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## Over 100 Entered In Annual County Spelling Contest

Over 100 grade school students will compete in the seventh annual Wayne County Spelling Bee. The event, sponsored annually by The Wayne Herald and Wayne Book Store, will be held Jan. 29 at the Wayne city auditorium.

Contestants will be vying for the right to enter the Midwest Spelling Bee at Omaha Apr. 21. The county champion will also win a portable typewriter as a grand prize.

County Supt. Gladys Porter this week reported 106 entries in the 1962 contest. This includes 63 rural school students and 42 from town schools. The total is only seven under the record entry of 116 two years ago.

Among top spellers returning from last year's contest is Marcia Krusemark, District 7. As a sixth grader a year ago, she was runnerup to County Champion Judy Stevens, Carroll.

Seven other oral finalists from 1961 also will be vying for the county crown again this year. They are:

Kathy Nelson, District 15, Claude Newman, 51, Gayle Victor, 66, Joan Sims, 72, Mary Ann Dorey, Wayne St. Mary's, and Sue Ann Glass and Charles Prince, Winside.

## Warn Children of Sledding Hazards

## Census Shows Counties Enjoying More Luxuries

Final tabulation from the 1960 Census of Housing shows Wayne counties enjoy a few more of the luxuries of life than do some of their neighbors in counties of equal size.

Based on housing unit samples, Wayne county ranks high in such things as furnaces, telephones, two-car families, air conditioners, television and radio sets.

The survey showed Wayne county also had the fewest number of housing units not occupied compared with other counties having a similar number of housing units. Wayne county had 3,115 units with 2,869 occupied.

For some reason, Wayne county was listed behind on automatic or semi-automatic washers. The figures showed most washers in the county are wringer or spinner washers.

Both were in the top 90 among 5,080 seniors who took the test in 438 schools.

## Plan Civil Defense Survey in County

B. H. Backlund and Associates have been retained by the Corps of Engineers to conduct a survey of possible fallout shelters in the Wayne area, according to E. L. Hailey, civil defense director.

The work in general consists of making an inventory of potential public fallout shelters in the survey area, estimating the day and night population and collecting data relating to shielding capabilities of existing structures.

The survey begins today (Thursday). Facilities to be surveyed include all facilities, except single family residences, estimated to have a shelter protection factor of 20 or better and potential space for 50 or more people. Natural and man made underground facilities will be included.

Backlund's will rely heavily on local civil defense officers and public officials for assistance in determining which buildings will be surveyed. The structures will probably include, but not be limited to, government-owned buildings, public and or community buildings, commercial facilities, apartment houses and industrial facilities.

## Organize 2nd Civil Defense Class Here

A full class of 21 adults attended the first meeting of the Civil Defense classes being given at the Wayne high school Thursday nights.

Lesson Two will be given tonight (Thursday) for all those who attended the first class.

A second class will be started, also on Thursday night, beginning Jan. 18. This class will begin again with Lesson One. This second class was organized since over 40 people registered for the first class and only about 20 can be handled in one class.

The classes begin at 7:30 p.m. each Thursday and are conducted by high school instructors who have attended special schools in the county. He also taught at the University of Nebraska.

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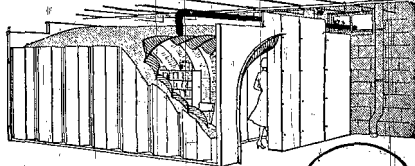

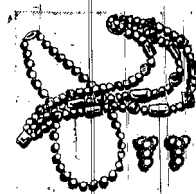

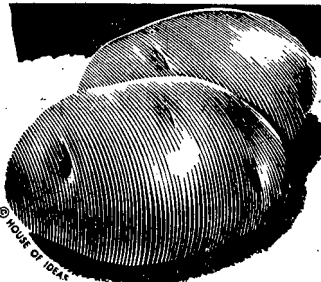

# Wildcats, 9-4, Begin 11 Straight Conference Games

Wayne State caters will begin a long telling stretch of games Friday with the first of 11 straight conference games. The Wildcats journey to Kearney Friday and to Hastings Saturday.

They have a formidable 9-1 record behind them, including a 103-91 win over Doane. But the Cats will need to overcome a tendency for erratic play if they are to survive a campaign that promises to rank among the NCC's toughest in years.

While defending champion Peru and Nebraska Wesleyan are generally tabbed the top contenders, at least five and maybe six NCC teams are dangerous darkhorses. Only Doane seems unlikely to make much of a mark.

Wayne has demonstrated potential to improve on its fourth place of last year, but probably can afford no more than two or three losses to displace Peru at the top.

The Wildcats won two of three games in the past week, all against Tri-State opponents. A surprising Midland team, relying mainly on hustle, upset Wayne 69-63, at Fremont Friday. The spectators saw a game seldom equalled for closeness of score. Never did more than three points separate the teams, except for a few seconds near the end when Midland moved five points ahead.

Wayne held a 32-20 ball margin after frequent changes of lead, slipped behind briefly after inter-

mission, then regained the lead until Midland moved ahead with 6:10 left. Wayne achieved a 58-58 tie with four minutes left, but Midland's Gordon Buesing's eight points proved too much in the clutch.

Wayne's Ken Dahl marked up the best scoring performance of his college career with 21 points. His previous high was 20 in the opener of the 1958-59 season. Dave Goede tallied 20 against Midland.

The Cats had little trouble subduing Doane, 72-54. Saturday, as 10 players added to the score, Larry Corey tops with 16. Wayne led at the half, 40-23.

Westmar proved more difficult Monday before succumbing, 72-64. The Eagles left the court at half-time with a 38-36 advantage and continued to threaten all the way despite Wayne margins up to 10 points midway through the second half.

Corey's 26 points and 25 rebounds weighed heavily on the Wayne side. Dahl contributed 15. After 13 games Wayne has outscored opponents by an average of 67.1 to 61. The Cats have shot .397 from the field, .667 from the free throw line. They also have outrebounded the opposition, 52 to 42.

Corey leads in scoring with 214, an average of 16.4. Goede follows with 151 points, averaging 11.6. Dennis Johnson has 103, Dahl 102, Ron Marcellus 89.

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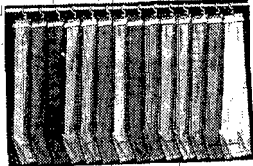
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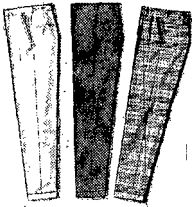

## Your Servants

How much a year do you spend on the salaries of your servants?

Most of us, of course, employ no servants at all. But we're paying an ever-increasing bill for a special type of servant—the public servant.

During the last fiscal year Federal civilian payroll costs reached an all-time high of \$13.6 billion, which works out to \$242 for each and every American family. Per family cost in 1947, by way of contrast, was only \$121.

You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

The annual cost of civilian agency payrolls rose 55 percent from fiscal 1955 to fiscal 1961, as against only 28 percent for civilians employed by the Defense department.

It would be interesting to see a breakdown showing the proportion of these civilians who are busy spending our tax money on welfare state projects of one kind or another.

A fool who has money to burn will quickly meet his match.

## Capitol News

# State Employment Is Stable And High Compared to U. S.

Nebraska's employment picture for the last fiscal year was relatively stable and high compared with the nation as a whole. That was the report from the State Labor Department in an annual summation of the employment situation.

The department said there was an increase in the total labor force for the fiscal year ending July 1961, and a boost in the number of unemployed persons.

At the beginning of the current fiscal year the labor force was estimated at 590,400, an increase of 1.3 percent from the preceding year.

The number of unemployed was reckoned at 25,700, compared to 17,800 for the previous 12 months. But, adds the department, this was relatively stable when viewed against the national outlook.

The average duration of unemployment compensation during the 1961 fiscal year was 11.8 weeks, the department commented, compared with 10.7 weeks the previous year.

At the end of the fiscal year, 241,206 Nebraska workers, an increase of 7,200, were covered by the employment security law.

Net benefits paid to workers in fiscal 1961 totaled \$9.5 million, the department said. The unemployment compensation fund had a balance of \$38.2 million at the end of the year.

against \$320.1 million the previous 12 months.

Winter wheat production was worth \$341.5 million in 1961 as against \$147.8 million in 1960, the experts said.

## State Gasoline

Two more gasoline companies have been lined up to supply the state at a discount during the coming year, according to the state purchasing department.

The first two enrolled in discounting credit card purchases were American Petroleum and Frontier. The department said Deby and Sioux have been added.

In addition, it was reported, discount arrangements have been made with a number of major brand stations through distributors.

## Welfare Payments

Higher costs were reflected in the annual report of the State Department of Public Welfare.

Director Frank Woods said assistance expenditures for the last fiscal year were up by six percent over the previous 12 months. Dollar-wise, the increase for fiscal 1961 was \$1.1 million, Woods said.

Payments to the blind dropped three percent but old age checks climbed by the same amount. Aid to dependent children cost 12 percent more, and aid to the disabled went up 22 percent.

Woods said a higher case load accounted for some of the increase but the main reason was higher medical costs for the needy.

## Teachers Colleges

The president of the State Normal Board says most changes in bookkeeping procedures at the four teachers colleges called for by State Auditor Ray Johnson have been made. The board governs the teachers colleges at Chadron, Kearney, Peru and

Wayne. Carl Speltz, board president, said he had conferred with Johnson about the bookkeeping.

Johnson has conferred with Gov. Frank Morrison and Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, chairman of the last budget committee of the Legislature, about the audit.

Johnson had urged a double entry bookkeeping system at the schools.

## Reformatory Escapes

Escapes at the Men's Reformatory in Lincoln were the fewest in 1961 in four years. Records show only six men walked away from outside work details during the year, according to D. T. Higbee, assistant superintendent.

Higbee said no inmate escaped from the inside electric fence. He said there were 10 escapes in 1960, 11 in 1959 and 12 in 1958.

## Penitentiary Inmates

Four research projects occupied time of 115 inmates during 1961, the state penitentiary reported.

Seventy-five took part in a test of a cough medicine for a pharmaceutical house, 10 in a test of a civil defense cereal bar, 10 in a controlled feeding diet and 20 in a science qualification experiment.

## County Agent's Column

**Sheep Business Looks Better.**

John Strohm, editor of Ford Motors Farm Management Tips, has this to say about the sheep business: "Sheep business looks much better than it did a few months ago. In September and October, lamb slaughter reached the highest rate since 1955, then eased off during November and December. Marketings for the season averaged 10 percent above 1960 and prices dropped to the lowest level in over 15 years. Much of the increased slaughter was made up of ewe lambs intended for flock replacement."

Many sheep men became so discouraged they went out of sheep or sharply trimmed flock size. The best move now may be to do just the opposite of everything else. Sheep numbers are expected to be nearly a million below last year. Marketings should be down eight percent between now and March when prices should increase. Good breeding stock is still selling at bargain prices. Looks as if it were a good time for a top sheep man to be building up his flock size."

**Cholera Eradication**

It is evident that a program for control and eradication of hog cholera will be demanded by the Nebraska swine industry. This is the belief of Dr. E. Crosby Howe, Extension animal hygienist at the University of Nebraska.

Hog cholera has been in the United States since 1833, and occurs in every state and in most other hog-producing countries except Canada. The disease restricts U. S. pork exports to about 69 million pounds a year, while a potential foreign pork market twice this figure exists.

Hog cholera occurs in cycles, and its incidence is now at a 13-year low. "For this reason, now is an ideal time to attempt eradication," according to Dr. Howe. Hog cholera threatened the ex-

istence of the swine industry until USDA scientists developed immunizing agents shortly after 1900. Vaccines have resulted in a satisfactory method of control, but living with the disease in this way is costly — to the tune of \$50 million annually.

At present, immunization in the U. S. is costing swine producers about 45 cents per pig marketed. Successful eradication in Canada has reduced costs of maintaining freedom from cholera to half a cent per pig marketed.

"Hog cholera can be eradicated by using all of the knowledge concerning the disease that we now have available," Dr. Howe stated. "It will be a long difficult task, but one that will be worthwhile for a swine industry and the nation."

The University staff member recommended that we men follow guide lines developed from the Canadian cholera eradication program in establishing a state hog cholera eradication committee. The committee would be a separate group operating within the framework of the Animal Health Committee of the Nebraska Swine Council.

Once a state committee is formed, the National Hog Cholera committee recommends that immediate attention be given to:

1. The establishment of a system of reporting the incidence and extent of loss due to hog cholera.
2. The control of the movement of hogs infected with or exposed to hog cholera.
3. The strict enforcement of garbage cooking laws to prevent the spread of hog cholera.

For the past two weeks I've been mixed up — too many holidays and Sundays. Haven't been right positive as to whether it was Sunday or Monday for two weeks. I'm straightened out today, though, and now if I can remember to write 1962 instead of 1961, everything will work out in good shape.

I wonder, though, if you ever feel the same way about fading a new year as I do. Somehow or other I hate to tackle it. Don't seem to have much zest for the things to come. Instead, I find myself rather dreading the things that will arise but at the same time knowing that I will be obliged to meet them. I look back over the past year and remember some of the rough problems that came up and hope I'm not called upon to face them again. Do you suppose that's a sign of our years creeping up on us or is it just a case of a fellow being a little lazy? Hope it's the latter, for a fellow has some control over that. I ought to be ashamed of feeling that way, for I'll usually only stop and think a bit. I would get a pretty clear picture of how well off I am. Undoubtedly, there are millions of people in the world who would gladly change places with me, and who would face the coming year with a song in their hearts instead of a feeling of dread.

rights of the individual citizen. I ought to be a bit ashamed of my doubts, my doubts, my fears, you say? Well, I am.

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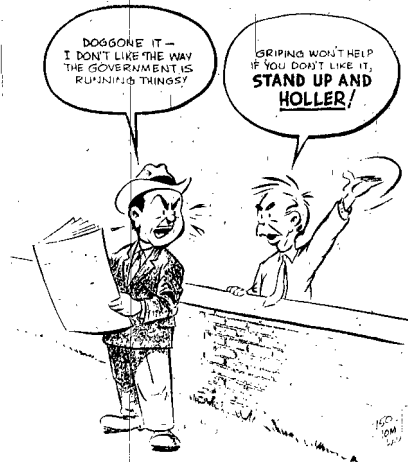

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# Thinking OUT LOUD

The bishop of Constantinople in the fourth century, John Chrysostom, wrote: "The whole of time is a festival unto Christians because of the excellency of the good things which have been given." His assertion is still true—the significance of the gospel is not limited to special days and seasons. Martin Luther had the same idea in mind when he wrote the explanation of the third commandment, without any reference to the Sabbath, but expressed the idea that God's word is holy, and should be heard and studied as a part of every day of our lives. All year long and each day of the year, it is possible for the Christian to keep for himself the joy of the festival of Christmas.

Sometimes the question is asked, whether December 25 is the real date of the birth of Jesus. As a matter of fact, we can not say dogmatically that this date is beyond question the exact date that Jesus was born. The Bible does not tell us this is the date, for the Gospels were not written according to the calendar. They are not interested in telling us exactly when an event occurred, for that is of lesser importance than the fact of what happened. It is of great importance that on a certain day there was born in Bethlehem One who can make all lives different every day, everywhere.

Exactly when Christmas was first celebrated is unknown. We do know the Feast of our Lord's Birthday, Christmas, was being kept at the city of Rome in 354 A. D. There is some evidence that the feast was observed fairly widely in other places before this date, perhaps in some places before the end of the third century. However, it was not observed at Jerusalem as late as 385, but was just beginning to be observed at Constantinople (now Istanbul) and Antioch about this time. Alexandria, in Egypt, adopted the observance somewhere about 430, and shortly after, it appears that Jerusalem followed suit.

The Eastern churches, beginning about the third century, had already begun to observe a feast of Jesus' birthday on January 6th as "Epiphany," the feast of His "manifestation," the origins
