

# PREP, SPENCER VIE IN STATE

## Change Salary Schedule; End Inter-City Junior High Play

Salary schedule and sports were highlighted at the Monday meeting of the Wayne city school board.

The board voted to disband inter-city competition for junior high teams. These teams had been traveling out of town for several games and some school board members were receiving complaints from parents on the time their children were spending on junior-high athletics.

The board approved strengthening the inter-school program and limiting after-school practice time to get the children home by 6 p.m.

Also in the sports field, the board agreed to look for a head coach to relieve Coach Harold Marjowski of at least one sport.

The board took into consideration the Wayne city school will be the 11th largest class B school in the state and is the only one of this size having one man heading all sports.

Approval was given to a change in salary schedule to provide extra funds for teachers with outside assignments. The revision will provide an extra \$200 for a head coach and \$100 for each assistant. The \$200 increase will also apply to the vocal music department head.

In other action, the board approved the participation of high school seniors in the WSTC college course program which allows senior students to take college courses during the regular school year and receive college credit for them.

Superintendent Westergard, principal Fred Riekers and counselor Donald Dean set standards to which the students must adhere if taking the extra work.

The board approved more time for elementary principal Richard Oxenford to perform his duties as principal. He has been spending full time in the classroom and doing administrative work also.

He will now teach only half days and devote the other half to administrative duties.

Approval for bids for drapes in the elementary school's south windows was also given by the board.

Dean McConnell was relieved, at his request, of his assistant coaching activities in all sports. He said he would like to assist in one sport, but not in all three.

The board approved the use of student teachers under WSTC's new seven and a half week program. Formerly the student teachers spent only two weeks in the system.

Bids from the Guarantee Roofing Co. were accepted for work on the high school and the Carroll school. Applied were bids for \$1,696 on the high school roof and \$387 on the Carroll school.

## Suber Asks Transfer To Wayne District 17 Other Petitions Out

The combined reorganization committee of Dixon, Thurston and Wayne counties met last week and received a petition from John Suber on 280 acres of land he wished to detach from School District 60R, Wakefield, and attach to District 17, Wayne.

Suber had approval of the action from both the Wakefield and Wayne school boards.

The reorganization committee reviewed the petition and sent it to the state reorganization committee, Lincoln, for review. Further action on the matter will wait until the state group meets Friday and hands down a ruling.

District 19 has filed a petition asking to be dissolved and attached to District 17, Wayne.

District 41 is now circulating a petition to merge with District 77. Both are Class I schools.

## Set New Meet Between Wayne, Rural Districts

The meeting between several rural school districts and the Wayne school board which was postponed Tuesday because of the snow, has been rescheduled for Mar. 13 at 7:30 in the Carroll school.

Several rural districts had asked to meet with the Wayne board to hear facts and figures on education and new advancements in schooling.

## Spencer Favored in First Round at Lincoln Today

Wayne Prep's Panthers will close out the school's athletic history in glory this weekend as the NE Nebraska entry in the State Class C basketball tournament at Lincoln.

Prep, which will close its junior-senior high school at the completion of the current school year, is pitted against Spencer at 12 noon today (Thursday) in a first-round game at the Lincoln high gymnasium.

Prep gained the state tourney berth with a 61-46 victory over Wallhill at Stanton last Wednesday night. Details of this playoff victory will be found on the sports page of today's Herald.

Today's game will be Prep's fifth appearance in the state tournament. This is the first time the Panthers have appeared in Class C, however. The local team has a history of losing to the eventual champion in each of its previous appearances.

In its first Lincoln appearance in 1941, Prep was the area Class B representative, gaining the semifinals before losing to champion Humphrey St. Francis 26-23. The Panthers had earlier defeated Meadow Grove 35-30 and Henderson 38-34.

In 1945, Prep dropped a 33-16 decision to Hampton in the first round. A year later the Panthers downed Avoca 39-37 in a first-round game but lost to champion Hildreth 43-36 in the semifinals. In their last Lincoln appearance, in 1951, Prep beat Primrose 43-29 in a first-round game but was spelled by champion Millard 45-35 in the semifinals. These three appearances were in Class D.

In Spencer Prep faces one of the three Class C teams returning to Lincoln for the second straight year. Coach Jerry Hueser's quint was a first-round victim of Fremont 54-45 a year ago. All five starters on the Spencer team are back in Lincoln today.

Noted for its running game, Spencer is led by the highly touted Kopecky brothers, Ronnie, a 6-1 guard, is averaging 22 points for the 24-game season. Leonard, a 6-1 forward, trails his brother by a single point in average. Both have been regulars throughout

## Signup Now for Grain Program

Growers of corn, grain sorghum, and spring-planted barley may sign up to take part in the 1962 feed grain program, John Mohr, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. The signup period will extend through Mar. 30.

Operation of the program, the Chairman explained, will be similar to the 1961 feed grain program.

Likewise, its objectives are the same: (1) To increase farm income; (2) to further reduce the excess feed grain stocks; (3) to reduce Government costs of farm programs; (4) to reduce the risk of serious overproduction of meat, poultry, and dairy products; and (4) to assure consumers of fair and stable prices for these products.

All producers of corn, grain sorghum, or spring barley are eligible to take part in the feed grain program, which calls for the diversion of acreage formerly planted to one or more of these crops into an approved soil-conserving use. The program is voluntary, but program participation by farmers who produce these feed grain crops is required if they want to be eligible for price support on their feed grain crops, including oats and rye.

Mohr said that for corn and grain sorghum, there must be a minimum reduction of 20 percent from the farm's 1959-60 average acreage of these crops and the producer (other than certain producers of malting barley) must not exceed the farm's barley base. For barley (except certain malting varieties), there must be a minimum reduction of 20 percent in the farm's average 1959-60 barley acreage, and the producer must not exceed the farm's corn and grain sorghum base.

Producers of oats and rye will be eligible for 1962 crop price support if they comply with either the corn-grain sorghum program or the barley program.

# Peru Stops Wildcats 87-77 In NAIA Playoff Saturday

The curtain came down Saturday on Wayne State's 1961-62 basketball season as the Wildcats bowed to the superior speed and shooting accuracy of Peru.

While Peru sometimes led by 10 and up to 17 points, and the final margin was 87-77, the Bobcats were not able to call the victory certain until less than one and one-half minutes remained. With that time on the clock, Ken Dahl's three-point play brought Wayne up to a 75-82 deficit, clinching a hot scoring spree.

But the Wildcats encountered a familiar problem: How to stop Peru long enough to make any headway after a 44-29 first half. The Bobcats, already a double winner over Wayne this season, had the scent of the NAIA national tournament and ran like a race horse with the big in its teeth.

Peru led handily all the way, except for a brief scare when Wayne pulled within two points, 20-24, six minutes before the first half ended.

Both teams lost three players via fouls in hectic skirmishes which saw the combatants frequently on the floor after collisions or dives for a loose ball. It was such a dive that sent Wayne's Larry Coney to the bench with his fifth foul after plunging for the ball and landing atop a Bobcat.

The big red head from Pilger left with 18 points, high for Wayne in a total that raised his season production to 512. He had already broken his own school season record in the previous game. And early in the season he passed Carl Johnson's old career scoring mark. As the year ended, Coney's career totaled 1,455 a figure likely to stand a long time. Not often does any school get a player who averages 36.3 points for four years.

Peru's 6-8 center, Bob Buttgenbach, emerged with the game's high points, 21, after collecting four fouls in the first half.

But it was a game of small men, really. Ron Jones, 5-9 junior, who has seen only limited duty all season for Wayne, helped prevent humiliation. Playing

most of the second half, he worked at frantic speed and often broke up Bobcat plays while piling up a total of 16 points himself.

Peru's Mike Roach, 5-10 dynamo, broke Wayne's back in the first half with 16 of his 19 points as he repeatedly hawked the ball. He was a foul casualty in the second half.

The Bobcats built a 16-point half lead while the Wildcats suffered from disorganization in their usually tight defense. The half-time dressing room conference changed Wayne tactics with the result that Wayne outscored Peru 48-43. But it was not enough to overcome the first-half doldrums.

Coach Al Svanningson, though disappointed along with the squad, counted the season of 18 wins and eight losses more successful than seemed likely after a series of early defeats.

Wayne finished the Nebraska College Conference race in second place with a 9-3 mark, behind re-dit champion Peru, 11-1.
