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



How to Spend It, Where to

Get It Faces the Legislature braska Oil and Gas Commission has decided to eliminate, effect-ive Jan 1, its three-fourths of a mill levy on all oil and gas pro-duced in the state.

The State Auditor's Office says the commission has nearly \$97,-000 in its cash reserve account, about the total for commission expenditures anticipated for the current year.

expenditures anticipated for the current year.
Since it was created 25 months ago, the commission has cut its levy three times, from the initial top of two mills.
The three-member commission was created by the 1858 Legislature to curb wasteful practices in oil and natural gas development.

December is a busy month for committees of the Legislative Council. The council is composed of all state senators who gather as committees to study state problems between sessions of the Legislature.

The committee on purchasing practices meets Dec. 8 and flour hearings are slated Dec. 12, by the committees on tourism, water control, soil conservation and forestry.

During the first 11 months of 1961, the state collected \$41.1 million in taxes on motor fuels, a boost of more than a half million dollars over a similar period in 1960

dollars over a similar period in 1980.

November receipts totaled \$3.7 million, down more than a huarter of a million dollars from the November, 1980, figure.

Receipts were collected in November on 53.4 million gallons of taxable gasoline, 3.3 million gallons of special fuels and 1.2 million gallons of aircraft fuel.

Opponents claim the seminars would provide a springboard to promote liberal views on taxation, or in other words, a sales or income tax.

Sorrell Hearing

A hearing involving Frank Sorrell, chairman of the State Liquour Control Commission, is scheduled to resume Dec. 22 in the statehouse. Gov. Frank Morrison has directed Sorrell to show cause why he should not be removed from office for violating the linour control act.

The state is attempting to show that Sorrell accepted employment from two livensees by agreeing to help them sell their real estate.

Sorrell has claimed he helped on a "wholly, gratuitous" basis, no money changed hands, and he did not, violate the section of law involved, since he was not employed by the licensees.

The state has said that the hearing is not directed against Sorrell's personal integrity or honesty but against the practice involved which could be unhealthy to the state at some future date.

Maintenance workers in the State Highway Department want a pay boost. The request to State Engineer John Hossack was made-by the Nebraska Federation of State, County collal Employes.

Clinton Hoover, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

folks participating in a pilot county have found they can boost their
income, increase their wealth,
improve their communities and
put more dollars in the pockets
of every citizen, through their
own efforts. And they're doing it
with an intensified educational
program in soil fertility, started
this spring.

This program approach is not
new. But it is different from other Extension programs in that
(1) it involves recognition by the
whole community — business and
agriculture alike, of the opportunities for improvement, and
(2) provides for an intensified efford by all members of the community to take positive action towards getting the desired results.

The folks in this pilot county
have been conducting a saturation type educational program,
backed up by mass publicity, for
the purpose of creating a favorable active attitude in the minds
of all neone within the county to

backed up by mass publicity, for the purpose of creating a favorable activel attitude in the minds of all people within the county toward a sound soil fertility program. Their main objective is to promote more efficient crop production and better soil management through more extensive use of soil tests and more efficient use of lime and fertilizer. An effort is being made to persuade as many farmers as possible to have their soils tested and to follow the lime and fertilizer recommendations which are based upon soil test, according to Hoover. The program go t underway this spring with a survey of the county situation. A team of farmer and businessmen interviewed 106 farmers, selected lat random throughout the county. The survey results showed that nearly 40 percent of the farmers had never used lime and 25 percent of the farmers had never used lime and 25 percent of the farmers had never used fertilizer. Yet, research sho w s that farmers are using about one-tenth of the lime and one-fifth of the phosphate they could use profitably.

The long time average conyield in this county is about 45 bushels per acre. At present prices, a farmer would have to grow 111 actes of corn at 45 bushels per, acre to make \$1,000 profit. But under a high level of management, using fertilizer according to soil tests, research shows that corn yields could be elevated to 72 bushels per acre. At this higher yield, it would take only 49 acres of corn to make \$1,000 profit. This means that farmers can make the same amount of pre-

This means that farmers can make the same amount of pro-

profit.

This means that farmers can make the same amount of profit from grain crops on about half the acreage they needed before. This will also permit them to employ better land use practices—seeding down the steeper land into grass to support a livestock program and thus increasing the profits from the over-all business. What are the results from this intensified educational program in soil fettility? "Well, it's too early to tell yet," Hoover states. "The real impact will not be immediately lobrious. It will indoubtedly lake several years before the program can be fully evaluated. Changes in the fertility status of soils crop yields, fertilizer sales, farm income and general prosperity of the county will be logical criteria for evaluation purposes."
