Begin Farm-City Week to Aid Joint Understanding

The rising retail cost of goods which make up the "Consumer Food Basket" along with subsidies and other farm programs have led to a great deal of misunderstanding among farm and city residents and are inappropriate subjects of interest during Farm-City Week being observed Nov. 17-24.

The Farm City Week has been established to promote understanding between city and farm dwellers.

Along the lines of the Food Basket thought, statistics show the farm producing only 25 cents for each dollar spent for farm grown food. And since 1949, due to the "price-cost squeeze," prices received by the farmer for his crops and livestock dropped 12 percent. But prices he pays for equipment, supplies and services have gone up 20 percent.

The "emergency bill" has changed over the years to now include many other items than just farm production. In fact, one study shows non-food purchases average about 20 percent of the grocery bill.

Dr. Dale Flowerday, superintendent of NE Nebraska Experimental Farm, has pointed up some of the difficulties between farm and city communications in the following article.

Farmers are a minority group, constituting only nine percent of the total U. S. population. The present trend is toward an even greater reduction in the number of farmers required to meet the nation's agricultural needs.

The farmer has recently become the "whipping boy" of the majority of the press. City newspapers, magazines, newscasters, columnists, cartoonists—even church papers—have had their turn at the whip.

Farmers are blamed for rising food costs, high taxes, federal deficits and rising inflation. Public opinion has formed a picture of the farmer as an individual standing around "with his hands" receiving exorbitant hand-outs at the expense of the rest of us taxpayers.

Farmer's public relations have reached an all-time low and something is urgently needed to correct the situation. Continuation of the present trend could lead politicians, with an ever-sensitive ear to the ground of public opinion, to abandon farmers in great numbers. This could lead to limited opportunities, restrictive legislation, powerless bargaining position, and economic mediocrity instead of sound farm programs.

This could give rise to a "sick" agricultural and in turn to a "sick" national economy. Why? Because agricultural is big business!

Farm expenses for the production of crops and livestock total 25 billion dollars a year plus an additional 15 billion dollars a year spent on goods and services. The government collected about \$1,250,000,000 in income taxes plus real estate taxes of \$1,200,000,000 and \$280,000,000 in personal property taxes in 1959.

The investment in agriculture now exceeds 203 billion dollars, or an amount equal to 75 percent of the value of current assets of all United States corporations. Farmers have twice as much invested in machinery as the entire steel industry, five times as much as the automobile industry.

Over 23 million workers find employment in agriculture and in agricultural industries. Ten million people are employed in transporting, processing and merchandising agricultural products, with another six million workers in providing supplies for the farmer.

Farming is big business and agricultural economy affects the entire nation.

Farm-City Week should bring

out these facts and point out the close economic and political relationship between the rural and urban dweller.

Solution to the divergence of opinion does not lie in finger-pointing, name-calling or shoulder-shrugging. Blaming politicians in an effort to shift public opinion does not help. After all, these are our elected representatives and reflect your thinking and opinions.

A more realistic approach to the solution is through education and research and better understanding of "both sides of the coin." Farmers need to take an honest look at present and future farm policies and programs to determine whether they are in long-range interest of the public. City dwellers need to understand that over 30 percent of the U.S.D.A. budget expenditures are passed on directly to the consumer in the form of food inspection and distribution services and long-range programs for resource improvement. Not all monies spent are for "hand-out" subsidies. In recent years farmers have been caught in the "cost-price" squeeze so that in 1959 farm income was less than half that of the national average.

A program of better understanding could come through the extension service, Chambers of Commerce, service clubs or other groups. If the facts are clearly and correctly presented, the American public can form their own opinion. The task is "to educate not advocate."

An educational program to promote better understanding is not a glamorous or easy job. Results won't come overnight. Modern communication allows us to flash a message around the world in a few seconds, but to get the same message through a 1/2-inch of hunkin' skill may require months or even years. An effective public relations program is a continuous, tedious process.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Price of Welfareism

From U. S. News & World Report: "Nearly 132 billion dollars—that's what it cost taxpayers last year to run the Federal, State and local governments. And the load keeps rising. The private economy is growing too, but not as fast as taxes."

"The average man works a fourth of his time to pay his tax bill."

All in all, the magazine goes on to point out, the tax burden today is close to 30 percent of the entire national output—20.4 percent of that output being taken by the Federal government and 8.2 percent by State and local government. Percentage-wise, state and local tax collections have shown the most rapid

rise in late years. But the possibility of further increases in the Federal tax load is facing us.

What's the solution? There are various answers, some of a highly technical nature. But one thing is sure—unless non-essential spending is eliminated at all levels of government, the time will come when you'll be working a third or a half or two-thirds of your time to pay the cost of government. This is the price of having government take care of you from cradle to grave.

Capitol News . . . Lautenschlager Committee Now Studying State Buying

A thorough look at state buying is the goal of a committee of state senators now studying the state purchasing department. Its chairman, Sen. Marvin Lautenschlager, Grand Island, says his group, the Legislative Council committee investigating state purchases, will deal only with facts, not rumors.

This is one of the reasons the committee has decided that all testimony will be given under oath before the group.

Committee members feel that sworn testimony will help minimize presentation of statements not based on fact and thus aid the group in making a report on its findings. Next meeting of Lautenschlager's committee is scheduled for Nov. 20.

At that time, the senator said, four agencies will be asked to appear—game commission, motor vehicles department, agriculture department and the aeronautics department.

The agriculture department will be queried on what Lautenschlager calls an "ideal" setup for buying of state goods.

Proposed acquisition of mechanized filing cabinets will be one of the top subjects concerning the motor vehicle department. The game commission will be asked to describe procedures used in buying land and the aeronautics department on methods of acquiring state airplanes.

Lautenschlager says the inquiry by the committee does not necessarily mean something is wrong in the methods employed by the three departments.

The first two meetings of the purchasing committee generally covered the field of controversies already in the public print regarding buying of dictating equipment, office furniture and the ruckus about requiring colored photographs on driver's licenses.

Meanwhile, Gov. Frank Morrison's government reorganization committee said State Purchasing Agent George Morris has been operating his department properly and that there was no evidence of irregularities concerning the dictating equipment, office furniture or over specifications for taking of colored pictures.

Tax Problems

A private tax research group, the Nebraska Citizens' Council, has offered to undertake a study of the state's tax problem, for \$15,000.

The last Legislature appropriated \$30,000 for this purpose, but the Legislative Council committee assigned the study, said \$30,000 would not be adequate.

Gov. Frank Morrison, in the meantime, said there is "little

possibility of a special session of the Legislature on the tax question. He said he doubted legislators would support an added appropriation for a tax study even if they were summoned to Lincoln.

Morrison says there are at least two major things he would like a study to reveal:

—How much the lack of an income tax affects drawing of industry to Nebraska.

—The extent to which a sales tax would affect business of a border city, and the buying power of the bulk of the state's citizens.

School Districts

Nebraska still has more school districts than any other state in the nation, despite another reduction of the total last year.

That's the report of the state department of education which says that 51 percent of the school districts have disappeared since 1949.

But, the department said, one out of every 11 school districts in the nation is found in Nebraska.

Dr. F. B. Decker, state commissioner of education, says in 1949 Nebraska had 6,734 districts compared with the current total of 3,272.

Last year, Decker reported, 22 counties cut the number of school districts each had by 10 percent or more: Dixon, Dakota, Greeley, Wayne, Butler, Knox, Loup, Perkins, Kaline, Fillmore, Nemaha, Wheeler, York, Chase, Sarpy, Grant Valley, Johnson, Nance, Holt, Howard and Washington.

Farm Prices

Nebraska farmers got less for products they produced during the month ending Oct. 15, according to the State-Federal division of agricultural statistics.

The division said the mid-October farm commodity index was down three points from September, although it was four points higher than mid-October of last year.

Compared to a year ago, prices were generally higher for crops and cattle, but lower for hogs, milk and poultry products, the division reported.

Cattle Brands

Two-thirds of the 12,000 cattle brands due to expire at the end of the year have been renewed, Secretary of State Frank Marsh says.

Marsh said the figure shows the progress made in handling the renewal process by brand owners and the stock brand division of his office.

Brands, a protection against cattle rustling, are renewed every four years.

Owners of brands who have lost names beginning with the letters L through Z must renew by Jan. 1, 1962, Marsh said. Owners with names in the first part of the alphabet renewed their Brands Jan. 1, 1960.

County Agent's Column

Farm-City Week Nov. 17-23

To focus more direct attention on the achievements of American agriculture and the interdependence of farm and city, President John F. Kennedy has proclaimed the period from Nov. 17-23 as Farm-City Week.

More than 10,000 U. S. and Canadian communities participated in Farm-City Week in 1960

—the sixth year of its observance. Every year more groups are joining hands in this worthwhile program to build better understanding between rural and urban neighbors.

The motto of this year's observance, which ends Thanksgiving Day, is "Farm and City — Partners in Progress."

Three of the main purposes of the special week, according to Farm-City committee officials, are:

—To bring about a better understanding between rural and urban people throughout Nebraska.

—To increase the knowledge and appreciation of each for the American Way of Life.

—To demonstrate the gratitude of all our people for the bounty of nature, the dignity of work, the joy of fellowship, and the benefits of the American free enterprise system.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has pointed out that "Unlike the development of atomic energy or of space rockets, the farmer's achievements have no overtones of man's destruction. The one and only meaning is peaceful — the ending of man's age-old quest for food, and the brightest hope for underfed millions in newly developing countries with whom we share both our abundance and our ability to produce it."

Among facts farmers can be proud of:

Only nine percent of the U. S. population are farmers, yet they feed our nation well (75 percent of the workers in China and India work to produce food and still don't get the job done).

U. S. farmers feed the nation cheaply (the factory worker toiled 51 hours per month to feed his family in 1950 — today he can feed them by working 40 hours per month). The farmer's portion of the retail food dollar fell from 53c in 1945 to less than 40c today.

Protein Boosts Gains

Studies at the NE Experiment station this fall indicate that a protein supplement can pay dividends when fed to beef calves on corn stalk pasture.

Walter Tolman, station staff member, says that three-fourths of a pound of extra protein concentrate per day increased daily gains from 7 to over 1 pound per day. The protein also was fed in amounts of one-fourth and one pound per head daily.

"We started to compare self-fed protein blocks to a daily feed of one pound of soybean pellets," Tolman reports. "However, we were unable to get the 350-pound calves to eat over one-fourth of a pound of protein in block form on the average. The blocks were placed near the water tank and salt was withheld to induce the calves to eat more."

"Yearlings or larger calves might have eaten more of the protein in block form," Tolman points out. "If the grain had been scarce in the field, the protein blocks might have been more attractive. But stockmen sometimes complain that cattle eat too much protein in block form."

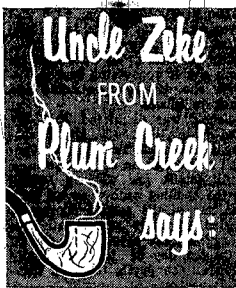

thus increasing costs.

"The calves liked the soybean pellets. In a few days they came to the pickup horn call to get their supplement. This provided a good opportunity for health inspection. Bunks are needed, however, to prevent waste in feeding small pellets, especially if the ground is wet or covered with snow."

"In the final analysis, we believe each stockman must consider the convenience and cost under his conditions in deciding between protein blocks or pellets for providing supplement to the cattle pasturing corn stalks," Tolman concluded.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TRUTH

First Church of Christ Daniel Esprit, pastor

Have you ever evaluated the things around you? I mean things that you use or depend on or see or are conscious of each day. Possibly at some time or other you have evaluated some of them, at least. But have you ever realized the value of such things as integrity, stability, law, grace, justice and truth? Certainly they are at least as valuable as the tangible items in this universe.

Let us consider truth. What is it? My dictionary says it is: "That which is true; a statement or a belief which corresponds to reality. A fact; as the object of correct belief; reality."

We might say that truth is singular. If a statement differs from the truth it is not the truth. If two statements do not agree, then we know that one (or both) has to be at least part way false.

Truth is valuable in all our dealings of all kinds. A knowledge of the truth is power: First, having true premises to base our reasoning on, we can arrive at a true conclusion. Secondly, knowing the truth enables one to act wisely. And thirdly, knowing the truth enables us to give correct information to others.

Without truth there can be no confidence, no justice, no fair dealings. Our society is very dependent on truth. We certainly want to know the truth about some things, such as things we are about to buy, people we are about to have dealings with, our economic position, our physical condition and our nations dealings abroad. If someone gives out false information about these matters, they are looked down upon and condemned sharply. Yes, the truth concerning these matters is very important to us, and it should be.

The things mentioned above are important for a few years, our lifetime here on earth. But what then? Eternity will be many times longer than your life on earth. You will be prepared to spend it happily only if you have received and obeyed the truth concerning it. This truth can be gained only from Christ. Of himself he said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. No man cometh unto the Father but by me."

He also said, "Narrow is the gate and straightened is the way that leadeth unto life and few there be that find it." But many, many people are not concerned about this more important truth.

Even many of those who profess to be concerned, just drift along with the throng. We should be like the people in Berea, who gladly received teaching from the apostle Paul and searched the scriptures daily to see if it was true. Are you searching the scriptures? One teaching the truth will not object to investigation. Likewise an honest teacher will be continually searching to make sure he is teaching all the truth.

We must remember that truth is singular. We also notice that Christ speaks of one way and that a narrow one. If there are more ways or parts of ways taught, someone must be adding to or subtracting some truth somewhere. One of the values of knowing the truth is that it enables us to give correct informa-

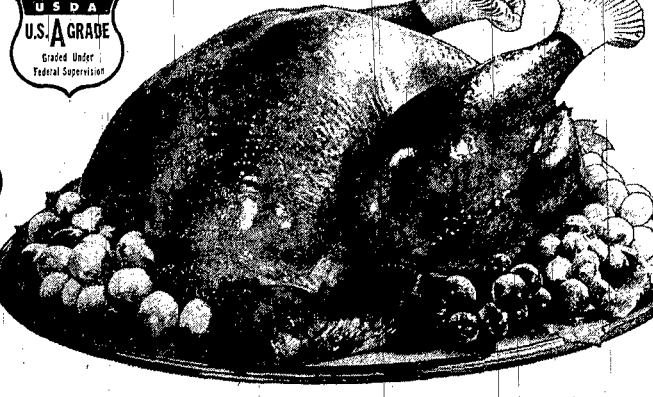
