Wayne Boy Scouts Observe 52nd Birthday This Week

Scouts in Wayne are marking the fifty-second anniversary of scouting in America during the week of Feb. 7-13.

They will attend their various churches in uniform Sunday. They have had special activities and appeared in public. They have earned higher ranks and will get the awards as special ceremonies.

To these boys, from 8 to 18 years old, the scout week events may seem ordinary, but generation of older fellows who knew scouting 10, 25, 35, 50 years ago will recognize in this week's anniversary activities a heartening similarity to the old times.

The outdoors may observe some differences, in requirements for ranks, in uniforms in the literature, but they will also observe that the fundamentals of scouting have not changed. It still stands for new knowledge, outdoor adventure, the chance to lead other scouts, and it still stands for fun with a purpose.

Advancement with new knowledge is an important ingredient of every week, and boys in both Wayne scout troops have attained recent advancement. Troop 175 will present awards at its court of honor tonight.

Troop 174 boys also have earned awards, but their court of honor will be delayed for a special reason—in order to make it an Eagle court. One Troop 174 member, Ronald Wriedt, last week successfully passed the Diamond Dick District Eagle board of review. Because processing of the Eagle application must go to the national office, the Eagle court of honor must wait for about a month.

The last Wayne Scout to achieve Eagle rank (about a year ago) was Kenneth Denon, member of Explorer Post 174. The Explorers, boys of 14 through 17 years, have an active organization with 16 members who currently are planning an Explorer Ball in the near future and a major outing next summer.

Most of the past went on a two-week canoe trip in the rugged wilderness of Canada last summer. For this trek they earned nearly all the cost by managing the concession stand at the Wayne ball park for two summers.

Wayne's two cub packs, 174 and 175, provide the first taste of scouting for boys eight through ten years old. The packs are divided into dens, usually with five to eight or nine boys who meet weekly in homes. Mothers of the scouts take turns serving as den mothers for several months at a time. The boys make numerous handicraft projects, work on home repairs, learn some athletic skills—and through it all begin to absorb the character ideals that guide scouts of all ages.

Overall Salary Increases Granted to City Employees

The city council completed a new salary schedule for city employees this week, granting raises ranging from \$9 to \$30. This is the first raise for city employees in two years and averaged out about five percent.

Board Sets Retirement Age, Adds New Salary Provision

In a 4½-hour session Monday night the Wayne Board of Education established a new board policy, made an extra pay provision in the teacher salary schedule, heard predictions for the 1962-63 school year and reviewed teachers' salaries.

Supt. Stanley Westergard told the board that at the present time the system will apparently need six additional teachers.

A tentative schedule indicates, he said, that we will be able to have all grades, seventh through twelfth, in the high school building. He felt there might be some shortage of facilities for shop, physical education and home economics.

By the end of the Monday session it was decided to try and procure teachers for English, Journalism, foreign language and a combination teacher to both as assistant coach.

The board passed a provision in the salary schedule to recognize up to three years of experience in other school systems at \$100 a year. This means a teacher with one year of experience would have \$100 added to his starting salary of \$4,200, bringing it up to \$4,300. A teacher with over three years of experience could add \$300 to the starting salary, bringing it to \$4,500.

A new policy was set by the board, making retirement mandatory for a teacher reaching age 65. This new rule will go into effect in the 1963-64 school year.

The board followed the salary schedule in granting raises to teachers, giving them their regular raise of \$100 to \$125 a year, depending on each situation in the schedule.

Pierson, Roberts, Christensen Named For School Board

Three candidates were nominated Tuesday night by Wayne's two parties to run for the two seats open on the Wayne board of education.

The Citizens Party nominated Lynn Roberts and Roy Christensen, while the Popular Party nominated Dean Pierson and also Roberts.

Roberts is presently serving on the board.

Pierson operates the Pierson Insurance Agency and Christensen is the manager of the Carhart Lumber Co.

Information on Federal Jobs Offered Students

Wayne State students interested in federal employment will have the opportunity to confer with government representatives next Wednesday.

Edward LaBrosse, assistant manager of the Omaha social security district, and Clifford Kitzelton, manager of the Norfolk district, will visit the campus to discuss career opportunities in government.

They will explain the federal service entrance examination which provides avenues to positions in 60 different career fields.

The government men are scheduled for group conferences at 10:30 and 1:00, followed by individual conferences.

Anyone in this area interested in additional information should attend one of the group sessions. Max Lundstrom, director of special services, is in charge of the conferences.

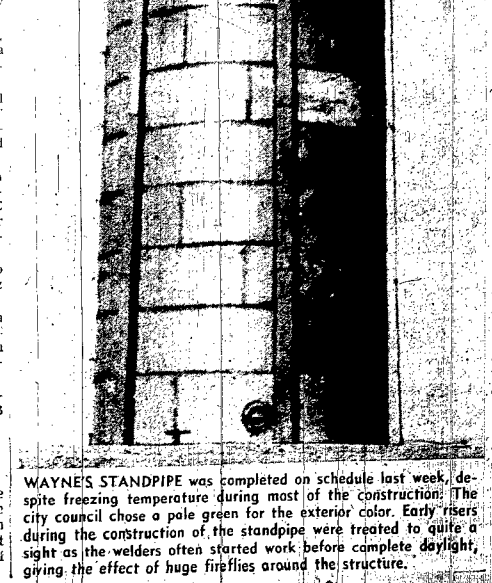

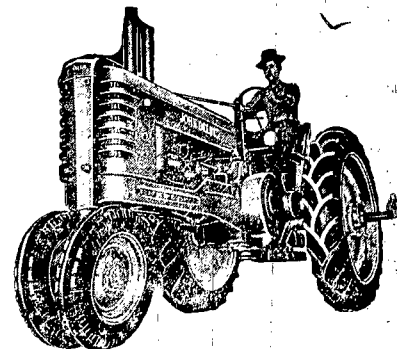
