

County Court Records Show Above Average Year in 1961

County Judge David J. Hamer reported a busy year during 1961, handling 227 traffic cases alone. During 1960, the court recorded 213 traffic cases.

Traffic cases show a total of: Malicious destruction of property, 3; minors in possession of liquor or intoxicated, 28; theft, 19; bad checks, 10; civil cases, 58; condemnation suits, 3; guardianships or conservatorships, 14; marriage licenses, 50, with three marriages performed by the judge; delayed birth registrations, 63; adoptions, 7, and game violations, 23.

The court also recorded 35 probable proceedings and inheritance tax determination with a total valuation of over \$1,500,000.

Funds of \$16,636 were processed through the court, broken down as follows: Fees, \$3,463; fines, \$4,864; and inheritance collections, \$7,705.

The court operates on a budget of about \$7,000 per year.

Gas Refunds Not to Affect Area Users

Recent newspaper articles have told of refunds by Northern Natural Gas Co. resulting from rate increases that failed to be approved by the Federal Power Commission.

A check with Dallas Wendt, manager of Peoples Natural Gas, revealed these refunds will not affect Wayne residents since Peoples has absorbed the rate increase instead of passing them on to the consumer.

The last raise in gas rates in Wayne occurred in June, 1959. Since that time, according to Wendt, other increases have been made by Northern but none has affected rates here.

In areas where the rate increases were passed on to the consumer, refunds will be made on the past use basis.

WSTC Participates In Science Teaching Improvement Group

Wayne State will participate in a new statewide council of college professors for the improvement of science teaching.

A \$159,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to the University of Nebraska makes possible the organization, the NSF Nebraska Cooperative College Teaching Development program.

Among professors appointed to the council is Dr. John Violette of Wayne State. The council's chairman is Dr. Norman Cromwell of the University of Nebraska.

The council also will conduct conferences for the Nebraska colleges, and provide grants for the purchase of science equipment.

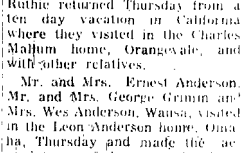

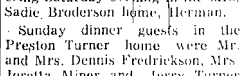

Dec. 22 we had Christmas dinner at school, after which we had our Christmas party with games, stories and gift exchange.

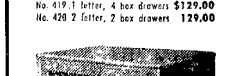

Wildcats Win First Holiday Tournament Since Inaugural

Wayne State's basketballers go to Pleasant Friday night with intention of making amends for their worst defeat last year. The footballers whipped Wayne 42-33 in their last meeting.

Saturday night Dana comes to Wayne for a 7:30 game, and Westmor comes here Monday.

The Wildcats will have some momentum built up as a result of five straight victories, including the championship of their own Christmas Holiday Tournament last Friday.

The word "holiday" does not apply to the team, for it has skipped only one day of practice since returning to Wayne for pre-tourney workouts.

Coach Al Svenningson, usually chary of praise, declared his pleasure over the Wildcat performance in whipping Washburn, 75-57, in the touring finale.

The Cats jumped to a quick lead over Washburn and built it to 29 points before the half ended, 38-20. The Febabeds challenged in the second period but could not close the gap closer than 55-47 with 8 1/2 minutes left.

Wayne shot a torrid 57 percent from the field in the first half and ended with a 52 percent effort.

A well-balanced team effort was highlighted by Larry Coney's 20-point performance—a figure which lifted him to a new Wayne career scoring record. In four seasons he now has amassed 1,108 points, passing the 1,095 mark that Jim Whitney set in the 1956-57 season.

Coney put together seasons of 73, 487 and 383 points before entering his senior year. He has hit 185 in 10 games, and with 14 games to go he is likely to put the career record at a total hard to pass.

Washburn's lack of balanced scoring proved fatal. Only Bill Quick did well (with 29 against Wayne and 26 against Northern State.) Only one other Febabed hit above eight in either game.

Northern downed Valley City of North Dakota, 74-64, in the consolation game. The North Dakotans trailed by wide margins except for

hit a last-second long shot (by Quick) to edge Northern, 58-57, after a seesaw thriller.

The Wolves used their typical hustle to stymie the Kassans, who were supposed to be touring favorites. Jim Kampen, scoring 17 and 25 points for Northern, probably was the most valuable all-around player in the tourney.

Wayne had little trouble handling Valley City, 81-62 in the other first-round match. The losers hung on with free throws in the first half, but missed many field shots because of tight Wayne defense throughout the game.

Wayne's tourney victory was its first in four tries.

With a 7-3 record now, the Wildcats meet three more non-conference foes before conference play begins in earnest. Records of other NCC teams to date indicate a tough campaign ahead, with at least five teams possible contenders for the crown.

Only Hastings and Doane have season records below .667 so far.
