One out of every four persons who tried to get allicense to operate a motor vehicle in Nebrassa failed to pass the test for one last year. The startling information and reason for it came from Berhard II. G. Etting, director of the State Division of 'Alotor Vehicles.

Fitting said bis 16 drivers li-fense examiners give 124,030 ex-aminatoris in 1981 and 27,030 per-sons failed to pass. The prime reason, he said, was Lack of knowledge of the state's motor vehicle hips. The director said 16,347 persons folded the written examination on inotor vehicle laws, and 9,366 were not able to pass the driving tests.

County Agent's Column

Soybeans For Cattle-Lambs

Soybeans — before processing — can be as valuable or nearly as valuable as soybean oil meal when fed to fattening cattle and



when fed to fattening cattle and lambs, but soybeans are not satisfactory for hogs.

"When fed to older cattle on feeding periods of 100 days or so and to lambs, studies to date indicate that soybeans are as valuable as soybean oil meal," says Paul Guyer, University of Nebraska Extension animal husbandman. "When feed to younger eattle on a longer feeding period, it would appear that the ration becomes less palatable during later stages of feeding. Under these conditions, gains are reduced somewhat and efficiency of feed utilization is decreased to the point that soybean should be ground frequently when fed to cattle to prevent or reduce the rancidity that develops as soybean oil is exposed to the jair. Soybeans need not be ground for lambs.

When fed to hogs, soybeans must be heated to obtain high digestibility of the soybean protein. Hogs that are fed fairly large amounts of soybeans will produce oily pork which is undesirable, Giyer points out.


