 under reseal loans. As a normal practice in the resale operation, the other crops under reseal are periodically dropped from the program to lessen the possibilities of deterioration and put the quantities in a position for movement into various outlets before loss or deterioration occurs.  
 The resale program encourages the holding of reserve stocks of grain on the farm, thus keeping it in the production areas where feed grains, especially, are normally consumed. The program also encourages farmers to acquire more storage facilities on farms. Farm storage provides an effective tool to aid in the orderly marketing of grain. It permits holding grain off the market and on the farm at harvest time when commercial facilities are often at capacity levels and when market prices are normally seasonally low.

We farmed until 1918 and moved to Gothenburg where I had a battery shop. We moved to Denver in 1920. We had six children. I will be 80 years old June 17, 1947, my wife was 78 Jan. 26. If any of my old friends remember me, I would appreciate hearing from them.
