Hook Steps Down As GOP Head, Adon Jeffrey Elected

The Wayne county Republicans elected Adon Jeffrey party chairman at their meeting Thursday replacing T. S. Hook, who served as party chairman for 28 years.

The group of 40 Republicans gathered for the meeting adopted two resolutions of appreciation and affection one for Hook and another for Mrs. Lawrence

Ring, who served as vice chairman for the party for over 15 years. Both Hook and Mrs. Ring declined renomination to their posts.

Jeffrey told the group that the Republican organization of Wayne county was acclaimed the best in the state under Hook's direction and has been used as a model by other counties.

Completing the election, Mrs. James Robinson was named vice chairman, Mrs. Alan Cramer, secretary and Don Reed, treasurer. The nominating committee was composed of O. R. Bowen, Mrs. Don Wightman, Irvin Jones and Charles McDermott.

The convention elected Hook, Jeffrey and Leland Herman as delegates to the September state convention. Named as alternates were Clarence Schroeder, Mrs. James Robinson and Mrs. Lawrence Ring.

The credential committee composed of Mrs. Robinson, Mrs. Ring and Mrs. Marion Glass reported 25 delegates and five non-delegates present.

The new officers were granted authority to appoint a county executive committee.

The convention closed with precinct meetings to elect chairmen for the precincts.

One Added, Need Two More Teachers

The Wayne school board Monday night voted to add one more elementary teacher to teach second grade.

Projected enrollment at Wayne city school for 1962-63 shows the following totals:

Kindergarten, 45; First, 43; second, 48; Third, 35; Fourth, 36; Fifth, 54 and Sixth, 44.

The board also hired Paul Zingg to teach science. He formerly taught at Clifton and Tipton and is presently getting his Masters degree in science from the University of Michigan on a National Science Foundation Scholarship. He is married and has two daughters.

The school still has openings for two qualified English teachers and a German teacher.

The board received bids for a new school bus, but delayed action on the bids until several buses are examined by the board.

Field Work Slows as Area's Average Moisture Doubles

Another of the area's persistent rains brought farming operations to a virtual standstill Wednesday. It was the fourth straight day of rain. The Wayne reporting station recorded 13 inches of rain by 8 a.m. Wednesday bringing the June total to 1.31 inches.

County Agent Harold Ingalls, in his report to the state Saturday, estimated that 95 per cent of the county corn has been planted. ASC officials said the southeast portion of the county had the heaviest rains and considerable replanting will be necessary there. First cuttings of alfalfa have been started but the monotonous rains have slowed drying and baling operations.

Warn Children About Playing in Insect Fog

With the spraying season at hand, Street Commissioner Henry Victor this week asked parents to caution their children about the dangers of following the city's mosquito spraying vehicle when it is in operation.

In addition to the danger of fog-blinded motorists passing the sprayer, Victor said a stronger spraying chemical is being used this year, which might cause some of the children to become ill if they play in the dense fog as it is discharged from the sprayer.

TV Play by WSTC Students Set For Sioux City Show

A television play, written by two Wayne State College students and described as an "almost comedy," will be presented Saturday by Sioux City Station KQTV.

The writers, Ted Blendenman, Sioux City, and Paul McCluskey, Lyons, will take two of the roles, joined by five other Wayne State, Ted Klopp, Cherokee, Ia.; David Armbruster, Brunswick; Warren Zaretsky, Levittown, N. Y.; Roger Morris, Winside, and Sally Bostwick, Omaha.

While authors Blendenman and McCluskey call their play, entitled "Five Men in a Tub," an almost comedy, it is a keen satire which takes place after an imaginary World War III somewhere in Europe.

Five men among the world's 27 survivors argue over what is important in life, but have difficulty because the German in their midst possesses the ultimate weapon a bow and arrow, which seemingly gives him the key to power.

The solution emerges when all five realize there is but one woman left on earth, and she convinces them that war is senseless.

The play is scheduled after the Saturday afternoon game of the week.

Open Bidding Brings Rate to 3.08% on 15-Year Issue

The city council Tuesday night approved the sale of \$131,000 in revenue bonds to the Storz-Wachob Bender Co., Omaha, for the construction of a sewage disposal plant.

In the first open auction of bonds ever held in Wayne, eight firms were represented in bidding for the bonds, with the winning bid totaling 3.083 per cent. This is the rate of interest the city will pay on the bonds.
