Commencement For Hahn Tonight

Twenty-six seniors will be graduated tonight in Hahn High school's final commencement—the ceremony beginning at 6 o'clock in the Willow Bowl.

If weather is unfavorable, the graduation will move into the auditorium in the Administration building.

Mrs. Anne Campbell, president of the Nebraska State Education Association, will make the main address as she returns to the campus for the second time in recent weeks. She received Wayne State's Distinguished Service Award at the April college commencement.

She will be introduced by Dianne Polhemus, senior class president.

Also speaking will be Karen Bockenhauer and Harry Kelson, valedictorians, and Arlene Hamilton, salutatorian.

George DeBow, acting director of Hahn, will present awards, and then the seniors will harvest the fruit of their education as they receive diplomas from President W. A. Brandenburg.

The band will play processional and recessional music and other selection, directed by Fred Vorec.

The Rev. Robert Shipke will give the invocation and benediction.

Thus ends the history of Hahn as a secondary school dating back to 1928, the year its building was erected. (There had been elementary grades earlier.) Hahn's first high school principal was A. F. Gullivier, still living in Wayne since retirement in 1952.

The training school's final year proved among the most illustrious in many respects. Music and speech students earned numerous competitive honors. The football and basketball teams rated among the school's best, and the cagers went to the state tournament.

The State Normal Board decision earlier this year to close Hahn's junior and senior high grades followed recommendations by several educational organizations. Elementary grades, kindergarten through sixth, will continue.

Remedial Speech Clinic Interviews May 31-June 1

Wayne State's remedial speech clinic will offer therapy again this year for children with speech handicaps.

Interviews for the selection of children are scheduled Thursday and Friday, May 31 and June 1, from 9 to noon and 1 to 4 o'clock each day in the special services office, administration building.

Parents wishing interviews for their children (ages 5 to 18) should write Dr. Helen Russell, director of the clinic, indicating the preferred time for interview.

Clinic sessions from July 5 through August 3, will give each child at least 15 hours of therapy in small groups.

There is no charge for the clinic services. Dr. Russell, associate professor of speech at Wayne State, has had extensive experience in speech therapy and will be directing Wayne's clinic for the fourth summer.

Marlan Carlson Named Outstanding Musician

Marlan Carlson, son of Prof. and Mrs. Albert G. Carlson, has been named the year's outstanding musician at The University of Rochester Eastman School of Music.

Upon recommendation of the music faculty, he will be awarded the Artist's Diploma by Dr. Howard Hanson, director of the school, during commencement activities.

Following a year of study in Europe under a Fulbright scholarship Carlson is in his second year of graduate study at Eastman sponsored by the Danforth National Foundation. He received the Master of Music degree last June.

The past year he has appeared as a violist with the Eastman-Rochester Orchestra, and has been a member of the Rochester Civic Orchestra. He spent three months abroad touring with the Eastman Philharmonia Orchestra in which he served as principal violist.

Ask Farmers Aid in State Crop and Livestock Survey

Wayne area farmers are again asked to help in the annual June 1 surveys on farm crops and livestock in the state and nation. The mid-year survey is underway now.

A. V. Nordquist, state agricultural statistician, said, "if every farmer and rancher who receives a blank form asking questions about his crop acreages and livestock and poultry numbers will take a few minutes to fill out and return the survey questionnaire, it will assure accurate, dependable estimates of Nebraska crop and livestock production. Agriculture is the main business in Nebraska and this is the way that trends and changes are measured."

The information from the survey on acres planted in corn, sorghum, oats, soybeans and other crops will provide the basis for the monthly estimates of crop production during the 1962 growing season. Survey reports on livestock will be used in estimating the calf crop, spring and prospective fall pig crops, milk and egg production, information which is used by farmers and ranchers in making their marketing plans.

Questionnaires are in the mail now and prompt answers with exact current figures will greatly facilitate this survey.

Wayne State trackmen, the field men especially, fulfilled their coach's predictions and upset some predictions by other conference coaches last week.

They finished in fourth place, just where Coach Carl Ellemeyer expected, compiling 61 points. This was considerably higher than some rival coaches anticipated from advance scoring of possible results.

Kearney easily captured its ninth straight conference title with 204 1/2 points while Hastings led Doane, 94 to 92. Nebraska Wesleyan bowed out of the conference with a fifth place on 54 1/2 points. Chadron got 15, Peru, 6.

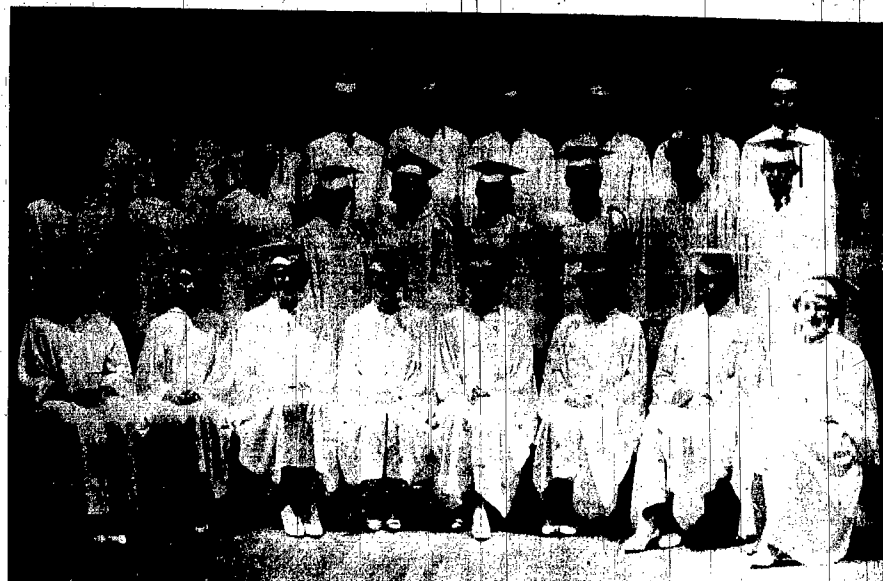

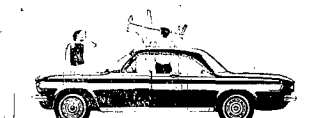

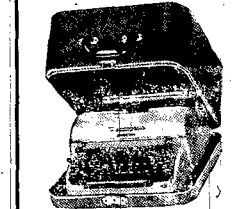

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers. It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Planning A Trip?

If you are one of the millions of American motorists who are planning an automobile trip right now it might be well to pause and look at a few figures just released by one of the largest automobile insurance companies in the country.

The Travelers Insurance companies in their report of highway accidents during the preceding year, made annually since 1931 with the exception of the war years, has compiled a study of the most dangerous hours and days of the week on the highways.

"The figures would indicate that it's best to get an early start and by the same token stop early in the day," a spokesman for The Travelers said in commenting on the report that analyzed last year's 37,600 traffic deaths and

3,057,000 injuries. The 8-9 a.m. period accounted for 1.9 percent of the fatalities, lowest of those times listed while 6-7 p.m. had the worst total, 6.8 percent. In the nine hour period from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. a total of 25.9 percent of the fatal accidents occurred while during the next nine hours 51.9 percent of the highway fatalities took place.

As to the relative merits of the respective days of the week, there is no question that weekend travel is the most dangerous. The Travelers report said, Friday, Saturday and Sunday contributed 53.3 percent of all fatalities while Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday added up to 34.2 percent.

It was also pointed out that despite the few cars on the road from 1-6 a.m., 16.8 percent of all fatalities occurred within that period.

Tourism Boom

There is optimism in the statehouse that this season will see an increase in the tourist business potential for Nebraska. Interstate Travel

Travel on Nebraska's Interstate highway between Lincoln and Omaha increased 14 percent in April from the March total of 5,439 cars daily. As compared with April of 1961, the total daily travel in April of this year was 30 percent higher.

The figures were announced by the State Highway department, which also noted that 46.6 million gallons of gasoline was imported into Nebraska in March and taxed.

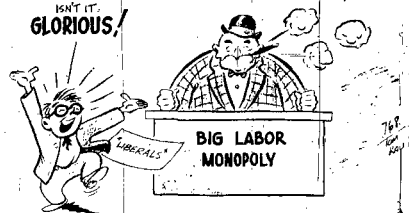
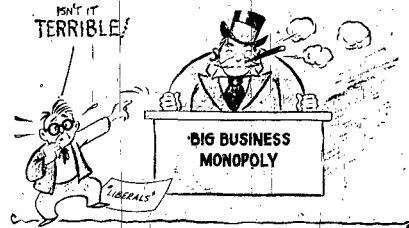
Co. Agent's Column

Trees Need Fertilizer
Fertilizing your lawn regularly does not necessarily mean your trees are getting the food they need. Fertilizer applied on the lawn usually is used up before it ever gets deeper than the club six spot. Dummy's jack won't do it. The food of hearts was trumped in South, and a low club was led to dummy's queen. East discarded a heart on the club lead.

The key play was made next as the heart king was led from North. East covered with his ace, but declarer did not ruff. Instead, he discarded the diamond deuce. East could not make a lead without letting declarer fulfill the contract. A diamond lead would run to the ace-queen in dummy. East led a heart. South discarded the four of diamonds and trumped with the seven in dummy. The ace of diamonds took care of declarer's last diamond. South, holding spades and the good ten of clubs, claimed the remainder of the tricks.

North's apparently worthless king of hearts had played an important part in making it possible for declarer to bring in the contract. Declarer observed, when the dummy hand was placed on the table, that the king could be used at the opportune time to throw East in the lead. It seemed unlikely on the bidding that the diamond finesse would succeed. When East discarded a heart on the third lead of clubs, fulfillment of the contract became a virtual certainty. Had declarer trumped East's ace of hearts instead of discarding a diamond, he would have lost two diamond tricks. This, along with the loser in the club suit, would have resulted in defeat of the contract.

West led the queen of hearts. The bidding, and the opening lead, made it clear that East held the ace of hearts. Declarer played a low heart from dummy and trumped in his hand, with

area should be watered thoroughly to dissolve the fertilizer. The holes should be left open to allow air to penetrate down to the roots after fertilizing.

Lawn trees should be watered thoroughly several times throughout the summer and fall. It's best to let the hose run slowly for two hours at the base of each tree. Additional water is needed because rain seldom soaks through the sod to the tree roots.

Soybean Pointers

Early-maturing varieties of soybeans may be planted during the last half of May and up until about June 10.

It is usually desirable to row a seed every inch in drop plantings. This will require about one bushel of seed per acre in 40-inch rows. More than a bushel per acre will be used in narrow row spacings (21-24 inches apart).

Recommended varieties for Northeast Nebraska are Ford, Hawkeye and Landarin. Weed control is the key to successful soybean production. The use of pre-emergence herbicides may be good insurance in weedy fields.

Extension Notes

Laundering Dacron Pillows
Dacron filled pillows should be washed in softened water. Mrs. Clara Leopold, University Extension home management specialist, offers these instructions:

Submerge the pillow in warm water (100 degrees Fahrenheit). Compress the pillow several times in warm, sudsy water.

Avoid severe twisting and wringing. Instead, scrub the ticking with a soft brush. Then rinse thoroughly in warm water and press or squeeze the pillow between Turkish towels. Remove as much water as possible, and dry in a breeze.

Keep Seam from Stretching
For garments of synthetic fabrics, use a piece of woven rayon seam tape as a stay in the waistline seam to keep it from stretching.

For cotton fabric garments a narrow cotton twill tape is best for using as a stay. Normal pressing with a hot iron on cotton garments could melt a rayon tape. A narrow strip of the cotton selvage of the self fabric can also be used to keep the waistline from stretching.

Floor Covering Tests
Tests on wear of several different kinds of floor coverings used in homes were made by the Texas Experiment station recently. Materials tested were: vinyl tiles, rubber tiles, vinyl asbestos, linoleums, linotiles, cork and asphalt tiles.

Vinyl tiles and rubber tiles proved most resistant to wear; asphalt tiles were least resistant. The maintenance advised by manufacturers of floor coverings usually included waxing and a method of cleaning off old wax before applying a new coat. The Texas study showed that such maintenance helped keep up the appearance of all the floor coverings, but it helped only the linoleums and the cork tiles resist wear.

Dark, solid colors in most floor coverings show wear the most. The exception was rubber tile. Dark colored rubber tile changed in appearance less than lighter colors. Floor coverings in farm homes often are subject to extra heavy wear because sand and other soil is brought in on heavy work shoes. The Texas tests showed that a wet or damp abrasive caused faster wear than a dry abrasive on all floor coverings except cork. Cork wore down faster when the abrasive was dry.

Homemakers may conclude from this that wet shoes or overshoes bringing in sand, mud or other grit are especially hard on most floor coverings. Thus, doormats that catch soil effectively are money-savers, especially in wet weather.

Capitol News . . . Realignment Plans Coming Forth on Power Districts

LINCOLN—Plans for realigning Nebraska's public power districts have been coming forth in numbers as the 1963 session of the Legislature draws near. The Legislature is expected to come to grips with the problem of power districts when it meets in January. A special committee of state senators is studying the subject as is a committee composed of members of the power field. Perhaps the focal point in the mounting discussion has been Consumers Public Power district, headquartered at Columbus.

A proposal called an "area plan" by the manager of the Norris Public Power district, would divide the state into several areas, eliminating Consumers as an entity.

Consumers officials have stated consolidation, not division, is needed to produce an efficient organization and lower electrical rates. Consumers' proposed "strong merger" plan which would merge that organization in the eastern two-thirds of the state, with the properties of the Nebraska Public Power system.

Another plan would merge Consumers' eastern system, Loup and Platte districts and the Nebraska G & T into a single district to be known as the Nebraska Public Power district.

Most observers feel the complex problem will not be rushed in the Legislature.

Tax Study

The Nebraska Tax Research Council unveiled this week an extensive study of the state's tax laws. Requiring six months to complete, the study produced several observations from council officials.
