missionary to Talk in Dixon and Coleridge

Dixon -- A Japanese-American Methodist layman, who has been a teacher of English, a television personality and a newspaper columnist in Japan for 11 years, will speak at the Dixon Methodist church Sunday at the 11 a.m. services. He will speak at the Coleridge church at 9 a.m.

Morse Saito, whose American home is Chicago, has returned to the United States for a year's furlough from missionary service.

Since first going to Japan in 1949 as a missionary, Saito has had as his principal assignment, teaching English to Japanese students at the Palmore Institute, a Methodist night school in the city of Kobe. His classes average more than one thousand students weekly. He has also taught Bible classes and has been coach of basketball, track and baseball at the Canadian Academy in Kobe, a school for English-speaking children.

Long interested in Japanese culture and how Christianity may contribute to it, Mr. Saito has taken advantage of opportunities to him to use the mass communications media. For the last three years he has written a column for the Mainichi Daily News, which has the largest circulation of any English language paper in Japan. Since 1959 he has conducted his own weekly television program in a series entitled, "The Japanese Cultural Series." He has written for Christian journals in Japan.

Born in Hoquiam, Wash., Mr. Saito was graduated from Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, in 1948 with a bachelor of arts degree. He holds two master of arts degrees from the University of Michigan, one in Far Eastern studies and the other in education.

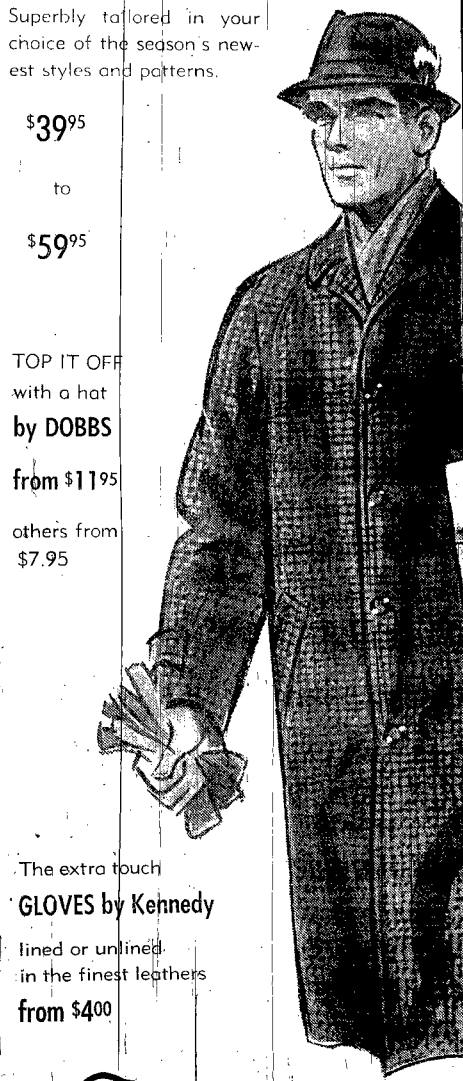

Wildcats Finish With Tie For Fourth in NCC Contest

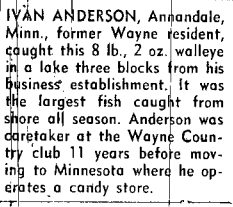
Wayne State looked back this week on a football season of contrasts. The campaign closed with a 40-0 trouncing by Kearney extending the loss string to three after three straight wins. So close was the Nebraska college conference race that Wayne's winning or losing the last game meant the difference between second place or a tie for fourth, which is the spot where Wayne landed with Doane.

For the season the Wildcats won four, lost five, reversing last year's record. For the conference race they were 3-2 while Doane had 2-2. The two Tiger ties gave Doane the equivalent of Wayne's 0-3 mark.

They repeated as NCC champ, 50-1. Kearney was second at 4-2. Hastings third at 3-2-1. Chadron closed in sixth with 2-4. Wesleyan seventh again at 0-6.

The contrasts in Wayne's season were apparent in the awesome defense that prevailed in earlier games, then the startling collapse in the last two.

Post-season second-guessing puts some of the explanation on the unusual spate of injuries, especially at the quarterback spot. Wayne faced Kearney with five starters

out (three of them on crutches) and several others unable to go full power. Dick Chochoen went gainless because of an injured leg, though he contributed some key defensive plays.

The Kearney game was one of contrasts, too. First and last quarters were scoreless. A snowstorm at times almost obscured the players from the stadium until sunshine opened up late in the game. Both teams were dangerous in passing despite the frigid wind.

Kearney started its scoring onslaught early in the second quarter when it caught Wayne quarterback Tom Miller in the end zone for a safety.

The Antelopes tallied three more times in the quarter on a 8-yard run by Jerry Dunlap, a 16-yard pass to Jim Irwin from Dick Butolph, and a 5-yard end sweep by Butolph.

The third period proved disastrous, too, as quarterback Butolph went for his second TD on a 2-yard plunge and his third on an 80-yard punt return. In addition, he kicked two extra points.

Bill Baekas, a freshman half-back, romped 20 yards for the last Kearney score.

Wayne penetrated two yards into Kearney territory on one play in the first half, got to the enemy 39 on a third-quarter drive, and engineered one sustained push in the final canto. Pat Shimoda started that drive on the Wayne five with a 22-yard dash and later reached the Kearney six on a 35-yard run. Wayne lost on the next four plays.

Pender crushed the Allen Bulldogs 25-0 Friday afternoon as the Brink twins combined to score the total points. Joe Brink scored three touchdowns while Jim tallied one and the extra point.

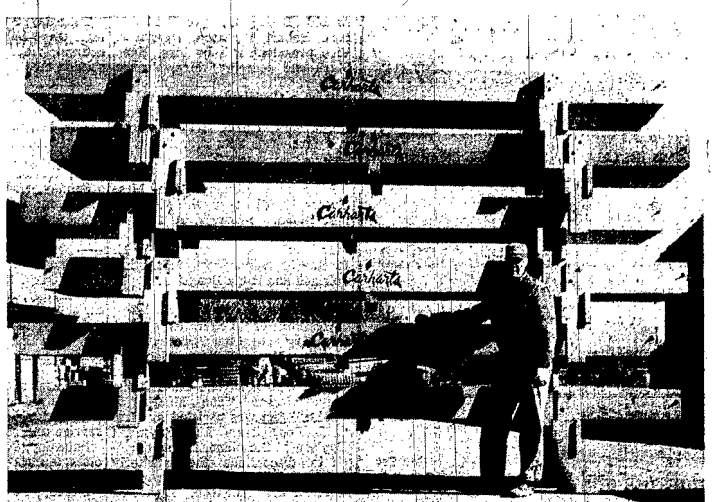

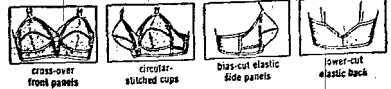

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search for available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Debasement

A substantial number of states have right-to-work laws — laws which say, in effect, that a man is free to join or not join a union, as he chooses, and still hold his job without coercion from either side.

The union dredged up a means of getting around this by the device of the "agency shop." Under it a worker would still be free to refuse to join a union, but he would have to pay the dues and fees.

Some time ago the National Labor Relations board held that the agency-shop was illegal. But now the board's membership has changed, and in a recent decision it ordered a company in Indiana — a right-to-work state — to negotiate with a union on an agency shop proposal.

It is hardly conceivable that Congress, in establishing the right of the states to pass right-to-work laws if they so choose, intended that a man who did not want to join a union would still have

to contribute to its treasury. So it would seem that, in the light of the board's reversal of past policy, that new clarifying legislation is urgently needed. And it debases the concept of unionism to define its "security" as the denial to individual freedom.

In 1800 when the seat of government was moved from Philadelphia to the new city of Washington, the entire move consisted of just 54 office clerks and five large and seven small boxes containing the files. Today the U. S. Government is the biggest in the world. It employs nearly 2 1/2 million civilians. It consists of 2,283 different agencies and owns land on the continental U. S. aggregating 21 times the area of the state of South Carolina.

Walnuts Need Pruning

Many of the shelterbelt plantings made about 20 years ago have walnut trees that need pruning. A University of Nebraska Extension forester reminds farmstead owners and operators. Dick Gavit, stationed at Pierce, pointed out that walnut consistently brings a higher price per thousand feet than any other species in Nebraska. A tree with a limby bole may have no market value at all or may be sold only as a saw log. But a tree with lower branches removed to produce a clear bole for veneer can be worth up to ten times more than a saw log tree, Gavit said.

An Extension forester will visit woodlots to discuss problems with the owner, he added. Contact should be made through county Extension agents. Safety The Year Around

One week each year is designated as "Farm Safety Week." The need for a continuous safety program is emphasized by the daily reports of accidents during corn harvest.

Many operators justify disregard of ordinary safety practices to get their corn in before bad weather comes.

That extra minute or two you try to save may result in permanent injury for the rest of your life, or possibly in death.

Farmers use power machinery the year around in feeding, haying and many other operations. We suggest posting these few simple safety rules where all machine operators will read them.

1. Stop the machine for any adjustment.
2. Never operate without safety shields in place.
3. Dress for the job — snug fitting clothing helps.
4. Move about with care to avoid falls.
5. Beware of fire hazards.
6. Use care when traveling on roads — use flags and correct lighting.

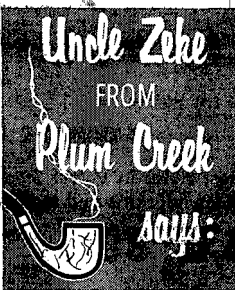

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Capitol News ... Try Promoting Highway Safety Through Teenagers

Gov. Frank Morrison is reaching out to the teen-age bracket in his continuing effort to promote highway safety.

Youths from Lincoln Saturday are expected to attend Saturday for a statewide youth safety conference. The conference will be held in the modern Center for Continuing Education on the University of Nebraska agriculture campus.

Alarmed at the mounting traffic death toll in Nebraska, Gov. Morrison explained, "I'm trying to use every tool available to make the people safety-conscious."

Already the governor has set weekend safe driving programs, held a safety conferences out state, named a safety council and foundation and now is aiming at the younger set.

Addressing the teenagers at the conference will be Dr. A. L. Chapman, assistant surgeon general and chief of the Division of Accident Prevention of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Gov. Morrison, who was severely injured in an automobile accident several years ago in which a friend died, is personally interested in traffic safety. The fact that Nebraska has the second best fatality record of the north central states is of no consolation to him.

"I'm only thinking of the hundreds of homes in Nebraska that have suffered the loss of a loved one," the governor said.

Big Business

The man who is in charge of tourist promotion in Nebraska — State Game Commission Director Mel Steen — thinks that within 10 years tourism can boom into one of the largest businesses in the state.

He told the Legislative Council study committee on tourism that with a proper promotion and development program, Nebraskans can realize \$500 million annually from tourists.

He says the state is moving too slow now and that his estimate is ultra-conservative since the U. S.

Park Service believes the state has the potential to hit \$800 million annually.

Steen says agriculture should be vitally interested in tourist promotion since it has a great indirect benefit for them.

He says tourists spend 32 percent of their money — the largest single amount — for foodstuffs. Gasoline and lodging take up from 20 to 24 percent each and the rest is spent for other items such as fees and knickknacks.

Valuable Plaque

Diamonds soon will glitter in the State Capitol.

Building Supt. R. C. Newell is having a diamond-studded plaque repaired and will have it displayed in the Statehouse when a suitable location is found.

The plaque — with 75 perfect diamonds in it — was presented to the state on its 75th birthday by the Jewelers Guild, Omaha.

Regular Meetings

Regular weekly meetings have begun for the State Standards and Specifications Committee at the order of Gov. Frank Morrison.

The committee, a policy-making group for the administration of state purchasing laws, met only sporadically in the past.

Morrison says that now anyone with suggestions for improving purchasing procedures and specifications can present them each week to the committee.

Membership of the committee is Tax Commissioner Forrest Johnson, State Engineer John Hossack and Purchasing Agent George Morris.

Controversy over state purchasing has been in the news the past few months.

Committee Meetings

Several Legislative Council study committees either met or had meetings scheduled this month. Still to be held are meetings of the committee on the aircraft gasoline tax Nov. 16 and the committee on the gasoline tax Nov. 17.

Committees which already have held meetings this month include the tourism committee, the committee on educational problems in the Omaha area, the public power committee, the school lands committee, the road district law committee and the committee on state purchasing.

Interstate

The interstate highway between Omaha and Lincoln is providing a boom for some tow-in operators. The high speed limit of 75 mph is a contributing factor since many cars have not been driven for distances at that speed before and break down, especially the older models.

Another factor is that stalled autos must be removed from the highway within two hours after the breakdown.

Much of the time of state troopers patrolling the highway is spent in assisting stalled motorists.

Concentration

A Legislative Council study committee looking into the problems of education in the Omaha area learned that three counties in that area handle one-third of the students in the state.

Freeman Decker, commissioner of education, said Douglas, Sarpy and Cass counties have some 110,000 of the 340,000 students from kindergarten through the twelfth grade in the state.

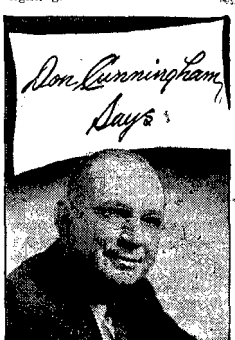

Dairy Picture Changing

Thirty years ago almost every Nebraska farm had some milk cows. Dairy cow numbers in the state have decreased about one-third in 30 years. Fewer farmers are now milking more cows. Less than one-half of our farmers now milk cows which accounts for the larger dairy herds. Butter is still the principal dairy product made in Nebraska. But not so in the rest of the nation where ice cream, cheese and dry milk have become more important.

While Nebraska still sells more than half of its dairy production as cream, the rising demand for products other than butter, encourages the sale of whole milk. New whole milk markets which have developed in recent years have a rapidly eliminating cream buyers.

Refrigerated tanks which allow bulk handling by trucks is proving to be most practical. The investment required for this modern equipment in most cases is not justified for less than 20 cow
