In the shot put Dave Krael won at 46-4 1/2, followed by Humpal and Radelle Erdleben.

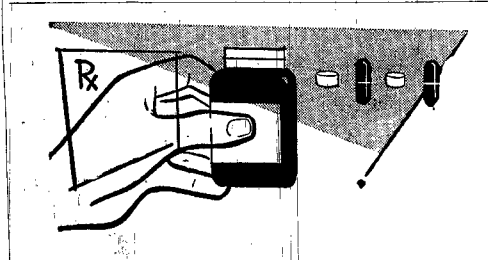
