able on a trial and optional basis.

The new program, if generally adopted, would provide greater financial incentive through the private marketing system for cattlemen to produce the type of beef that consumers want.

The trial period for evaluation will last one year.

The proposed dual grading system would provide for two separate grade identifications on beef carcasses. Weed Control in Trees

Keeping newly planted or older tree rows free of weeds is not the problem it used to be.

Chemicals applied as a spray or as granules can do a good job controlling weeds for a growing season without injuring trees. However the chemicals should be applied immediately after planting or on older plantings before weeds reach the two-leaf stage.

A 3 to 4 foot band can be made down the tree row. Chemicals also may be sprayed right over the trees.


The chemicals dluron, simazine or atrazine have proved most satisfactory. Atrazine should be used at one-half the rate as druron or simazine. An application of four pounds per acte of active material of dluron or simazine is recommended on heavy soil for cedar of pine. Applications on sandy soils should be one-half the rate used on cedar or pine.

Apple trees should be sprayed with materials containing ferbarh, zineb and wettable sulphur just after the leaves unfold to prevent cedar apple rust later in

Codar apple rust causes yellow to orange spots on the apple leaves and sometimes on fruits in July. John Weihing, University of Nebraska Extension plant path-

John Weihing, University of Nebraska Extension plant pathologist, says apple trees should be sprayed at two week intervals at least three times after the leaves unfold. Later sprays would be applied for the control of other diseases or insects.

It is important to thouroghly cover the apple leaves with the spray solution to control cedar apple rust. Weihing emphasizes If a wetting agent has not been incorporated into the funcical material, add either a commercial spre a derm-sticker or some regular household detergent at the rate of one thaspoonful to one gallon of spray solution.

A circular giving directions for a home fruit spray schedule is available in the County Extension Office.
