

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

Trees Need Fertilizer



provide nutrients for trees.

Before fertilizing, soak the
soil thoroughly under the tree
by watering for two hours. Then
make imaginary circles around
the tree two feet apart until you
have a series of circles that
extend as far out as the branches!


After making the circles, holes should be made in the ground abbut two feet apart in each circle. The holes may be made with a heavy punch bar or a soall auger. Holes should be abbut two inches in diameter.

if the tree is' large, holes should not be made in the first two circles next to the tree trunk, to avoid damaging large roots. Many feeding roots are found in the area around the tree trunk. In heavy soils trees obtain nutrients to a depth of 12 inches below the surface.

It inches below the surface.

Fertilizer should be applied acqurding to the diameter of the tree trunk. The recommended rate is two pounds of commercial fertilizer such as 10.64 to each inch of diameter of the tree trunk. The three numbers 10.64 represent the proportions of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. If you use a higher or lower analysis fertilizer, adjust the application accordingly.

The fertilizer should be weighed for each tree and the desired amount should be divided equally, between the holes. After placing fertilizer in the holes, the



aren should be watered thoroughly to dissolve the fertilizer. The holes should be left open to allow air to penetrate down to the roots after fertilizing.

Lawn trees should be watered thoroughly several times throughout the summer and fall. It's best to let the hose run slowly for two hours at the base of each tree. Additional water is needed because rain seldom spaks through the soulto the tree roots.

Soybean Pointers

Early-maturing varieties of soybeans may be planted during the last half of May and up until about June 10.

It is usually desirable to drop a seed every inch in row plantings. This will require about one bushel of seed per acre it 40-inch rows. More than a bushel per acre will be used in narrow row spacings (21-24 in ches apart.)

row spacings (21.24 in che s apart.)
Recommended varieties for Northeast Nebraska are Ford, Hawkeye and Landarin. Weed control is the key to successful soybean production. The use of pre-emergence herbicides may be good insurance in weedy fields.

Laundering Dacron Pillows

Dacron filled pillows should be washed in softened water. Mrs. Clara Leopold, University Extension home management specialist, offers these instruc-

specialist, offers these instructions:
Submerge the pillow in warm
water (100 degrees, fahrenheit).
Compress the pillow several
times in warm, sudsy water.
Avoid severe twisting and
wringing. Instead, scrib the
ticking with a soft brijsh. Then
rinse thoroughly in warm water
and press or squeeze the pillow
between Turkish towels. Remove
as much water as possible,
and dry in a breeze.

For garments of synthetic fabrics, use a piece of whore rayon-seam tape as a stay in the waist-line seam to keep it from stretching.

For cotton fabric garments a narrow cotton twill tape is best for using as a stay. Normal pressing with a hot iron on cotton garments could might a rayon tape. A narrow strip of the fabric selvage of the self fabric can also be used to keep the waist-line from stretching.

Floor Covering Tests

Tests on wear of several different kinds of floor coverings
used in, homes were made by
the Texas Experiment station
recently. Materials tested were:
vinyl titles, rubber thes, vinyl
asbestos, linoleums, linot i le s,
cork and asphalt titles.

Vinyl titles and rubber tiles
proved most resistant to wear;
asphalt tiles were least resistant.

The maintenance advised by
manufacturers of floor coverings
usually included waxing and a
method of cleaning off old wax
before applying a few coat. The
Texas study showed that such
maintenance helped keep up the
appearance off all the floor coverings, but it helped only the
linoleums and the cork tiles resist wear.

Floor coverings in farm hornes often are subject to extra heavy wear because sand on other soil is brought in on heavy work shoes. The Texas tests showed that a wet or damp abrasive caused faster wear than a dry abrasive on all floor coverings except cork. Cork wore down faster when the abrasive was dry.

Homemakers may conclude from this that wet shees or overshoes bringing in sand, mud or other grit are especially hard on most floor coverings. Thus, doormats that catch soil effectively are money-savets, especially in wet weather.

Conservation NEWS **NOTES**

Several Wayne County farmers Several Wayne County farmers attended the demonstration on Till-Plant System at the North-cast Nobraska experimental Station this past week. This Till-Plant method is a system of minimum tillage which consists of thrue basic operations abe (4) Cut Stalks, (2) Till-plant and apply insecticide, herbicide and starter fertilizer when needed, (3) Cultivate corf at the knee high stage.

Research on the till-piant system of corn production started in 1955 at the Experimental farm at Lincoln. After 3 years of testing at Lincoln and many tests joutstate, the results show a yield of 2 bushels per acre more than conventionally planted fields.

The Soil Conservation Service

tionally planted fields.

The Soil Conservation Service thinks that this method of producing corn has many advantages. You have residue on the surface at all times to prevent wind and water crosion. There is less soil compaction which permits better soil structure and tilth and therefor the soil has a higher water intake. The average cost of tillage operation for the till plant system is 87.50 less per acre than the Conservation methods.
