According to Loerch, the chemical ammate (ammonium sulfamate) can be applied in liquid form or as crystals. When using liquid, it should be applied undiluted in holes bored around the perimeter of |a tsump surfact. Two ounces are needed for each six inches of diameter. The dry form can be placed around the outer edge of the stump and achieve the same results.

The ester forms of 2,4-D and 2,4-5-T should be used for killing stumps. Mix two to three rounds of the acknowledge of the other statement in 10 to 10 to

achieve the sane results.
