Wizard of Oz by Wayne High To be Presented Mar. 22-24

Nearly four months of work and planning have gone into what may be the biggest show ever presented by Wayne High.

Today, tomorrow and Saturday the school will present "The Wizard of Oz," a musical familiar to at least three generations as a stage show, movie and television presentation.

Major roles in the production feature Susan Wright as Aunt Em; Delmar Williams as Joe A. Farmhand; Lee Vogel as Uncle Henry; Marilyn Nuernberger and Sandra Joy Nelson as Dorothy; Kenny Marra as the Mayor of Munchkin; Myra Walker as a Munchkin Maid; Donna Echtenkamp as the Wicked Witch of the North; Carla Rishwisch as the Wicked Witch of the West; Don Larsen as the Scarecrow and Roger Lueders as the Tin Woodman.

Also appearing in "The Wizard" will be the Munchkin chorus, the Jutebags and the Gels of Oz. Hahn High orchestra will accompany the production.

Special props and effects were constructed for the show since six different scenes are used.

In the work with the scenery, sound, lights, publicity, properties, costumes and makeup, 29 people were utilized. In all, not counting the orchestra, 118 people will take part in the production.

Curtain time will be 8 p.m. each night at the city auditorium.

Irvin Brandt Selected As Outstanding Teacher

Honorary fraternities in science and mathematics staged a surprise at Wayne State College last week. They announced their choice as outstanding teacher in the science and math division and presented a plaque to the winner—Irvin C. Brandt, assistant professor of science.

Lambda Delta Lambda, national honorary fraternity in physical sciences and Kappa Mu Epsilon, national honorary mathematics fraternity, initiated the honor without faculty knowledge, balloted in secret, and ordered the plaques a traveling award which will go to each year's winner for 12 years and a small plaque for each winner to keep.

After 12 years the big plaque will stay permanently with the department, science or math, which has won it most often.

Credits Daughter's Life to Knowledge From Fire Patrol

The Junior Fire Patrol is a simple name that might lead one to think it is a boys' club where they gain recognition in the group by observing fire safety practices.

But for one Wayne man, it meant his 14-year-old daughter is still alive.

Harold Erdmann, Wayne, saved his daughter's life three weeks ago by the use of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, learned at a Wayne Junior Fire Patrol meeting.

His son, Bryan, is a member of the organization, and fathers attend the meetings with their sons. The week before the near-fatal mishap he saw resuscitation explained and demonstrated by Wayne Firemen Ivan Creighton, Ted Armbruster and Lloyd Russell at the Fire Patrol meeting.

Erdmann has no training in first aid or rescue, but the demonstration must have been effective.

Erdmann is building a house near Wayne and three weeks ago his daughter, Linda, was working in the basement of the new house. The furnace had been turned down and apparently the chimney had over, driving the fumes back into the house.

Linda said she became dizzy about 11:30 a.m. and started to go home. But she only made it to the first floor before she passed out.

At 1 p.m. she still hadn't returned home for dinner and her father went to the house to get her. He found her on the floor with no sign of breathing.

He carried her out of the house and began to administer mouth-to-mouth resuscitation as he had seen it practiced at the Fire Patrol meeting. After 15 or 20 minutes, Linda began to breathe hard enough to be noticeable. He then carried her to a neighbor's home and a doctor was called. She regained consciousness about 3 o'clock that afternoon.

As Erdmann put it, "I got my reward for attending the meetings in the fact that Linda is feeling fine again."

Erdmann has never missed a meeting with his son, who is one of 42 boys in the organization sponsored by the Wayne Fire Department. The group meets monthly at the fire hall.

Four Norfolk People In One-Car Accident

Four Norfolk people escaped serious injury Tuesday night in a one-car accident of two and one-half miles east of Wayne on Highway 26.

Police reports said the auto, driven by Newell Dittberner, 26 was traveling west when it ran up on a snow drift on the north side of the road and rolled onto its side. The auto slid on its side across the highway and struck the snow bank on the south side, rolling it onto its top. It then skidded backwards on its top to a stopping point about 170 yards from the first point of impact.

Dittberner's passengers, Harlan D. Cooke, 20, Joanne Endes, 19 and Marlene Flesner, 18, were treated for minor injuries by a Wayne doctor and released.

Wayne county voters will face a full slate of candidates in the primary election May 15 with only four incumbents unopposed.

Most recent filing in Wayne was that of Carlyle Garvin, who filed for congressman from the Fifth district. Garvin, a Wayne businessman, is in his first contest for a political office. He filed on the Democratic ticket.

Facing Garvin on the Democratic slate will be Clair Callan, O'Dell, and Edward Dosek and John Sutton, Lincoln.

Two incumbent Republicans, due to the combining of the First and Third districts, have filed for Congress, also Ralph Beermann, Dakota City, and Phil Weaver, Falls City, are the incumbents. Also in the Republican race is former Third District Congressman Robert Harrison, Norfolk. William R. Swearingen, Lincoln, rounds out the Republican slate.

In the race for the Sixteenth district legislature post, incumbent Peter H. Clausen, Leigh, will face Lyle Marutz, Hoskins, and Anton Odvarka, Jr., Clarkson. The two top vote getters will appear on the November ballot.

Pike have filed for the two districts open for the Wayne County Public Power District. Lyle Marutz, who is running for the Legislature, did not file. Along with incumbent Carl O. Sundell, names of Stanley C. Hansen, Norman G. Mahen, Richard Lund and Willis Arvey will appear on the ballot. The four highest in the primary will appear on the November ballot.

Two full scale county commissioner races has developed with 11 filing for First district and eight filing for Third district.

First district commissioner Lee Swinney did not seek re-election.

On the Republican slate in the First district will be Ray "Bus" Agler, Leo Zapp, Adolph H. Clausen, Ralph Beckenhauer, Joe Corbit, Wilfred Carlson, Jr. and Harold Goshorn.

First district Democrats are John Sarber, Leroy Grimm, Rudy Kalland and Roscoe O. Jones.

Third district Republican incumbent Henry Hohnke filed again for commissioner, along with Republicans Hilbert Lihengood, Russell Lindsay, Sr., Wayne L. Kerstine and Ernest Muls.

Three Democrats also filed for the office, Owen Jenkins, Gustav Hank and Ernest Strate.

County Clerk C. A. Bard will be opposed on the Republican ticket by Fagniel Lynch and Carl H. Bichel, No Democrats filed.

In the county treasurer's office, incumbent, Leona Balde, Republican, will be opposed by Orval Higdonson, Democrat, in November. Both are unopposed in the primary.

In the race for county attorney, incumbent Charles McDermott is opposed by John V. Addison on the Republican ticket. No Democrats filed.

County assessor Henry Arp, county sheriff Don Wadde and clerk of district court John T. Breisler, Jr., all Republicans, are unopposed in the non-political county superintendent's office, incumbent Gladys M. Porter, is also unopposed.

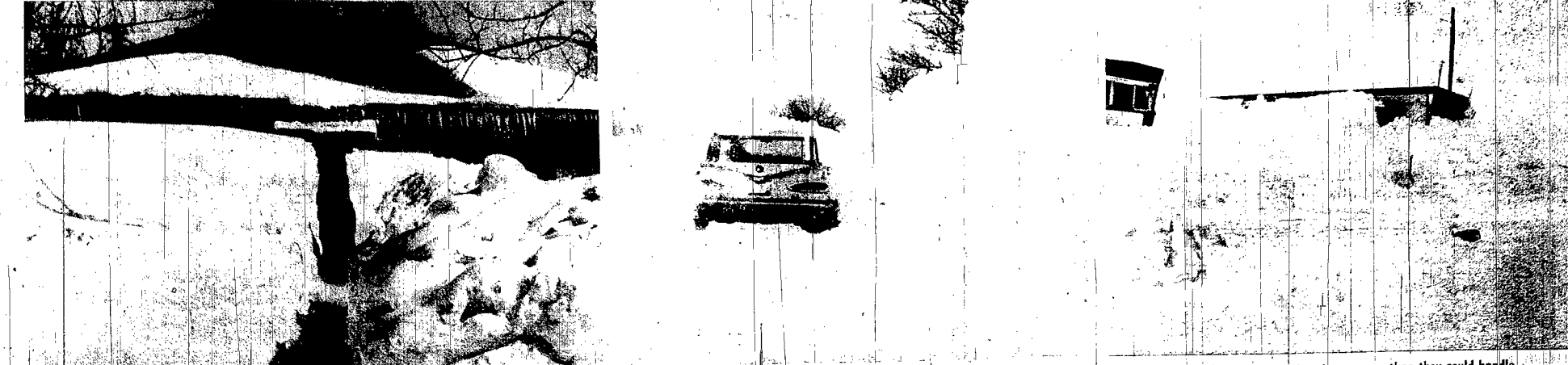

WORSE THAN '49? Some say yes, some are doubtful. Some say it's wetter, some say it's drier. Some say it's warmer, some say colder. But at any rate, last week's snow storm isolated Wayne and a few Wayne residents for some time. The snow blocked all highways leading to Wayne and country roads were strictly impassable. Highway crews clearing snow last Tuesday found it drifting behind them as fast as they could move it. Drifts up to 12 feet high near Wayne

thwarted snow moving equipment. Rotary plows found drifts up to a quarter of a mile long on Highway 15 to Laurel and the road wasn't opened until Thursday last week. In these photos, left to right, John Theil, 1013 Sherman, found it necessary to tunnel out of his house as all doorways were blocked. Not that wasn't enough snow for him, Theil works for the state and fought snow on the highways all week. court on the north edge of Wayne also found more snow than they could handle. One trailer was nearly covered, along with the automobiles and fuel tanks. Snow drifted to the edge of the roof was a common sight on several homes in Wayne.
