

Policy on Political Activity Outlined by Gov. Morrison

of institutions has been outlined by Director George Morris. The department replaced the Board of Control system for governing state institutions.

Under the law which controlled operations of the three-member loard bybrid employees could not participate in political activity or contribute to campaigns.

However, when the Legislature abolished the \$\(\)\ h r e e member beard and substituted a director of institutions and welfare it also climinated the section of 1a widealing with political activity, including many other statutes on different subjects.

Vorcis, after consultation with Gov. Frank Morrison, issued a directive to department employees stating that an interest in politics is the responsibility of every citizen.

en.

However, Morrison said that while he does not want to discourage interest in political activity, or entirely limit activity, or feels no employee should file or public office and remain on the descriptory.

for public office and remain on the department payroll. Excepted is an employee filing for a board of education. Said the director: "If, do es seem to us that we mist draw the line at some point to insure that state employees will be donected with their duties and that their political interests will not interfere with those duties." The policy statement as originally drafted did not mention contributions to campaigns.

Ground Water

A phoblem is looming on the horizon for. Nebraska, says the secretary of the Water Pollution Control Council, T. A. Pilip said the state will soon have a serious problem with contamination of ground water resources as the fringe areas of cities continue to expand.

fringe areas of cities continue to expand.

As more new homes are constructed outside the corporate limits of a city and construct their own sewage disposal systems; in lieu of expansion of the city system, the problem will grow, Filip said.

The only solution, he said, is that cities must isolate their wells from these potential fringe areas in order to prevent contamination.

in order to prevent contamination.

As, a result, he said, the Council would like to see all new wells
placed far outside a city. Filipi
said one large city already has
had lo abandon two wells.

He said people also should he
made more conscious of the need
to conserve water and suggested
metering of water in municipalities in order that citizens might
see how much is used.

Filipi, who also is state sanitation lengineer, said his department has found that in locations
where the charge for water has
changed from a flat rate to a
metered charge. usage dropped
50 percent.

A Legislative Council study committee has been told that the Legislature should appropriate from \$15,000 to \$20,000 veryly for use by the statels extension forester. The committee is studying forestry problems preparatory to making recommendations to the 1963 Legislature.

E. W. Janike, director of agricultural dixtension at the University of Nebraska, said under such an appropriation supervision of the state forest lands could be conducted with a five-man staff.

will result in the death of unctrees.

In addition to damaging the trees, livestock compart the soil, reducing its ability to absorb moisture. The compaction also increases surface runoff and encourages soil erosion: Recent tests show a 90 percent reduction in the moisture absorption rate of grazed wooded areas over ungrazed areas.

Whenever there is a chance that livestock might get into the area, all tree plantings should be enclosed with a stock-tight fence.

Shorn Wool Payments Set

The 1962 wool incentive price has been set at 62 cents for shorn wool, according to the local ASC office.

Payments to producers for the

office.
Payments to producers for the 1962 marketing year will follow the same methods used for the past year. Shorn wool payments will equal to a percentage of each producer's c a sh returns from wool sales. The percentage will be that which is required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound, according to the State ASC office.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have neven been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the national average incentive payment for the 1962 marketing year will be made on shorn wool.

Payments for the 1962 marketing year will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the Apr. 1, 1962-Mar. 31, 1963, period, Payments will be made in the summer of 1963 following the end of the marketing year.
