To maintain good crop production, it is necessary to keep soil fertile and in good clitch. For according to its needs of the condition of th

Soilllesting is the only practical way to determine these deficiencies.

Nifrogen deficiency is even more extensive than deficiencies of lime and phosphorus in our soils. In every soil area of the county, crops show evidence of introgen starvation. Nitrogen in thought in crops usually means protein hunger in the livestock which consume these crops. A better supply of available nitrogen in the soil should be maintained by growing legume crops, by returning all crop residue to the soil, by feeding livestock and by using commercial nitrogen fettlizers, wherever these practices are profitable.

The application of liming materials and commercial fertilizers in itself, a soil conserving practice and a moisture conserving practice where liming or fertilizing or both result in greater crop growth, better vegetative cover, and therefore more organic matter for the soil, they help protect the soil from erosion, rundff and evaporation losses, improve soil structure and tith, and increase the efficiency of use of soil moisture by the crop.
