Yearly, the division collects about \$10 million from some 4,500 governmental entities, in the state. This money is forwarded to Baltimore, Md., to the social security administration.
The funds come from such governmental subdiv is o n s as school districts, the state and counties and some cities.
The governmental groups collect three percent of the carnings of their employes, match the amount and remit it to the division headed by Koupal. Each three months Koupal balances his books and sends the money to Baltimore.
Of the 4000 entities that were
