Another new record for total travel on Nebraska roads appears in the making this year. Records in the State Highway Deattment show vehicles went four percent more miles on rural Nebraskh roads so far this year as compared with 1960.

The department measures travel with automatic counters at various points throughout the state.

state.

Vehicle movement within cities and villages is not counted in the department's over all figures. Miles logged by vehicles on rural roads in November was down nine percent from October and two percent under November, 1980.

1980. I prime, reasons for the fluctuation is the weather, according to department spokesmen. December's snow could reduce the year's total but December travel has been a record in 1989 and 1980 and most of the year's before that since 1941

ber travel has been a record in 1959 and 1950 and most of the years before that, since 1941. Consisterlity, year after year, the heaviest month for traffic on rural roads in the Cornhusker state is August.

In 1941, wehicles traveled an average of 6.7 million miles daily in Nebraska. In August of 1961 the figure was [12.6 million, almost double.

An interesting total computed by the department is travel on the Interstate Highway, now fully open between Lincoln and Omiaha. Counting on the Interstate began in November, 1959. Compared with 1960, motorists traveled 54 percent more miles this year.
