Wildcats String Three With Win Over NW Missouri

Three wins after three losses have lifted Wayne State's basketball record to 5-3 as the Wildcats pause for a breather during final exams and part of Christmas week. Their next appearance will be in the holiday tournament Dec. 28-29.

Wayne achieved its first win in four games with Northwest Missouri State, 54-47, Monday night. This followed a 63-62 squeak over Northern State of South Dakota Saturday and a 103-61 romp over Doane Thursday.

The Wildcats had to come from behind to beat both Northern and Northwest Missouri. The Missourians led until 3:20 left in the first half when Ken Dahl's jump shot gave Wayne a 29-28 edge. The half ended in a 34-all tie.

Wayne wasted no time moving ahead after the half. While Northwest hit only one free throw in six minutes before marking up its first fielder. Late in the half Northwest went 9 1/2 minutes without a point.

Neither team did well in second-half field shots. Wayne sinking six and Northwest five. However, the Wildcats made 8 of 12 charity shots and Missouri only 3 of 11.

Larry Coney's 18 point effort was tops and Dave Goede had 15. Northwest's freshman guard, Ron Woods, hit 15 points.

Against Northern, Wayne managed only a brief and slim lead in the first half and trailed, 35-38, at intermission. The Wolves held a 57-47 lead with 8:20 left in the second half, then faltered as the Wildcats surged to a 61-60 advantage with 3:05 remaining.

Coney's jump shot provided this lead, and his pair of free throws later made the winning margin. Northern connected on one more fielder but missed on its crucial effort just before the buzzer.

Goede enjoyed his best scoring of the season with 21 points. Coney got 15. Northern's Gary Nygaard scored 26.

The Wildcats marked up one of the biggest winning margins in Wayne history with a 42-point edge over Doane. A quick check of records shows Wayne beat York college 99-52 in the 1950-51 season, and there may have been wider margins.

All 10 Wildcats scored at Crete, Coney leading with 28. Dennis Johnson getting 15 — highest of his career at Wayne, and Goede 15.

Wayne made 43 of 87 field goal shots for a hot 49 percent, while Doane, handicapped by loss of last year's regulars, had trouble hitting field goals or free throws.

The Wayne-Northern game had an interesting sidelight. It matched first cousins Ken Dahl, Wayne, and Arden Rapp, Northern, in forward positions. They also jumped center at the opening. Their mothers are identical twins. Mr. and Mrs. Rapp, Arlington, S. D., were among the spectators, having come to visit the Cliff Dahl family.

ly. This was the first time Ken and Arden had played against each other. They may meet again in the holiday tournament if Wayne and Northern happen to land in the second-round bracket together.

Coach Harold Maciejewski began substituting with two minutes gone in the third quarter, rotating the boys for the rest of the game. All but two of the 12 varsity players scored and one of those had a field goal called back for traveling as he started to shoot.

The Devils' next game is with Madison on the Wayne court Jan. 5.

Wayne High took their fourth straight win of the season Friday night with an easy 78-47 victory over Plainview.

The Pirates played a slow, deliberate game of ball control, but could hold the Blue Devils only during the starting minutes of the game.

Wayne led 33-23 at the half, then came back to swamp Plainview with 23 points in the third quarter while the Pirates scored six.

The game tended to get a little rough in the third period, but Bus Likes, Ken Olds and Merlin Lessmann cooled off an enthusiasm for body contact generated by their opponents.

Don Larsen and Don Meyer controlled both boards through most of the game. Larsen was high with 22 points while Meyer had 20.

The win set the stage for Prep's crucial battle at Wauna Jan. 19. Prep's path to the league title is especially difficult since the Panthers must play all their league games on the road.

Rich Maurer was the important cog in eking out Friday's victory. He collected six of his 15 points in the final period after Prep enjoyed a 32-26 lead at the three-quarter mark.

Maurer and John Dorcey led Prep to an 11-10 lead in the opening period. Dorcey and Veldon Magnuson then sparked the second quarter spurt which gave the Panthers a 24-19 margin at intermission. Dorcey had eight of his 10

Survivors include the widower, four daughters and her mother, Mrs. John O. Wentworth, who is seriously ill in a Lincoln hospital.

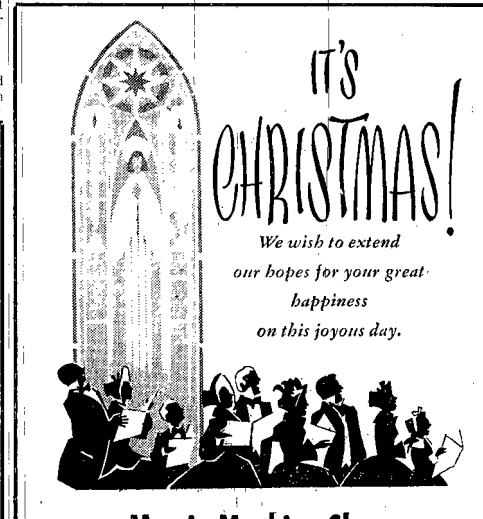
