It is no reflection on Mr. Kennedy or any other president to say that one man's judgment is much more likely to fatter than the collective judgments of hundreds of members of Congress.

But Congress can act in such matters, if action is needed, with only brief delay. And if Congress surpenders the power of the purse to the executive branch, the systems of checks and bal-

Mixing Furniture Styles

If you're planning a new Easter outfit for your windows, these are questions you may be asking. Miss Magdaline Pfister, University of Nebraska Extension home furnishings specialist, has some answers to these question.

Remember (that ready-mades now come in more sizes. If you cannot fit your window exactly, get the next longest size and shorten it. This can often be done
