Aviation Fuel
The five scheduled airlines in Nebraska say they are conceerned about the state's kay of 2½ cents per gallon on aviation fuel. They call it a "mushrooming fuel tax burden."
Testimony on the subject was given to a committee of state senators looking into the problem. A representative of the aid-lines said they would rather pay, direct for facilities and state services itsed by them. Nebraska is losing revenue from the sale of aviation fuel, the aidlines said, because the lines buy the gas from stakes that have ho levy. It takes about \$500 in taxes to fully relued a jet aighner, the committee was told.

If all other states taxed at the same rate as Nebraska, the airline spokesman said, the firms would pay an additional \$45 million yearly in taxes.

Revenue from the tax supports operations of the \$1 at e Aeronauties Department) and is used to improve Nebraska airports. In 1960, Nebraska collected \$359,000 in aviation fuel taxes, a-record figure, an increase of \$34,000 over the 1959 total.

Chairman of the committee is Sen. William Moulton, Omaha. One of the questions be in g studied besides whether the tax should be continued is whether a lesser rate should be imposed for jet fuel.

Atomic Fallout

Board of Health has Atomic Fallout

The State Board of Health has been told by a radiologist that he is personally not excited about the fallout resulting from testing of atomic weapons. The statement came from Dr. Maurice Frazer, Lincoln, a former member of the board.

In his radiological practice, the doctor said, he gets more exposure to radiation than will persons from fallout. However, he said, if there were a nuclear war that would be a different matter. But, Frazer also said that establishment of an association that could measure radiation fallout would be a good idea.

Frazer said there is no proof that fallout has ever caused disease in human beings, the genetic effect is lunknown, and fallout itself produces little radiation.






