An opportunity to hear the methods used by a community of 4,500 to bring industry to town and how Wayne can help itself toward this goal, will be presented at the annual Wayne Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday.

Three Denison, Ia., businessmen and A. D. Anderson, manager of the Iowa Beef Packers, Inc., packing plant at Denison, will discuss Denison's activities in the area of the packing industry, answering all questions from the floor in a "no holds barred" discussion.

The type of informal discussion will provide an excellent method of presenting the problems and rewards of a small town seeking industry.

The businessmen can give the audience first hand insight on how such industry affected the growth and economy of their town.

Three new Chamber board members will also be elected from a slate of six nominated. On the slate will be Leroy Othe, Robert Johnson, sr., Dr. Russell M. Owen, Dr. W. A. Koerber, Ed Kampnath and Alvin Voorhies.

Honorary board members are Robert Cron, Robert McLean, Robert Merrigan and Dr. W. A. Brown.

The meeting will begin at 6:45 p.m. at the Hotel Morrison. Tickets are on sale at the State National bank and the First National bank, Wayne.

Special Award to Baptist Church

The First Baptist church, Wayne, has been notified that the church will be honored by its denomination at a special recognition service Sunday at 11 a.m. at the church.

The Board of Education and Publication of the American Baptist Convention has given the church the 1961 Standard of Achievement Recognition. The special presentation will be made by Rev. Russell Dacken, the church's pastor. He was selected to act on behalf of the Convention.

The church gained the recognition by attaining 10 goals of the Standard of Achievement for American Baptist Sunday church schools. Only a limited number of the thousands of Sunday schools in the American Baptist Convention receive this recognition.

"Our Board of Christian Education and our teachers and officers, as well as the members of our Sunday church school, are to be congratulated on this achievement," Rev. Dacken said.

Postmaster Gives Tips On Christmas Mailing

Christmas mailings are just around the corner. Wayne postmaster Don Wightman, reminded patrons today, and a large volume is expected.

You can help speed your Christmas mail by mailing early and often, Wightman said. To insure fast handling, ask the window clerk for "Local" and "Out of Town" labels. Then tie your letters in bundles and use the labels.

You can be sure your Christmas letter will be delivered any place in the United States if mailed by Dec. 12.

Wightman also had some good advice on mailing packages.

Be sure you have the correct and complete address on letters and parcels, with your return address in the upper left hand corner. Please use the zone number, if known, on letters to large cities.

The postal department urges the use of a wax crayon to address parcels and not small stickers. A sticker can be lost. And please address only one side of the parcel.

Sewage Disposal Site Land Given Approval

The council passed a resolution Tuesday giving the mayor and city attorneys power to begin eminent domain proceedings on the purchase of about 86 acres of land from Herb Perry for a sewage disposal site. Cost of the land will be \$600 per acre.

The site is located on the south east edge of Wayne.

An ordinance was also passed starting eminent domain action for the opening of Logan street across the Chicago and North Western railroad tracks. Records show the street had never been completed across the tracks and had not been eliminated through lack of use.

Grant to WSTC to Buy Atomic Research Goods

A federal grant of \$6,500 will enable Wayne State College to buy equipment for atomic research.

Dr. W. G. Ingram, professor of physical science, has received notice that the Atomic Energy Commission granted his request for the funds. It is Wayne's first federal grant for nuclear equipment.

College is one of 106 in nation sharing nearly one million dollars. The only other Nebraska institution receiving a grant is Creighton university, which got \$8,000.

Dr. Ingram said the AEC specified that equipment purchased with the \$6,500 should be useful in biology and medical research. He will direct the program, reporting to the AEC on the equipment acquired and the uses that are made of it.

WSTC Hosts Two-Day Debate Tournament

Wayne State college plays host to its annual invitational debate tournament Friday and Saturday with 20 colleges from seven states competing.

Tournament Director Lenore Ramsey, WSTC professor of speech, has registrations for 76 debate teams, plus individual entries in discussion, oratory and extemporaneous speaking.

Assisting her in directing the event are Dr. William Ristow and Agnes Harear of the speech faculty, and Bonnie Lott, senior from Wayne.

States represented in the tourney are Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

The entry list is so large that Miss Ramsey is drawing on numerous graduates in the Wayne area to serve as judges.

Marketing Association Sets Meeting Tonight

The Cooperative Marketing Association, Laurel, will hold a meeting for dairymen at the Wayne city hall tonight (Thursday) at 8 p.m.

There will be a discussion of "A Better Market for your Milk," a movie and a question and answer period.

Ask Registration In Civil Defense Classes for Jan. 4

Persons interested in attending civil defense classes at Wayne city high beginning Jan. 4 are asked to call the school (26) so they may be registered. Questions on the course can also be answered by a call to the school.

The course, "Survival Preparedness," will be taught for six consecutive meetings starting Jan. 4 at 7:30 p.m. at the high school. The classes will each last an hour.

The course is designed to acquaint enrollees with disaster, whether it be a nuclear attack, tornadoes, fire, flood or propaganda. The first lesson deals with the conflict of national ideologies.

The courses are free and everyone who attends the six meetings will receive a certificate from the State Department of Education.

There are no tests, just films, lectures and question periods.

Five high school faculty members will teach the courses, each taking different lessons.

Firms Offer Free Lot Parking in Downtown Area

Customers of over 25 Wayne bus lines will receive an added bonus of free downtown parking starting Dec. 1. The new lot is located just behind the Council Oak Store and across the street south from the Corvair garage.

Upon entering the lot, car drivers will pay 15c to an attendant who will in turn give them a perforated card to be placed on the gear shift lever. At the bottom of the card is a tab which may be torn off. Upon presentation of this tab to any of the validating business houses, the customer will be refunded his 15c parking fee. Names of validating firms will be prominently displayed at the entrance to the lot.

Ben Lass will serve as parking lot attendant until Jan. 1 when an automatic machine which dispenses the tickets will be installed by the Selfpark Corporation of California. A local group, Wayne Parking, Inc., is sponsoring the lot.

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Livestock, Poultry Producers Receive Special Questions

Some Wayne area livestock and poultry producers will receive questionnaire cards within the next few days, according to A. V. Nordquist, Agricultural Statistician for the state.

These cards go out to some 20,000 such producers in the state.

The questionnaires are the first step in the annual survey of livestock and poultry production and marketing conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The survey determines the number of animals on hand, as well as the egg, milk and wool production.

"The livestock survey," Nordquist said, "provides the basic information for livestock poultry, and wool reports used by producers and marketing men in planning their year's activities." He added that a large response to the survey by producers helps insure more reliable estimates for the coming year.

Rural mail carriers distribute the questionnaire cards for the Department of Agriculture to selected farms and ranches along their routes and pick up the completed cards. The local postmasters take care of getting the cards back to the State Statisticians and the Statistical Reporting Service in Washington, the agency in the Department conducting the survey.

Heavy Balloting Begins For Last Three Weeks of Voting

A Concord girl, Karen Borg, has jumped to an early lead in the 17-town race for the NE Nebraska Yuletide Princess crown. Karen tallied 503,000 votes at the Monday night counting.

Close behind her is Sandra Holland, Wisner, with 469,000. Joni Jeffrey, Wayne, is third with 397,000. And another Wisner girl, Cara Aloson, is fourth with 345,000.

The rest of the top ten vote getters include: Linda Forbes, Wayne, 310,000; Bonnie Fralin, Carroll, 293,000; Linda Boyer, Wayne, 281,000; Lea Ann Jensen, Wayne, 247,000; Debbie Allen, Wayne, 242,000; and Joyce Grone, Wayne, 226,000.

Ballots have been cast for a girl in every town, even this early, in the race.

The list of participating towns are found on page one, section one.

Shoppers in Wayne receive 1,000 votes for every dollar spent up to \$100, then 1,000 votes for every \$100 over that.

Shoppers casting votes are reminded to fill out the ballot completely with name and address. If you are sure your candidate falls within the age bracket, the age need not be on the ballot as it can be checked later.

The contest is open to all girls in the participating towns who are eight to 12 years of age anytime during the contest period. The immediately families of employees of participating firms are not eligible to compete, nor are last year's Yuletide Princess and bicycle winners. Mailing addresses will be used to determine the town residence of each candidate.

Last year's Yuletide Princess was a 9-year-old Pilger girl, Mary Duncan, who amassed over 30 million votes. A total of nearly 600-million votes were cast in a month-long contest.

The girl named Yuletide Princess will receive \$100 and the high vote getter in each of the 16 other towns will receive a bicycle, all donated by participating Wayne Chamber of Commerce members.

Ballots, good for 1,000 votes each can be found in the advertisements of participating merchants in this issue of the Herald.

The standings will appear each week in the Herald.

The contest closes with business hours Dec. 23 and the winner will be announced in the Dec. 28 issue of the Herald.

Special Education Class Faces Wayne School Board

The Wayne school board has been studying for some time the problems concerned with the establishment of a room for mentally retarded children. Funds will be available next year through Legislative Bill 411 to help trainable retarded children, but many facts of such aid must be studied.

The school board now is to meet with an official of the State Education Division to hear the complete details of the program.

Just in the past few months has the situation of retarded youngsters in this area come into direct focus. This enlightenment has come about through the efforts of the Tri-County Association for Retarded Children. This group consists of parents whose interest was stimulated to the point of finally organizing into an effective group.

Many points have been brought out by such groups as this, facts on retardation that everyone should know.

Here are just a few facts every citizen should know to intelligently ponder what help can be given these youngsters.

Between two and three percent of the general population is in some degree mentally retarded. This is two or three out of every 100 people.

There are 300 mentally retarded babies born daily in the U.S. That's nearly a 1,000 since day before yesterday.

A special point: Mental retardation is not the same as mental illness, and three-fourths of all mental retardates can be rehabilitated.

Many of the mental retardates are now in our elementary schools, trying to do work beyond their capacities. But if they had work designed for their abilities, they could be successful and self-confident.

With proper training, the majority could be tax-payers instead of wards of the tax-payers.

It has been determined that heredity plays a much smaller part

in mental retardation than was formerly thought.

And there are at least 90 known diseases that contribute to retardation. Accidents and unknown factors are also responsible.

Of the estimated three percent of the population of all ages who are retarded, 2.5 percent are educable. They will develop mental ages from approximately eight years to nearly normal. They can usually progress far enough in reading and arithmetic for elementary every day needs.

In adolescence and adulthood they need special help in vocational adjustment through integrated community facilities. Most of them can become self-supporting adults, capable of managing their own affairs, provided their living conditions are favorable. But they may need occasional counseling in periods of crisis.

About 4 percent are trainable and will develop mental ages from two or three to about eight years. Many have capabilities for learning self-care, patterns of acceptable social behavior and may do useful work under sheltered conditions.

Only about 1 percent are completely dependent, with mature mental ages below two or three years. Most have some physical handicap as well, but some have responded to training along minimum social lines. They must have constant supervision whether at home or in specially designed residential centers.

In other words, in a completely representative group of 1,000 general population, there will be 30 mentally retarded, 25 will be educable; four will be trainable and one will be dependent.

A particular point stressed by the Tri-County group is that no one should ever consider mental retardation shameful. Only by recognizing the problem, can parents really give their retarded child the opportunity he deserves.

Capitol News . . . Committee Steps Up Study Of Community Development

Enthusiasm is mounting for work of the group of state senators studying community development problems. Headed by Sen. William Brandt, Unadilla, the Legislative Council committee has plunged into its job with vigor. It is attempting to initially discover the answers to these points:

1. What can small towns do to improve their economic status?
2. What services are available to the towns to help them improve their lot?

Connected with the committee's work is the answer to why some towns are booming. Is a business responsible, a civic organization or some industry? The committee agreed tentatively to hold a series of regional meetings to give communities a chance to give a first-hand view of their problems. Four or five meetings are scheduled.

So far the committee has fielded suggestions calling for legislation to allow villages, counties and areas to form joint planning bodies since small towns have no way to finance planning and promotional programs.

The State Chamber of Commerce told the committee it should dwell directly on the problems that have to do with creation or stimulation of the economic development of communities.

The League of Nebraska Municipalities said the 25 mill levy ceiling now imposed on cities under 1,000 population should be raised. Of the state's 539 incorporated towns, 430 are under 1,000 population.

Many services are available to small communities but they are not aware of them, Brandt's group was told. The committee emphasizes that the idea of its study is to find ways a community can help itself, rather than ways the state can do the job.

Aviation Fuel

The five scheduled airlines in Nebraska say they are concerned about the state's tax of 2 1/2 cents per gallon on aviation fuel. They call it a "mushrooming fuel tax burden."

Testimony on the subject was given to a committee of state senators looking into the problem. A representative of the airlines said they would rather pay direct for facilities and state services used by them, Nebraska is losing revenue from the sale of aviation fuel, the airlines said, because the lines buy the gas from states that have no levy.

It takes about \$500 in taxes to fully refuel a jet airplane, the committee was told.

If all other states taxed at the same rate as Nebraska, the airline spokesman said, the firms would pay an additional \$45 million yearly in taxes.

Revenue from the tax supports operations of the State Aeronautics Department and is used to improve Nebraska airports. In 1960, Nebraska collected \$350,000 in aviation fuel taxes, a record figure, an increase of \$34,000 over the 1959 total.

Chairman of the committee is Sen. William Moulton, Omaha. One of the questions being studied besides whether the tax should be continued, is whether a lesser rate should be imposed for jet fuel.

Atomic Fallout

The State Board of Health has been told by a radiologist that he is personally not excited about the fallout resulting from testing of atomic weapons. The statement came from Dr. Maurice Frazer, Lincoln, a former member of the board.

In his radiological practice, the doctor said, he gets more exposure to radiation than will persons from fallout. However, he said, if there were a nuclear war that would be a different matter.

But, Frazer also said that establishment of an association that could measure radiation fallout would be a good idea.

Frazer said there is no proof that fallout has ever caused disease in human beings, the genetic effect is unknown, and fallout itself produces little radiation.

Indian Help

The governor's office says adequate law enforcement in Indian areas should help rehabilitation and development of them as tourist attractions.

Norman Otto, administrative assistant to Gov. Frank Morrison, says with proper enforcement there should also be possibilities of industrial development using the many talents Indians have in arts, crafts and other handicrafts.

Deputy State Sheriffs will be used in Thurston and Sheridan counties to aid in enforcement problems there, Otto said.

The last Legislature appropriated \$31,000 to aid in the law enforcement program.

Safety Program

A one-year state employee safety

ty program is going to be launched under coordination of the State Labor Department. The problem of injuries to state personnel has caused some concern among top state officials who say that besides the personal suffering involved, the injuries are becoming increasingly costly to the state.

Included in the program will be a two-day safety training school for selected supervisors of the various state installations, and inauguration of safety coordinators and committees in all state departments and institutions.

The idea stemmed from the office of Gov. Frank Morrison.

County Agent's Column

Trees Available

Farmers may place orders now for trees under the Clarke-McNary program by contacting county Extension agents. A special circular, E.C. 1728, entitled "Application Blank and Information on Clarke-McNary Trees," lists the varieties available and other pertinent information. Seedling trees can be obtained for planting windbreaks, shelterbelts and wood lots. Here are the available species:

Tall Broadleaf Species: Chinese Elm, American Elm, Hackberry and Honeylocust.

Medium to Short Broadleaf Species: Green Ash, Russian Olive, Russian Mulberry, Boxelder and Wild Plum.

Shrubs: Cotoneaster, Honey-suckle and Lilac.

Evergreen Transplants: Red-cedar, Ponderosa Pine, Austrian Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper and Colorado Blue Spruce.

All trees will be shipped in late March or early April, 1962, from the Nebraska National Forest at Halsey. Prices are as follows: Broadleaf species, \$3 per 100; Evergreens, \$5 per 100, and shrubs, \$4.50 per 100. Prices include handling, packing and shipping charges.

Vaccinate Feedlot Lambs

When lambs are placed in feedlots they should be vaccinated for "overeating disease" or enterotoxemia as soon as they are rested and accustomed to new surroundings.

If vaccination is delayed until symptoms show, it will be too late to do anything about the condition, reports Dr. Crosby Howe, University of Nebraska Extension animal hygienist. Lambs suffering from the disease may be found on their sides, feet in a running motion and heads drawn back. In other cases, no symptoms may be noticed and the lambs may die overnight.

The disease can be prevented by vaccination and starting the

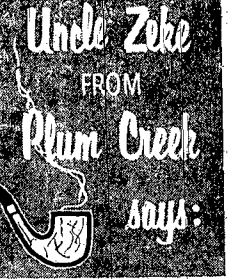
lamb on a high roughage ration. Lambs should be started slowly on grain.


