

Christensen Resigns, Board Names Decker, Hike Tuition

The State Normal Board this week took several actions of special interest to Wayne State.

Among them:
Accepting the surprise resignation of Gwynn Christensen, football coach; appointing Dr. Freeman Decker, a Wayne graduate, to the new position of state college coordinator, and approving a change in Wayne's summer session.

The board also voted to increase tuition at all four state colleges, and it finished drafting a handbook of policy governing nearly all activities at the colleges.

Christensen, in his third year as head coach of football and baseball at Wayne, will complete the present school year. He said he has no plans but intends to continue coaching and wants to stay in the Midwest, perhaps nearer his native Wisconsin.

President W. A. Brandenburg had this statement:

"Mr. Christensen has made a fine contribution to the instructional program of Wayne State. Teams coached by him in football and baseball have won more than their share of games, being conference champions in baseball and runner-up in football.

"Mr. Christensen has shown us that a coach and his players can follow practices of good sportsmanship and at the same time win games. This has been forgotten on too many campuses."

Christensen's football teams have compiled a 500 record of 13 wins, 13 losses and one tie. Besides coaching he also teaches physical education.

Decker, a 1930 graduate of Wayne State, has been state commissioner of education (an appointive position) for several years and previously had been the elected state superintendent of education. As commissioner he is ex-officio a member of the Normal Board.

Decker is remembered in this area as a teacher at Carroll and Wayne county superintendent of schools. He married Constance Herndon of Wayne.

The Normal Board adopted a tuition increase of \$10 a term for all four state colleges, effective next September for the regular terms. This means that Nebraska residents enrolled in a full course (12 to 16 credit hours) will pay \$100, and non-residents \$150, in undergraduate courses. Graduate tuition was set at \$125 for residents and \$175 for non-residents.

Tuition for the summer session and for students taking less than 12 hours in any term will be \$9 a credit hour for Nebraskans, and \$13.50 for non-residents in undergraduate courses. The graduate tuition will be \$11 a credit hour for residents, and \$15 for non-residents.

The board approved Wayne's request to offer summer school in two sessions of five weeks each, instead of the former one session of nine weeks. Students may enroll in either or both sessions. This change will be effective next summer.

College-High School Courses Credit Offered Top Seniors

Superior seniors of Wayne High and Wayne Prep will be especially interested in an opportunity Wayne State will offer next term, the chance to attend both high school and college, for credit.

Qualified seniors can enroll in freshman courses on the same basis as college students — do the same college-level work under college grading standards, and get full credit toward a degree at Wayne State.

A few seniors have been admitted to summer classes this way. Now, by vote of the faculty, the honors program is extended to all college terms, beginning with the term that opens Jan. 5.

Seniors from Wayne will, of course, have the best opportunity for taking college classes along with high school work. But students in neighboring towns also may enroll, in either day or night courses, if their schedule permits.

To qualify, a student must rank high in a written examination (the ACT test) and he must have recommendations from high school officials.

Students interested in taking college courses should visit or write to the office of Dr. Karl Meyer, dean of instruction.

The expansion of the college honors program is designed to stimulate talented students and let them make fuller use of their abilities, said President W. A. Brandenburg.

The honors program, gaining momentum each term, will add another phase in the second term — a senior honors colloquium for students who have a 3.5 grade average in major and minor fields and a 3.0 overall average.

Seniors in this seminar-type course will pursue independent research and share their findings with other members of the colloquium, from all the academic divisions. Faculty advisers will attend the sessions, but students are expected to take the lead in discussions.

As the colloquium gains experience, Dr. Brandenburg said, it will become the climax of an honor student's college career. For successful completion he will receive special recognition on his diploma and transcript and at commencement.

Money No Problem For IBP Plant Here

Some 125 members of the Chambers of Commerce and guests jammed the Hotel Morrison dining room Monday night to hear the manager of a parking plant tell them he didn't need money to bring a plant to Wayne.

A. D. Anderson, manager of Iowa Beef Packers, Inc., Denison, Ia., told the group IBP is planning to expand their operation and are considering Wayne as a possible site.

He said the industrial site is good and can be used to advantage by a packing plant. However, he continued, railroad facilities would have to be improved.

He asked an official of the railroad who was present at the meeting about improved service. The official said he was sure the railroad would do all in its power to improve service if the volume of use Anderson spoke of would come about.

Anderson said he would need a break on the price of land in the industrial site, a break on gas, electricity and tax rates and the rest could be handled by IBP.

A concerted effort by Wayne area residents to sell stock in the company as was done in Denison, would not be needed, he said, IBP has the arrangements necessary that would let all stock issues be sold through a brokerage firm.

When asked how soon he would start construction in Wayne if he decided to come here, Anderson said he was about to start packing a recently purchased parcel of land in Ft. Dodge, Ia., and should be done about August, 1962. If he decided on Wayne, construction here would start sometime after that.

Anderson was asked how long he would stay with a plant if built in Wayne and he replied that IBP has been building up good depth in management and his stay in Wayne would be relatively short.

Another speaker from Denison was Tom Shaddy, president of the Denison Chamber of Commerce and member of IBP board of directors. Shaddy told the group about the effects of the packing industry on the economy of their town.

Shaddy said houses and apartment houses couldn't be built fast enough to handle the demand and many of the workers live in the smaller towns around Denison.

The retail sales that had showed serious slumps in past year (comparable to a low through sales tax reports) continue to climb since industry was introduced in Denison, Shaddy continued.

Every kind of business has flourished, he said, along with schools, churches and other facets of community life.

Dick Knowles, publisher of the Denison Newspapers, told how Denison raised money locally, both for the pork and beef plants. But again this wouldn't affect Wayne, since Anderson pointed out that they didn't need money.

Reiney Mundt, president of IBP, was also present for the meeting.

The beef plant at Denison employs about 260 people with a payroll of over one and a half million dollars annually.

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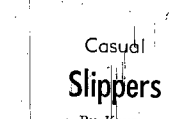
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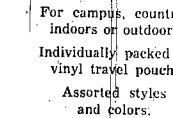
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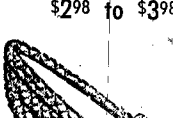
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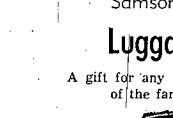
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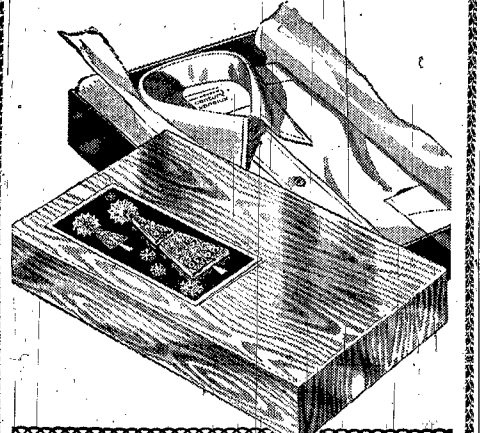


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Wayne Wins Opener on Field Goal by Meyer as Game Ends

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'Cats Top Omaha 60-45; Will Face Lincoln (Mo.) Today

Wayne State covers added victory No. 2 in their season record Tuesday night, 60-45 over Omaha university, and left today for a two-game invasion of Missouri.

They play Lincoln university at Jefferson City Friday night, then go to Northwest Missouri State at Maryville Saturday night. Monday night they visit another state as they meet the University of South Dakota. And they will play still another game away, at Doane next Thursday, before appearing at home Dec. 16 against Northern State of South Dakota.

The three out-of-state games are likely to give the Wildcats a stiff dose of basketball, Lincoln, though edged by Nebraska Wesleyan this week, 79-78, generally is ranked among the nation's top small-college teams. The Lincolnites showed some fancy shooting against Wesleyan, but reportedly made some costly mistakes.

The indication, thus, is that the Wildcats may have more depth than in recent years — a potent factor in the conference campaign.

Larry Coney paced the scoring with 16 for Wayne and sophomore Jon Garcia showed his best performance yet with 11. Bill King led Omaha with 14 points.



Capitol News . . . How to Spend It, Where to Get It Faces the Legislature

There is every indication that controversy over how much the state should spend and where it should get the money will be the top subject of the 1962 Legislature.

While it is many months before the next Unicameral convenes, there has been an unusual amount of activity over budgets in general and the broadened tax base in particular.

There was a flareup after the 1961 session ended over the rate of spending by state agencies, some of whom claimed they did not receive enough operating funds for 1961-63.

Another current source of friction is planned tax seminars by the University of Nebraska, to be held throughout the state in the spring.

Opponents claim the seminars would provide a springboard to promote liberal views on taxation, or in other words, a sales or income tax.

Proponents say the meetings are part of the University's public service program, and are designed to bring information to the people.

Observers who have watched the furries between sessions for many years say the current activity is caused partially by the squeeze produced by the demand for state services as against pressure to hold taxes down.

The problem is one many qualified observers feel will be the top state governmental problem of the next 10 years.

Sorrell Hearing
A hearing involving Frank Sorrell, chairman of the State Liquor Control Commission, is scheduled to resume Dec. 22 in the statehouse.

Pay Problems
Maintenance workers in the State Highway Department want a pay boost. The request to State Engineer John Hossack was made by the Nebraska Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.
