Sewing Machine Tune-up
As long as the snow keeps
coming, Mrs. Homemaker will
have to give up plans for out-ofdoor jobs. Now would be a good
time to give the sewing machine
a thorough checkup. Sewing for
spring can be enjoyable if the
tools are in good working order.
Se win g machines require a
weekly cleaning and oiling if
they are used moderately every
day. If used a few hours a week,
oiling and cleaning once a month
is 'sufficient. However, it is a
good practice to clean out the
lint and any loose threads after
each use of the machine rather
than to left them collect around
the bobbin, upper tension plate

each use of the machine rather than to left them collect around the bobbin, upper tension plate or feed-dog. A stiff bristle brush is recommended for this job.

Clean first, then oil, using oil recommended by a swing machine manufacturer. This will be a light grade oil especially refined for sewing machines.

When planning a thorough oil might remove the upper thread, slide plate, bobbin case, needle and priesure foot. Then by turning the balance wheel slowly one can see all of the working parts after the machine head is tilted and removed of the face and throat plates. Put only one drop of oil in each hole and joint. Never "over oil" the machine as this only adds time in removing the excess to prevent oil stains on cloth.

a recipe and sift the flour before measuring or use the flour
directly from the package?"

Kathryn Cooley, Extension foods specialist, Lincoln, says, "It has been found that either dipping into a bag or spooning any flour into a cup tends to pack the flour. Therefore, the amount measured varies. Even methods of sifting vary. In short, unless you weigh or sift flour and measure accurately, you can't be absolutely sure you are measuring the same amount each time. If the recipe says, "Sift flour before measuring," do so. Accurate measurements assure uniform baking results."

We recommend 4-ff members

We recommend 4-ff members who are taking cooking projects to sift flour if the recipe 50 states. We are in favor of shortcuts unless they cut the quality of a product. The 4-H motto is "To make the best better."


