

Beermann in 1st District Congressional Primary Race

Congressman Ralph F. Beermann told a Republican rally in South Sioux City Monday night that he would seek re-election in the newly-created Nebraska First Congressional district.

Beermann said a lot of traveling, listening and thought had preceded his decision to run. Since adjournment he has been combing the new district sounding out opinions.

"Most people I have met," he told the rally, "have indicated they want conservative representation, plus strong identification with the Republican party. Therefore, I am going to give them a chance to vote for it."

Beermann, elected to represent the Third District in 1960, has been rated an outstanding conservative in his first session. At the close of Congress he was listed a 100 percent constitutional conservative by a non-partisan national organization, American for Constitutional Action.

If re-elected in 1962, he will represent the new First District created by the Nebraska Legislature from 19 counties of the old Third, 10 from the old First, and one, Otoe county, from the old Second. His first contest will come in the primary.

Hruska Tells Public to Watch National Events

On holidays favors from the local girl scout and boy scout troops or the brownies or from a Sunday school class brighten the dinner tray of the patient.

Kindnesses too numerous to mention are daily performed by citizens of the community for their friends who are hospitalized at Wayne Hospital, he concluded.

Christmas Oratorio Set at WSTC Auditorium Sunday

There will be old and new in Wayne State's annual Christmas musicale Sunday night.

The music department will present Bach's "Christmas Oratorio," at 8 p.m. in Rice auditorium. Admission is 50c.

For a quarter century Handel's "The Messiah" has been the traditional Wayne tribute to Christmas; hence the "Christmas Oratorio" is new in the sense of changing tradition. But it is old in the sense of ranking among the masterworks of Christmas musical literature for more than two centuries.

Prof. Anthony Garlick will direct his college choir of 120 voices in the performance, accompanied by the 40-piece college orchestra. Dr. Benjamin Bernstein has prepared the orchestra.

Prof. Russel Anderson, head of the fine arts division, will break a tradition too in this performance. He'll sing the baritone solos, instead of directing as he has done in every "Messiah" presentation since its revival after a World War II lapse.

The other soloists are Mrs. Erna Clanton, contralto, and Rev. John W. Boehr, tenor, both of Omaha.

Ask Volunteers to Operate Radio Active Detection Units

George DeBow, principal of Hahn Campus school and assistant director of Civil Defense in charge of intelligence, has just completed courses in the use of radioactive equipment. He has approximately \$1,500 worth of equipment that will be used to instruct people in the use of radiological monitoring.

Plans call for setting up 10 monitoring stations in Wayne county—five in Wayne and one each in Winside, Hosking, Carroll, Altona and Sholes. He will want at least four persons in each respective community to man each station.

Only persons 18 years or over, men or women will be trained as monitors. These classes will start some time after the first of the year.

As soon as he has trained qualified monitors, the State Department of Radiological Defense will furnish permanent equipment for each monitoring station.

DeBow asks that persons interested in becoming monitors call his home (769) between the hours of 7 and 9 p.m.

Interested people are warned not to get these classes confused with the Civil Defense classes starting at Wayne High Jan. 4. The latter will be to instruct people for their own survival, while the class to be taught by DeBow will be to train people to man radioactive detection equipment.

Winside to Vote Monday on Bonds
