## New Beef Grading System Offered by U.S. Ag Department

Beginning July 1, the livestock and meat industry will be offered an opportunity to evaluate a new approach to beef grading, when the U.S. Department of Agriculture makes a dual grading system available on a trial and optional basis.

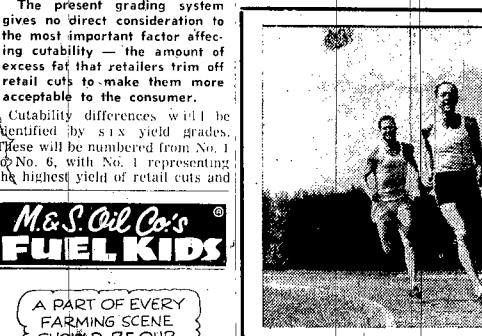
The new program, if generally adopted, would provide greater financial incentive through the private marketing system for cattlemen to produce the type of beef that consumers want.

The trial period for evaluation will last one year.

The proposed dual grading system would provide for two separate grade identifications on beef carcasses. The quality grade, which indicates palatability of meat — reflecting factors associated with tenderness, juiciness, and flavor — has been widely used for nearly a quarter-century. The proposed additional standard relates to the cutability — the percentage of salable meat which the retailer can cut from the carcass.

In today's complex livestock and meat marketing, both of these characteristics strongly influence the ultimate value of the beef carcass.

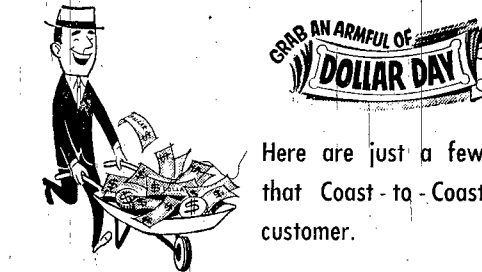
Dual grading provides a more precise market identification for beef carcasses and is also applicable to slaughter cattle. It therefore would furnish the means for a more accurate reflection of consumer preferences back through the marketing channels to the producer.

**Wayne Student Builds Display for Shock at University of Nebraska**

While Lincolinites may be discussing the sonic booms heard in the area, a University of Nebraska student from Wayne is trying to learn more about them.

Allen Otte, a sophomore majoring in mechanical engineering, has constructed a shock tube for E-Week, a little device to show the public something of the forces involved when a high-speed missile breaks the sound barrier.

The scaled-down model will be working and on display today from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. in Ferguson Hall, along with hundreds of other displays during E-Week Open House. The public is invited to attend.

Allen has constructed his electrodynamic tube with a small paddle wheel which revolves when the high pressure waves are generated. Larger and more complicated tubes are being constructed at universities to study the effect of shock velocity in the fields of plasma physics and magneto gas dynamics.

This field of study is one of the most important efforts underway throughout educational institutions in the nation. Many space flight problems, from the re-entry of vehicles to an atmosphere to the waves created when aircraft fly above the speed of sound, are being investigated with such equipment.

# Larson-Kuhn Marks 40 Years of Progress with New Ladies' Shop Opening

## New Store Features Top Fashion Lines

Larson-Kuhn company, which marked its fortieth year of service to Wayne and NE Nebraska, Tuesday, will hold the grand opening of its new ladies' shop and a completely remodeled men's and boys' store today, Friday and Saturday.

The opening of the new ladies' shop initiates the firm's expansion into the field of nationally known women's fashions. The store will carry major name brands in dresses, sportswear, hosiery, lingerie, foundations and accessories.

Style shows are planned at the new shop each day this weekend. They will be staged at 10 a.m., 2 and 4 p.m. each day of the three days with a fourth show planned at 7 p.m. Saturday. Both the ladies' shop and men's and boys' store will offer free gifts to those attending the grand opening.

The new ladies' shop had its beginning when the Larson-Kuhn co. purchased the former First National bank building in July, 1961. Construction was started Jan. 15. The project including redecorating and rearranging the firm's men's and boys' store.

The two will be operated jointly by means of a connecting interior archway. The ladies' shop will be staffed by Mrs. Clarence Kuhn, Mrs. Cleo Reuter, Caroline Peterson and Deanna Smith.

Interior decor of the new shop is in ivory, off white and melon shades with coordinated draperies. The floors have wall-to-wall carpeting and the newest types of lighting fixtures were used to offer better display for patrons.

Visitors to the ladies' shop will first be confronted with a unique black sidewalk which was poured to front both the Larson-Kuhn stores. A single marquee covers the front of both establishments.

Expansion is nothing new to the Larson-Kuhn firm which had its beginning May 1, 1922 when

Russell L. Larson purchased the Orr and Orr store on the corner of Second and Main streets, site of the present Larson-Kuhn department store. Larson, who came to Wayne from Randolph, immediately expanded the business from its principal field of groceries to include dry goods, shoes and ready-to-wear.

It remained as such until 1930 when Larson purchased the department store building and began

remodeling it, adding 50 additional feet toward the alley to the east and putting on a new front. Prior to this project he had started a variety store in the department store business. This gave way to men's and boys' furnishings in 1935.

Following World War II the grocery business was discontinued and the basement again expanded. Home furnishings, a cotton shop, sportswear and domestics were added in 1946.

Clarence Kuhn, the firm's present general manager, joined the organization Feb. 1, 1946, moving

to Wayne from Columbus. Remodeling of the complete store was underway at the time and completed about May 1.

In 1949 the Larson-Kuhn men's

store was opened across the street from the department store. The firm was then joined by Kermit Florine, who had been associated with Larson since his graduation from WSFC. Further expansion came in 1951 with the addition of a carpet and draperies division at the department store.

Again in 1952 the firm grew with the opening of a men's store at Columbus. It was managed by Florine until 1957 when another men's store was added at Norfolk. Florine then moved to Norfolk as manager and became general manager of the firm's men's and boys' operations. The Wayne men's and boys' store is now managed by Charles Surber. Lester Broomey manages the Columbus outlet. LeRoy Otte was named assistant manager of the Wayne department store Oct. 1, 1961 and will serve in the same capacity at the new ladies' shop.

The Larson-Kuhn firm now has 35 full-time and six part-time employees with an annual payroll of well over \$100,000.

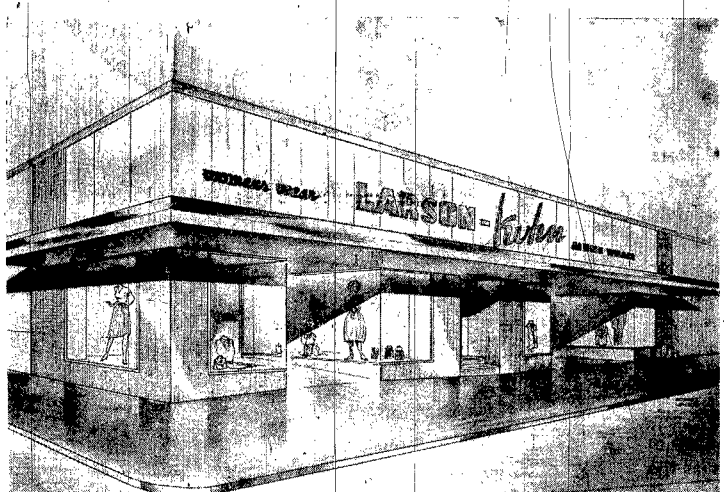

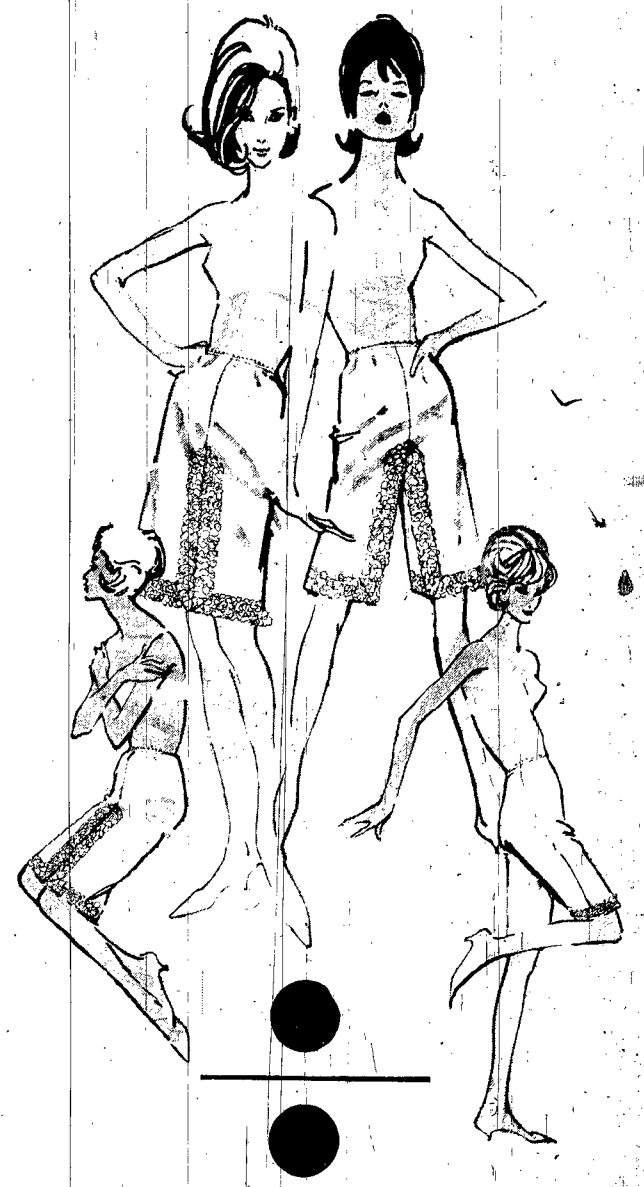

A biological science major, Miss Norman has compiled a nearly perfect grade average of 3.93 (on a 4 for A system) during her four years at Wayne. She maintained a straight A record in her major field.

Miss Norman has been no book hermit in earning her high grades. She is editor of the college yearbook this year and worked on its staff all four years.
